## Next Friday Is Clean Up Day

In keeping with clean-up month, March 25 to April 25, Mayor H. O. Whitt has set Friday, April 6, as clean-up day for Bronte. Governor Allan Shivers recently designated the entire month as a clean-up time for the state.

The "clean-up" for the downtown area was discussed at the noon meeting of the Lions club Wednesday. Laons and all who will help are to meet down town at 2 p.m. on April 6. Trucks will be on hand to haul trash and the town will undergo a good cleaning.

The Mayor urged that everyone

cooperate in the plan and suggested that townspeople would do well to accept that day as a clean-up day for the private property.

## 1350 Licenses Issued Car Owners As Deadline Nears

At noon Thursday 1,350 vehicle licenses had been issued from Paul Good's tax assessor office, as the deadline for securing the tags neared. Saturday, March 31, is the deadline for securing license plates. After that date, it is illegal for a vehicle to be used without 1951 license plates.

A total of 950 tags had been issued for passenger cars, 300 for farm vehicles, and 100 commercial trucks and pick-ups. Good's office has been rushed this week and is expecting a heavy business Friday and Saturday. His office will remain open all day Saturday.

## RAIN MONDAY WELCOMED

Bronte was the grateful recipient of about one-half inch of rain Monday and, although not enough to assure normal planting, was enough to give rise to the hopes that the longest state-wide drought in years was being broken. Rains were general over the state and the area has remained cloudy much of the week.

Robert Lee reported about .60 inch of rain at the same time and Blackwell reported 2 inches, with some hail accompanying. Almost .50 inch was received in San Angelo.

## Legionnaires Have Field Day Cleaning Up Bronte's Park

Members of the Bronte American Legion cleaned up the city park on Wednesday afternoon. Cans were hauled off and the trash burned. Royce Fancher, Robert Hugh Sims, Vernon Glenn, Matthew Caperton, Wink Kiker and Gayle Hufstuter spent the afternoon working in the park.

Kiker, local Legion commander, said they would appreciate the cooperation of Bronte citizens in helping to keep it clean. In cooperation with the Legion, the Bronte Lions club has offered a \$25 reward for the apprehension of anyone abusing the local park.

Cleaning the park was discussed at the meeting of the Legion Tuesday night at the Legion Hall. At the meeting, members discussed sponsoring a junior baseball club. Edward Cumbie and Matthew Caperton were appointed as a committee to plan a home-talent show to be given soon.

The group also discussed a community-wide barbecue to be given in the next few months. It was announced that any Legionnaire who can go may be a delegate to the Brownwood convention on April 28 and 29. The Brownwood affair is a 21st district convention.

The Legion received a gold seal to be affixed to the meritorious service certificate for exceeding average membership during the last 4 years.

Another major item of business was to come before the local group was the adoption of a resolution calling for legislation whereby the United States could stay prepared for national emergencies. The resolution was unanimously adopted and reads as follows:

WHEREAS, the United States, since 1917, has been engaged in three

(3) major conflicts, requiring the drafting of millions of our young men, many of whom were sent into actual combat improperly trained and,

WHEREAS, the success of any endeavor is dependent upon properly trained and conditioned personnel and,

WHEREAS, the present world conditions make it mandatory that we have a Universal Military Training program that will work after the present emergency is over which will avert a repetition of past practices of sending improperly trained soldiers into front line battle, now

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the George Scott Post No. 394, American Legion, Department of Texas, at Bronte, Texas, do unanimously request your full support in the passage of a one-package draft extension and Universal Military Training program bill, NOW, that will work, to protect our Nation against any emergencies of the future and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be furnished our Congressman, O. C. Fisher, and our two Senators, Tom Connally and Lyndon Johnson, and that a copy be spread upon the minutes of the local American Legion post and a copy be furnished the Editor of the Bronte Enterprise for publication.

