Planes to Salute **Bronte People on** Armed Forces Day

An Armed Forces Day aerial salute to West Texas communities within a 50-air mile radius of Goodfellow Air Force Base will be flown by Goodfellow instructors tomorrow, May 19.

The mass formation of North American T-6 aircraft will be led by Flying at Goodfellow Field. The group formation will consist of 27 aircraft divided into three squadrons of nine planes each. Each squadron will have 3-plane flights.

The "V" formation, which is aught to all fledgling pilots, will be Oklahoma. used throughout the flight and will demonstrate the air discipline techniques developed in World War 11 geared to the leadership of a single pilot in the lead formation.

Why New Telephone Rates Are Necessary

in Bronte

in telephone rates in Bronte. The request is made necessary by the high level of post-war costs of furnishing telephone service, which has thrown our operations here with insuf-

Bronte telephone rates have not changed since 1931.

Q. HOW ABOUT TELEPHONE COSTS-ARE THEY UP MUCH?

* At that time they were reduced from rates established in 1926.

For the first time since 1931, the telephone Company is asking for an adjustment

Here are some of the reasons an adjustment in telephone rates is necessary at this During 1950 we furnished telephone service in Bronte at insufficient earnings:

During the past 10 years Bronte has grown from about 155 telephones to nearly 310.

Several general wage increases have been granted telephone employees since 1945.

The total monthly payroll in Bronte is nearly five times as high as in 1945 due to higher wage rates and a larger number of employees.

Telephone poles, wires, switchboards, and other equipment and supplies cost more than they did before the war.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT THE

TELEPHONE COMPANY'S REQUEST FOR

HIGHER RATES IN BRONTE, TEXAS

A. The Telephone Company payroll in Bronte is more than five times as high as it was six years ago. The growth of Bronte, with the increased telephone usage and improvement of telephone service has made it necessary for us to employ more people; also, in addition, operating costs have gone up.

A. Present rates for telephone service were established in 1931. At that time Bronte had about 199 telephones as compared with more than 310 today. The scope, value and usage of the service has increased greatly in the past twenty years, with no increase in rates.

Q. WITH SO MUCH MORE BUSINESS, ISN'T THE COMPANY'S REVENUE MUCH HIGHER THAN IT WAS A FEW YEARS AGO?

A. Telephone revenues have increased, to be sure, but expenses have increased much faster.

Since 1940, local telephone revenues have increased approximately 164 per cent, but expenses during the same period have gone up approximately 209 per cent. Despite the fact that we have more telephones than 1940, and are handling a greater volume of calls than ever before, the telephone system here is being operated each month at a loss. Rates established twenty years ago simply will not bring in enough revenue to pay present costs of furnishing service.
