

## Several Completions And Locations Made

Hickok & Reynolds No. 1 J. V. Rogers, wildcat north of Bronte, was drilling Thursday below 4,100 feet. No shows have been reported.

In the McCutchen (Cisco) field, west of Bronte, Union Oil Co. has staked location for a 4,100 foot test. It will be known as No. 1-A Daisy McCutchen and will be located 330 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the west lines of section 436, block 1-A, H&TC survey.

Los Nietos No. 1 Lee, wildcat southeast of Robert Lee, has been plugged and abandoned at 5,515 feet.

A wildcat has been staked north of Bronte by Stanolind. It will be drilled on the T. P. Carter property and will be located 3 miles west and 2 miles south of Blackwell. Location is near the old Craft well, a shallow producer, which was plugged and abandoned a few years ago. No. 1 will be 600 feet from the south and east lines of section 277-1a-H&TC. The test is scheduled to go to 6,000 feet to test the Ellenburger.

Burdell Oil Co. No. 5 Z. Sowell has been completed for a daily flow of 457 barrels of 43.8 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,047-1. Production was from open hole between 5,334 and 5,385 feet, the total depth. The section was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

Humble staked location for No. 49 Sallie Odom, account 2, 330 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of J. Allen No. 29 1/2 survey. It is to go to 6,000 feet.

Humble No. 56-B Odom is to be 1,696 feet across the Coke county line and 660 feet from the south line of P. Martinez survey 299.

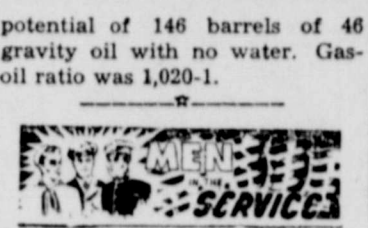
Humble No. 7-C Odom will be located 660 feet from the north and 760 feet from the west lines of A. G. Compton survey 281.

T. J. Neill, 37, of Merkel and Henry Hyde, 39, of Nolan were in a San Angelo hospital Thursday. Neill was suffering a severe head wound and Hyde's left ear was cut off in the accident. Mrs. Neill and Charles Lister of Nolan were treated for minor injuries.

Lister, driving a pickup, was accompanied by Hyde and Frosty Lynn. Lister said he swerved to miss a cow crossing the highway and collided with the 1951 Ford driven by Neill. Neill was accompanied by his wife and baby. The baby slid off into the floor and escaped injury. The Neills were enroute to San Angelo to see Mrs. Neill's father who is ill in a San Angelo hospital.

The accident was investigated by Highway Patrolman John Marion who said that charges will be filed against Lister for driving on the left-hand side of the road while not in passing.

## Dist. Attorney to Rule on Hospital

District Attorney Earl Smith is expected this week to rule on the legality of a petition, bearing 227 signatures, asking the Coke county commissioners court to dismiss the present hospital board. In a lengthy and oft time heated session Monday, the commissioners debated the question and requested an opinion from County Attorney Frank Dickey.

County Judge Jeff Dean read Dickey's legal interpretation of the question which said in part: "The commissioners court of Coke County is neither required nor authorized to act upon the petition," and stating that "mem-

In a special session of the Court Thursday afternoon, the Commissioners voted 3-1 to take no action on the petitions. District Attorney Earl Smith's opinion on the matter was read and in effect confirmed the opinion rendered earlier by Frank Dickey. Next step, if any, for the petitioners, is district court.

Members of the Coke County Hospital Board are officers of the federal and state governments" and that "the commissioners court does not have the authority to remove any member of the hospital board from office. This power is vested by law in the district court."

The court then agreed to pass the question to Smith for a second opinion before taking any further action.

## PRICE CLINIC AUGUST 22

The Fort Worth OPS has announced a "Price Clinic" for local merchants in Bronte, for a Monday on Wednesday, August 22.

The clinic will begin at 1:00 p. m. and last until 5:00 p. m. on that date in the city hall and is intended for all businessmen regardless of their type of business, said Elis H. Boyd, district OPS director.

"We are making every effort to supply the business community with down-to-earth information about the price stabilization program, and the regulations affecting them," Boyd said. At the same time, Boyd announced several changes in the price stabilization regulations now in effect.

He stated that the OPS has amended its general manufacturing regulation CPR 22 by excluding from its definition of a manufacturer persons who merely rebuild, recondition, renovate, or re-use a used commodity. For example, Boyd said, engine rebuilders are not covered by the regulation.

"Other OPS actions place ceiling prices on lubricants and greases and on asphalt and asphalt products," he said. "CPR 63 establishes ceiling prices on wholesale sales of lubricating oils, petroleum products, and other petroleum products while CPR 66 sets ceiling prices on asphalt and asphalt products."

The OPS official said that a regulation having more effect on the cost of living has been issued placing the 1951 pack of canned salmon under ceiling prices. The prices stipulated in the regulation are generally lower than under the General Ceiling Price Regulation, he stated.



**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 88**  
proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein; and providing that the administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and canvassing of the proposition therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new section to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State on to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one marked which expresses his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution of proposed amendments therefor.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees" the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas and proclamation shall be made by the Governor therefor.