The new church will be erected on the same location as the present structure, erected in 1906-07. It will be built of brick and the masonry. The sanctuary will be thirty-two by sixty feet in size and will face east on Church Street.

The educational portion of the building will be on the north side of the sanctuary and will be thirty-two by fifty-eight feet; giving an over-all frontage of ninety feet on Church Street.

In addition to the sanctuary, the new structure will have a twenty by thirty-two foot recreational room, kitchen, pastor's study, choir room, eight Sunday School rooms, rest rooms and a tower.

## K. P. Jones to Serve Sentence

The Court of Criminal Appeals in Austin last week affirmed the conviction of K. P. Jones, Jr., of Abilene in County Court of Coke County on September 29, 1950. Judge Morrison wrote the opinion in the higher court on March 21, 1951, and said, "No reversible error appearing, the judgment of the trial court is affirmed."

A Coke county jury found the defendant guilty of illegally transporting liquor in a dry area and fixed his punishment at a fine of \$500 and 30 days in jail. Judge Jeff Dean sentenced the defendant. County Attorney Frank Dickey was the prosecuting attorney.

The defendant based his appeal on two grounds: (1) Failure of the judge to sustain an objection to the charge to the jury and (2) Insufficiency of evidence.

The appellate court sustained the charge as given and held that the evidence was sufficient.

Two criminal cases have been appealed from convictions in the County Court since Dean and Dickey have been in office, both pertaining to alleged liquor law violations. The other case, the State vs. O. T. Sawyers, was reversed and dismissed by the appellate court on the grounds that the complaint was not properly sworn to.

Since the decision was handed down in the Sawyer case, the appellate court is understood to have affirmed cases based upon complaints verified in the same manner as the Sawyer case.

## 17 Locations Made in Fort Chadbourne Area

Oil activity was on the increase this week, particularly in the Fort Chadbourne field, northeast of town. Seventeen new locations were staked in the field, four by Humble and 13 by Currie & Wylie.

Humble No. 27 Sallie M. Odom will be 660 feet from the south and 1,020 feet from the west lines of H. A. Allen survey 30 1/2. No. 28 Odom will be 660 feet from the east and 1,620 feet from the east lines of C. S. Woodward survey 37 1/2. No. 39-B Odom will be 3,495 feet from the south and 736 feet from the

east lines of Pedro Martinez survey 290, and No. 40-B Odom will be 2,365 feet from the west and 736 feet from the east line of the 993.2 acre tract in the west part of Pedro Martinez survey 290.

Currie & Wylie of Bronte has made location for 13 5,500 foot tests in the Fort Chadbourne field. Nos. 5 through 10 Mrs. J. F. Currie will be in Gray Carroll survey No. 284. The other seven Nos. 11 through 17 Mrs. J. F. Currie will be in Gray Carroll survey 283.

Humble No. 1 Lee Lackey, Coke

county wildcat, two miles west and south of Blackwell, was drilling early this week at 1,800 feet. Surface casing was set at 621 feet.

In the West Fort Chadbourne field Humble has completed No. 17 Sallie Odom in 24 hours for 167.83 barrels of 47 gravity oil plus 2-10ths of one per cent water. Production was from 5,332 to 5,346 feet.

In the Bronte field Humble No. 3 O. L. Johnson was drilling Wednesday at 4,100 feet.

Union No. 6 Jim McCutchen in the McCutchen West field, between Robert Lee and Bronte, has been plugged and abandoned after recovering water and some oil on a drillstem test.

Humble began Monday to move oil from the West Fort Chadbourne field via its new pipeline to the field.

Between 400 and 450 barrels per day will be moved from the eight wells in the field. The new line is made of 6-inch pipe and extends 4 1/2 miles from the 8 inch line running into the Fort Chadbourne field.

