## Oil Activity Over Area on Increase with Several Field Tests

Numerous locations and completions were in the oil news of the fields around Bronte this week. Some wildcats were making progress on their tests to find oil, also. Most of the activity was in the Fort Chadbourne field, but some drilling was going on in the Bronte field as well as the McCutchen field, both west of Bronte.

Union No. 6 Jim McCutchen, a northwest offset to the same operator's No. 3 McCutchen, recovered 300 feet of slightly oil and gas cut mud, 520 feet of free oil, 200 feet of oil and gas cut salt water, and 2,700 feet of salt water on a two hour drillstem test from 3,981 to 4,016 feet.

Casing was set to 4,005 feet and perforations from 3,996-99 feet were made. Operator will try to block off the water and complete this well at the above depth.

Lion Oil Co. No. 1 E. C. Rawlings, wildcat northwest of Bronte was drilling Wednesday at noon at 3,260 feet in lime and shale. A report said that no markers had been picked up in the test, but it was a little early

to tell much about how the formations were running.

In the Bronte field Humble has completed No. 3 J. L. Brunson on pump for 109.66 barrels of oil daily. The oil tested 45.1 gravity. Production was from open hole between 4,302 and 4,350 feet. This section was treated with 500 gallons of acid. In the Fort Chadbourne field, northeast of here, Humble has completed No. 24 Sallie Odum for a daily flow of 475.89 barrels of 46.2 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 679-1.

G. W. Strake No. 9 E. O. Michaelis has been finished, flowing 244.74 barrels of 46.8 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,122-1.

Strake No. 1 Michaelis has been plugged and abandoned at 5,270 feet in lime.

New locations in the Fort Chad-

bourne field include Stanolind No. 1-A Tad Richards, a 5,600 foot test, which will be located 467 feet from the northwest and 2,173 feet from the northeast lines of N. Brookshire survey 468.

Humble has staked five locations in the Fort Chadbourne field. They are No. 25 Sallie Odum, 660 feet out of the southeast corner of E. W. Stokes survey; No. 26 Odum, 660 feet from the south and 610 feet from the east line of J. W. Stokes survey; No. 36-B Odum, 2,175 feet from upper north line and 1,684 feet from upper west line of John Bird survey 469; No. 37-B Odum, 660 feet from the south and 821 feet from upper east line of the 656.2 acre tract out of the north part of John Bird survey 469; and No. 38-B Odum, 660 feet from the south and 1,821 feet from the west lines of the 656.2 acre tract out of the north part of John Bird survey 469.

### SAM ALLEN SPEAKER FOR FARM BUREAU

Sam Allen, state officer of the Farm Bureau of Launesa, made the principal address before thirty-five members of the Farm Bureau at their meeting last Friday night in Robert Lee. Also the group heard a speech by tape recording made by Senator Gory from Tennessee.

Farm Bureau dues were set at \$7.50 per year. They have been \$5 in the past.

In the business session, the Coke county farm bureau unanimously adopted the following resolution and had copies made to send to members of the State legislature from this district:

Whereas: Improvement of rural roads commonly referred to as "Farm to Market Roads," has been neglected in the past and many of them are in poor condition

And Whereas: These secondary roads are of prime importance to the rural sections of the State

Therefore be it resolved: That we, members of the Coke county Farm Bureau in convention assembled oppose any reduction in amount of state funds now allotted to the several counties for rural road improvement.

Be it further resolved: That we favor house bill No. 669 which levies a tax on natural gas and earmarks the funds for rural road construction.

**NEWS FROM THE  
COKE CO. SCS**

H. G. Wendland, cooperating with the Coke County Soil Conservation District, completed seeding 60 acres of abandoned cropland to native and introduced grasses. Wendland seeded a mixture of Side Oats Grama, Blue Grama and Weeping Lovegrass. The seed bed was prepared with an eccentric disc which made many small pits. This type of seed bed preparation for seeding native and introduced grasses is proving to be an effective economical land preparation.

The land is left rough and collects small ponds of water retarding runoff and increasing the amount of water entering the soil.

Tyler & Jones has completed pitting 40 acres of abandoned cropland on their ranch located 10 miles north of Robert Lee. The land will be seeded to a native and introduced grass mixture of Side Oats Grama, Blue Grama, and King Ranch Bluestem.

