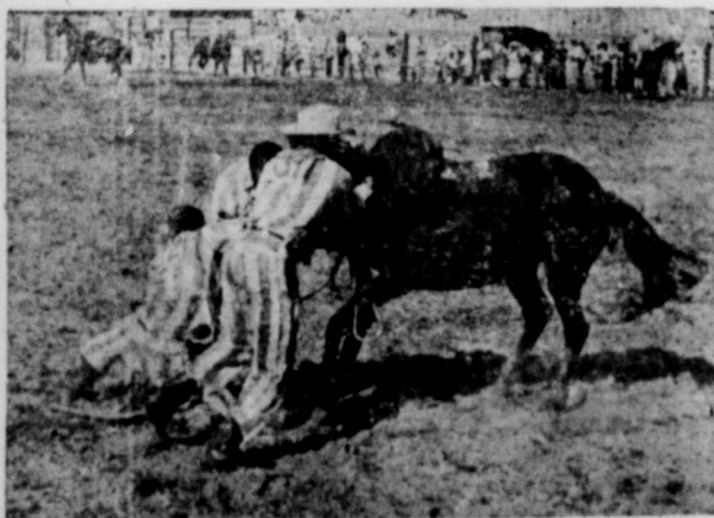

Several Completions, Made in Bronte Area

Oil news in the Bronte vicinity was looking good this week with several completions in the area.

Lester Rice, Inc., of Abilene has filed application for a permit to drill his No. 1 Dr. R. J. Warren, southwest of Bronte. The wildcat will be drilled to 6,500 feet and will be located 1,495 feet from the most northerly southwest line, and 660 feet from the most northerly southeast line of John Johnson survey 966½.

The test will be 2½ miles south and slightly east of the McCutchen (Ciseco) Field, and 4½ miles west of Bronte (Palo Pinto) Field.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field, Currie & Wylie No. 7 Mrs. J. F. Currie has been completed for a daily flow of 365.78 barrels of 45.7 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 974-1. Location is in Gray Carroll survey 284.

Humble No. 58-B Sallie Odum was finished for a 24-hour flow of 397.26 barrels of 45.9 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 79-1. Location is in Gray Carroll survey 285.

Flowing 449.55 barrels of 46.5 gravity oil in 24 hours, Humble No. 56-B Odum has been completed. Gas-oil ratio was 713-1. It is in P. Martinez survey 299. Humble No. 61-B Odum flowed

428.30 barrels of 44.3 gravity oil in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 721-1 and location is in John Bird survey 469.

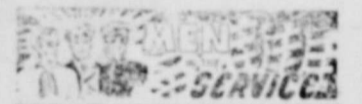

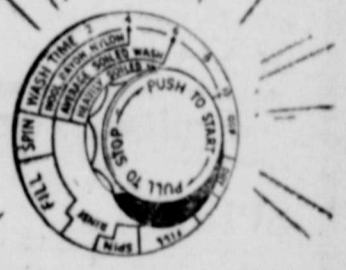

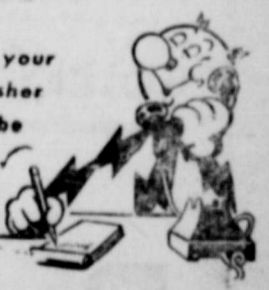