No contests are anticipated for the election of two councilmen in the city election to be held next Tuesday, April 3, at the city hall. Councilmen H. A. Springer and Sam Spruell will be up for re-election to the two posts, for two-year terms.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. with Noah Pruitt, Sr. as the election judge. Polls will close at 6 p.m. Mrs. Frank Keeney and Mrs. R. W. Rees will assist in holding the election.

Other council members whose terms have another year to run are J. B. Mackey, Joe George Wilkins, and J. P. McGuire. Mayor H. O. Whitt also has another year to serve.

## Two Uninjured in Airplane Accident

Lester Rice and Jerry McMillan, of Marysvale, California, escaped injury Friday morning when their plane failed on a takeoff north of Bronte. The men, who had spent the night in Bronte and visited with Rice's relatives, the early Friday morning. Their plane failed to leave the ground, ran through a fence and crashed into a tree.

Rice and McMillan had been in Bronte the Saturday before enroute to Fort Worth where Rice brought the airplane. They came back Thursday afternoon in the new plane and were leaving for Marysvale at the time of the mishap.

He first believed that the plane was a total loss but later learned that it could be repaired. It was dismantled and taken to Dallas for the repair work.

## TWO MEN BURNED TO DEATH IN PICKUP WRECK SOUTH OF HERE

Homer Richard (Jimmy) Rogers, 32, of Marysvale, and J. C. (Jack) Stephenson, about 60, of Washington, D. C., were burned to death Monday night when their pickup truck hit a bridge and burst into flame between Bronte and Tenmison. The accident occurred about 9 p.m.

The accident marked the first two highway deaths for the year in Coke county and the 17th and 18th fatalities in the San Angelo district of the Texas Highway Patrol.

The gasoline tank of the 1950 Dodge pickup exploded when the machine, traveling north, struck the bridge. The bodies were badly burned. It was some time before Stephenson could be identified at all. His name was learned from a Blackwell telephone operator who said that Stephenson made a call from Blackwell earlier in the evening.

A tourist, A. R. Lester, of Christoval, was the only eye witness to the crash and he was two miles behind the pickup at the time of the crash. He said he saw the explosion and thought it to be plane or bomb explosion as the flames soared so high. Lester drove to the scene of the accident but was unable to remove the men.

The Bronte Fire department was summoned to extinguish the blaze. Funeral services for Rogers, a Marysvale rancher, were held Tuesday afternoon at Sweetwater. He is survived by his wife and his father. Graveside services for Stephenson were held Tuesday afternoon in Bronte with the Rev. V. D. Price officiating. Efforts to locate any survivors were unsuccessful. It was believed that he had a sister in Washington, D. C. He had been heard to mention a sister living there but she had not been located Thursday.

**UNITED CLUB MEETS IN JOHNSON HOME**

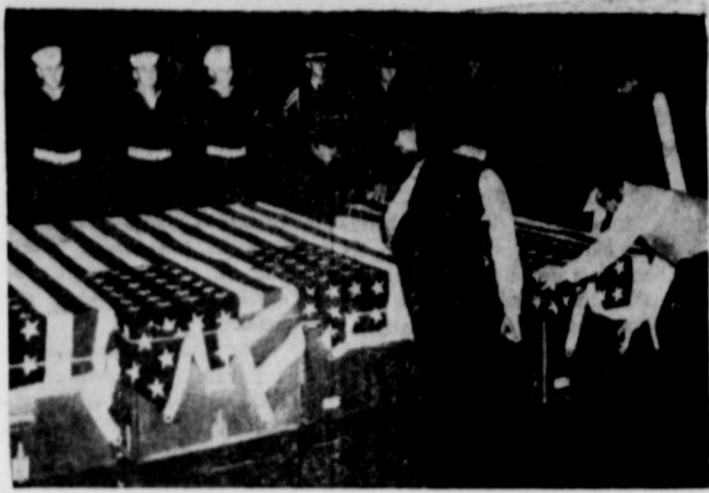
The United WHD club met Wednesday afternoon in the home of Mrs. J. R. Johnson with eight members present.

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
