## UCRA POSTPONES DISCUSSION OF BRONTE-OAK CREEK PIPELINE

The discussion of the Oak Creek-to-Bronte pipeline was postponed when members of the Upper Colorado River Authority met at San Angelo Wednesday night.

Members of the River Authority met at the Hotel Cactus and were informed by Harry Williams, assistant state auditor, that the UCRA had collected \$32,165 more taxes from Coke and Tom Green County residents than the laws of the state allow.

Williams said, when asked where asked where the money would go that it would "go to the State Treasury."

L. T. Youngblood of Bronte, who

is chairman of the UCRA, asked how much money the River Authority can now depend on. Williams answered that \$76,000 will be forthcoming to the UCRA each year from taxes from the two counties.

No announcement was made as to when the UCRA members would discuss the financing of the Bronte-Oak Creek pipeline.

**Now Against Law to Shoot Air Guns in Town**

Mayor H. O. Whitt said this week he wished to call to the attention of the people of Bronte that it is now against the law to shoot an air gun of any kind in the city limits of any town in Texas.

The law was passed by the Texas Legislature which is still in session. Whitt urged the cooperation of Bronte people in this matter.

## RAIN WELCOME IN COKE AREA

Coke farmers welcomed a general rainfall last Saturday night and Sunday morning of between two and three inches. Local farmers say the rain was one of the best in quite a while and came in time to help the cotton crop along.

The rain also relieved the serious water situation here in Bronte. An estimated year's supply is now on hand with the water from wells and the supply caught in the Bronte lakes.

Bronte reported 2.20 inches of rain while 2.95 fell at Robert Lee.

Three miles west of Bronte, C. B. Webb gauged two inches. Webb reported that his cotton crop was all up and that this good rain meant a lot.

Arthur Winkle received 1 7-8 on his place four miles north of here. Heaviest rainfall on the East Side was south of here where farmers around Tennyson reported 2.5. All farmers contacted were well pleased with the rain as crop prospects are much brighter and water for livestock is now supplied.

Rainfall at other points around the area were San Angelo, 2.14; Blackwell, 2.18; and Ballinger, 2.30.

**Wildcat Staked on Black Place Northeast of Here**

Announcement was made this week that Deeprock Oil Co. has staked location for a wildcat north-east of Bronte on the Charles Black place. Exact location was not obtained. Moore & McMullan have the drilling contract. Rig for the new wildcat was moved in Wednesday afternoon and drilling was scheduled to begin at once. It was unofficially reported that the location would be tested to 6,000 feet.

In the Bronte field Humble No. 1 Will Gideon had reached a total depth of 4,853 feet and rig was moved to the location Thursday. It was moved to the J. L. Brunson lease where another test will be made. A swabbing unit was moved over No. 1 Gideon.

A 24-hour potential of 93.73 barrels of 45.6 gravity oil has been announced for Humble No. 8 R. E. Hickman, field well in the area west of town. The well was completed on the pump. Gas-oil ratio was 324-1 and production was from open hole between 4,285 and 4,344 feet, the total depth.

A southwest extension the West Fort Chadbourne Field was in prospect this week. The Texas Co. No. 1 John W. Harris and others on a 2-hour drillstem test from 5,394 to 5,409 feet showed gas in 12 minutes and recovered 2,700 feet of free oil and 210 feet of gas-out mud. There was no water. Nearest production is Humble No. 1 Wiley-Bolin which is 2,200 feet northeast of No. 1 Harris.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field, Humble No. 34 Sallie M. Odum has been completed for a daily flow of 446.60 barrels of 45 gravity oil plus 3-10 of one per cent water. It is located in E. W. Stokes survey No. 254.

**County Agent Receives Masters Degree at Tech**

County agent Travis B. Hicks was awarded the Master of Science Degree in Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology recently at exercises at Texas Technological college.

Subject of Hick's thesis was "Social and Economic Life of Coke County."

The thesis is a study taken principally from income tax reports of farmers and ranchers in Coke county. Some of the changes which have occurred during the period, 1943 to 1950, with references to farm family living, are shown. As prices of farm products have risen, so have costs of items risen which farmers have had to buy. Increased costs of operations have almost offset any net gains that might have been realized. Labor costs, new farm machinery, and farm repair bills have shown the greatest increases. This study has been useful, even while the data was being compiled, in planning with farmers on their farm and ranch management problems.

The primary objective of the study was to work toward a closer relationship with the farmers and ranchers and to acquire a clearer understanding of their problems. This objective, has, in a measure, been realized.

A secondary objective was to show farmers and ranchers the importance of good records in the business of agriculture.

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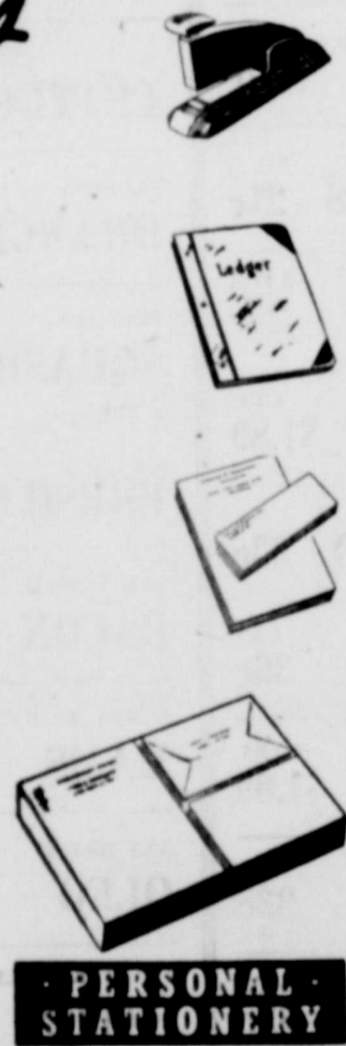

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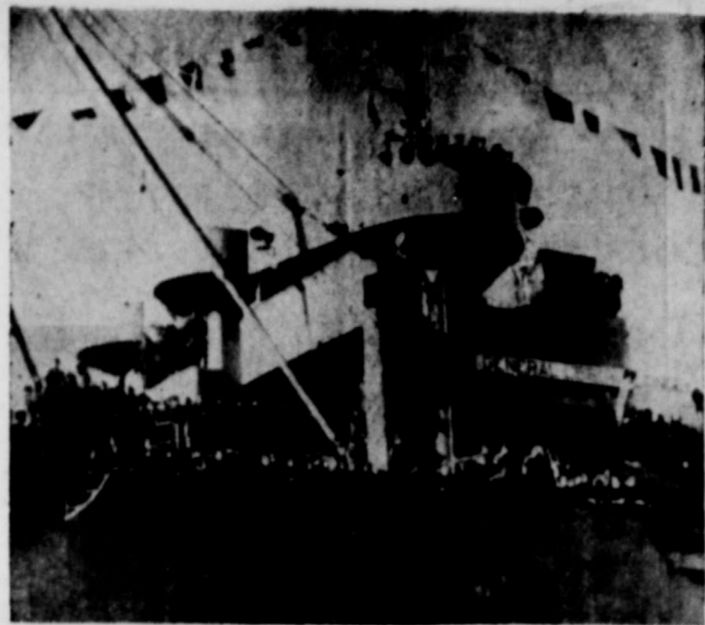
