8 Locations Made in Ft. Chad. Field; No. 1 Rogers Abandoned

Humble has staked locations for eight more tests in the Fort Chadbourne Field. All are to be drilled with rotary and are scheduled to go to 6,000 feet.

Railroad Hearing To Be August 29 At Sweetwater

H. O. Whitt, local Santa Fe agent, said this week that a hearing will be held at Sweetwater on August 29, at which time Santa Fe will request permission from the railroad commission of Texas to stop temporarily the passenger train service which serves Bronte. Purpose of the request, Whitt said, is to give the railroad company time to raise their roadbed over the new Oak Creek lake, north and east of here.

Whitt said that freight train service will be continued on the same schedule as is now in effect. He added that he understood that some arrangement will be made to bring the mail to Bronte by bus when the passenger trains stop running.

Water from the Oak Creek lake will back up to where the railroad now stands when the flood gates are closed. Consequently, the railroad and highway between Bronte and Blackwell and the railroad between Bronte and Blackwell both have to be raised several feet.

Whitt said that anyone who objects to the temporary halt of service in passenger trains will be heard at the Sweetwater meeting on the date mentioned above.

LAST RITES CONDUCTED FOR MRS. H. P. FANCHER COKE PIONEER

Funeral services were held here Monday afternoon for Mrs. H. P. Fancher, 86, who died Sunday night in the Karen-Gay hospital after an illness of several months. Rites were conducted in the First Methodist church with the pastor, Rev. J. E. Fuller, officiating.

Burial was in the Old Fort Chadbourne cemetery under the direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Mrs. Fancher came to this area in 1877 while it was still a part of Tom Green county, and settled on Oak Creek about one mile south of Fort Chadbourne. She was married to H. P. Sancher on November 11, 1883. Mr. Fancher preceded her in death some years ago.

Mrs. Fancher was believed to have been the oldest living resident of Coke county, in terms of years in the county, at the time of her death. She was one of the few pioneers living who had en-

dured the Indian raids, common to this area some 67 years ago.

Survivors include three sons and three daughters, Lee Fancher of Rotan, Clay Fancher of Portales, New Mexico, Floyd Fancher of Bronte, Mrs. Vada Henry of Blackwell, Mrs. Iva Richards and Mrs. Elsie Lasswell of Fort Chadbourne. Also surviving are 21 grandchildren and several great-grandchildren.

Helping Families Rebuild Is Red Cross' Main Flood Task

Throughout the Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Illinois flood area 425 trained Red Cross disaster workers assisted by hundreds of chapter volunteers are engaged in the Red Cross' biggest part of its disaster job, helping more than 26,000 families back to normal restoring homes, furniture, livelihoods for those without means to help themselves. All help is given outright, not lent. Flood relief contributions to local Red Cross chapters will finance this help, now costing almost double the original \$5,000,000 Red Cross estimate. This help to individual families is not included in the \$25,000,000 authorized by Congress for restoration of public works, essential businesses, etc.

"Everybody is invited," was what Legion Commander Louis Bridges said concerning the big community barbecue to be held here Tuesday evening. The affair will be held at the City Park at 7 p. m. and the George Scott Post of the American Legion is sponsoring it.

BRONTE SOLDIER WRITES HOME INTERESTING ACCOUNT OF TRIP

Below are various quotes taken from a series of letters written by Pvt. Cecil Coalson during his voyage across the Atlantic and during the first few weeks that he spent in Europe. Coalson son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Coalson, is now on duty patrolling the Russian Border.

Sunday, July 29: "On arriving in New York, we took a ferry boat across the Bay to our ship. We went right by the Statue of Liberty. The Old Lady will look much better to me when I am coming in towards her than when we were leaving."

Monday, July 30: "We are about 500 miles out. I can tell the water is rougher and more are getting sick. The chow has been real good. We had ice cream and fried chicken for dinner along with other things. I will write again, later since my head is swimming."

Tuesday, July 31: "Just finished a four hour guard shift. I haven't been sick yet, just dizzy headed."

Wednesday, August 1: "Well, it is past pay day and no pay yet. I still have \$25. It makes you feel good to know you have some money if you did want to buy something."

Thursday, August 2: "Another day gone by and it has really been a long one. We will probably be able to see land when we get up Sat. morning. I wouldn't take anything for what I have seen, but I wouldn't give a dime to do it all over again."

Saturday, August 4: "We passed by the Coast of England this evening. We saw the 'White

Cliffs' of Dover. This morning we turned in our money for German currency. If things hold out with Russia, I guess my days in the Army will be well spent. I am having a wonderful time and I am learning a lot about this part of the world."

Monday, August 6: "Docked at Bremerhaven this evening about one. Just got back from supper. Germans in white suits waived on us. It was sure swell."

Wednesday, August 8: "I believe that Germany is the most beautiful country that I have ever seen. I was never so surprised to see a country like this. I wish you could have seen the mess hall here—just like a big hotel. So far, I wouldn't begin to trade overseas duty for duty in the U. S. We came south into Germany over 300 miles. I have never seen better farms. Wheat and oats are head high and there are lots of fat Holsteins here. The only thing they need here is equipment to work with. Everybody here from little Junior to great-grandmother rides a bicycle."

Thursday, August 9: "Tomorrow we will have our teeth worked over. I will write you the painful results if I am able. I still have \$20 in American money. It is just as useless to me as a Sears, Roebuck catalogue would be. Last night I loaned my last German dollar out on a two for one deal and later got the \$2 back. Some guys want money bad enough about pay day to give 100 percent interest."

August 10: "It has been about two months since we have been

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 28 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such counties; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51F of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

SECTION 1. THAT ARTICLE XVI OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, BE AMENDED BY ADDING THEREAFTER A NEW SECTION TO BE NUMBERED SECTION 63, WHICH SHALL READ AS FOLLOWS:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51F of Article III.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments therein.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees" the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.
