## J. C. SKIPWORTH FOURTH TRAFFIC FATALITY IN COUNTY DURING '51

J. C. Skipworth, 29, of Robert Lee was killed instantly Wednesday morning about 12:30 when his 1950 Ford struck a bridge one and one-half miles south of Bronte on the San Angelo highway.

Skipworth was driving alone at the time of the accident but it was believed a tire on the car blew out. The car was almost completely destroyed. Skipworth is believed to have died instantly as a result of multiple fractures and cuts.

## BASEBALLERS LOSE TO BLACKWELL WEDNESDAY

The Bronte baseball nine lost a 7 to 4 decision to Blackwell Wednesday afternoon in Bronte's third district game of the season. Marlin McCutchen did the hurling for Bronte.

The Longhorns' next and final game of this season will be played here on Friday, May 4, against Divide.

The champion team of this hall will then take on the champion of the other half for the over-all district title.

Prospects for Ellenburger production in Coke County appeared good this week in Stanolind No. 1 Emma C. Nicholas, wildcat 7½ miles north and slightly west of Bronte.

Casing was being run in the wildcat to 6,354 feet, the total depth. It will be perforated from 6,330-54 feet and test. On a drillstem test between 6,330-44 feet, 120 feet of light green oil and 1,880 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud and no water were recovered. The Ellenburger was topped at 6,530 feet.

An estimated 1,500 feet of very heavily oil and gas cut mud and 30 feet of free oil were circulated out following the second drillstem test, from 6,324-54 feet. The tool was open 90 minutes and gas came to the surface in nine minutes.