A ranch pond was completed on F. S. Higginbotham's ranch located three miles north of Bronte. The pond was constructed to provide better distribution of livestock water, and to reduce trampling by livestock around watering places and to reduce soil erosion. The pond was designed

by personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

Fred Roe completed the development of a complete coordinated soil, water and range conservation plan on his ranch located on the river northwest of Robert Lee. 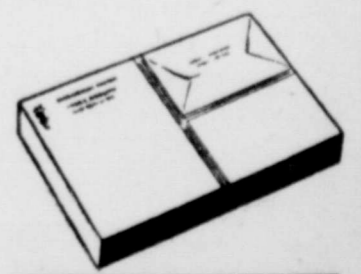

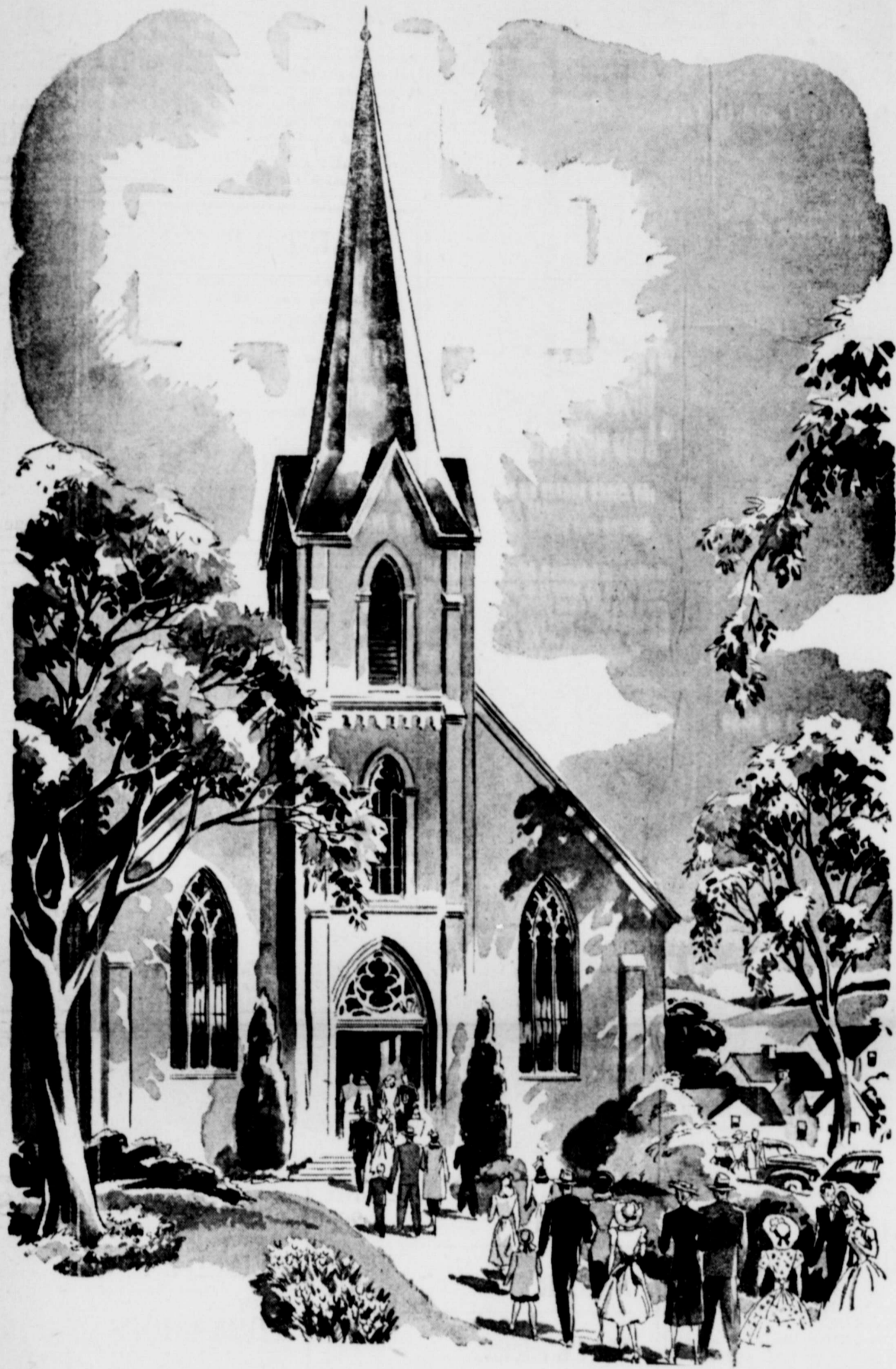

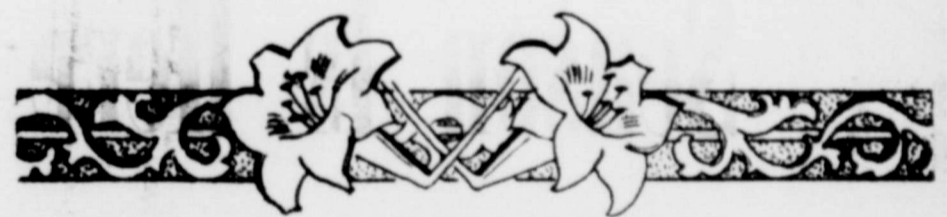
