Dimmitt To Get Large Modern Tourist Court

A building permit was issued this week to Jack Cowsert and John Broadstreet, by the City of Dimmitt, for the construction of the Dimmitt Tourist Courts on Highway 51 in South Dimmitt. According to a statement by Mr. Broadstreet who will manage the enterprise' the courts will consist of sixteen units, all to be modern and complete in every respect. Present plans are to have eight of the units ready for occupancy by January 15th and the others are to be completed by March 15. Mr. Broadstreet has had extensive experience in operating tourist courts, having been in that business for the past several years.

Farm Bureau To Hold Membership Meeting Thursday

A membership meeting of the Castro County Farm Bureau will be held Thursday, December 1, at 8:00 p. m. in the Dimmitt High School auditorium. According to a statement by E. L. Ivey, secretary, officers and directors of the organization will be elected for the ensuing year. He also stated that local delegates to the State Farm Bureau Convention, which was held in Dallas on November 21-23, will make reports on the activities of the State organization. An entertainment program for the meeting is also being planned and members and their families are urged to attend and the public is invited. Refreshments will be served following the meeting.

Southern Baptists Calls For 1950

Southern Baptists plans calls for \$25,000,000 in gifts in 1950 to be distributed throughout its cooperative mission plan, the Cooperative Program, which celebrates its 25th anniversary next year, according to Dr. Duke K. McCall, executive secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee.

"The 1950 Cooperative Program goal for Convention agencies is \$10,000,000," said Dr. McCall. "Based on actual receipts by states and S.B.C. causes in 1948, this would require \$15,000,000 for state causes, or a total of \$25,000,000 for the Cooperative Program, state and Southwide, in 1950.

"While holding fast to the 'Fifty-Fifty by 1950' ideal for division between gifts to the local church program and the Cooperative Program we must recognize that many churches make their gifts to the Cooperative Program by a direct appropriation rather than a percentage. To those churches which will not be able to go all of the way in realization of the fifty-fifty goal, we would issue the challenge to increase their gifts to the Cooperative Program in 1950 by 40 percent."

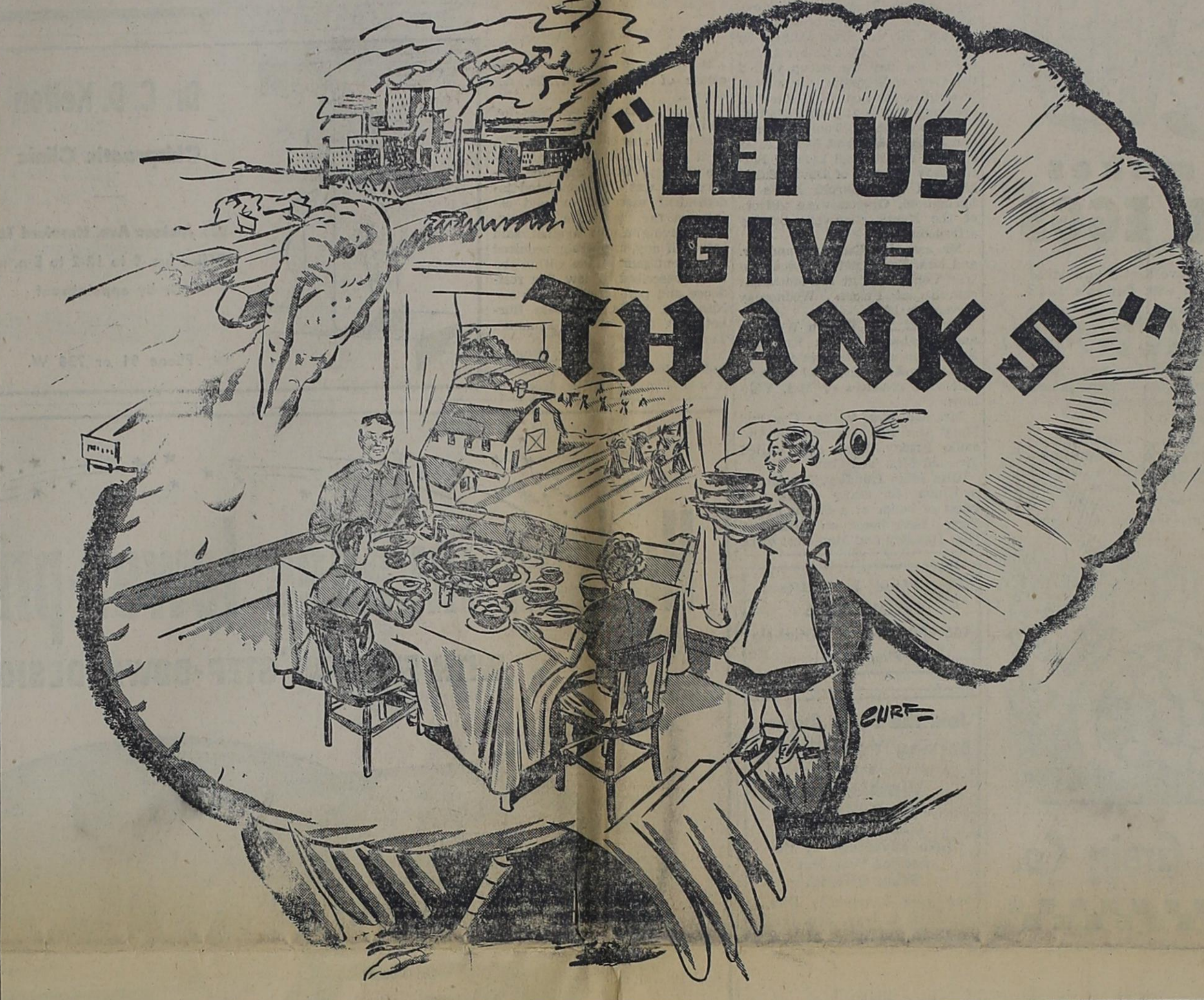

Treatment of Common Cold Discussed

Austin, Texas—Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer declares there's hardly anyone who hasn't caught cold at one time or another. The common cold is common indeed! Besides making you feel miserable, colds steal your time and your money. They fool you, too, because the early signs are often the same as those of more serious illnesses. And long-continued colds may pave the way for an attack of pneumonia, tuberculosis, or a chronic infection of the nose, throat, ears, or sinuses. So, do your best to keep from catching cold. And if you do catch one, take proper care of yourself so you can get rid of it.

When you have a cold:

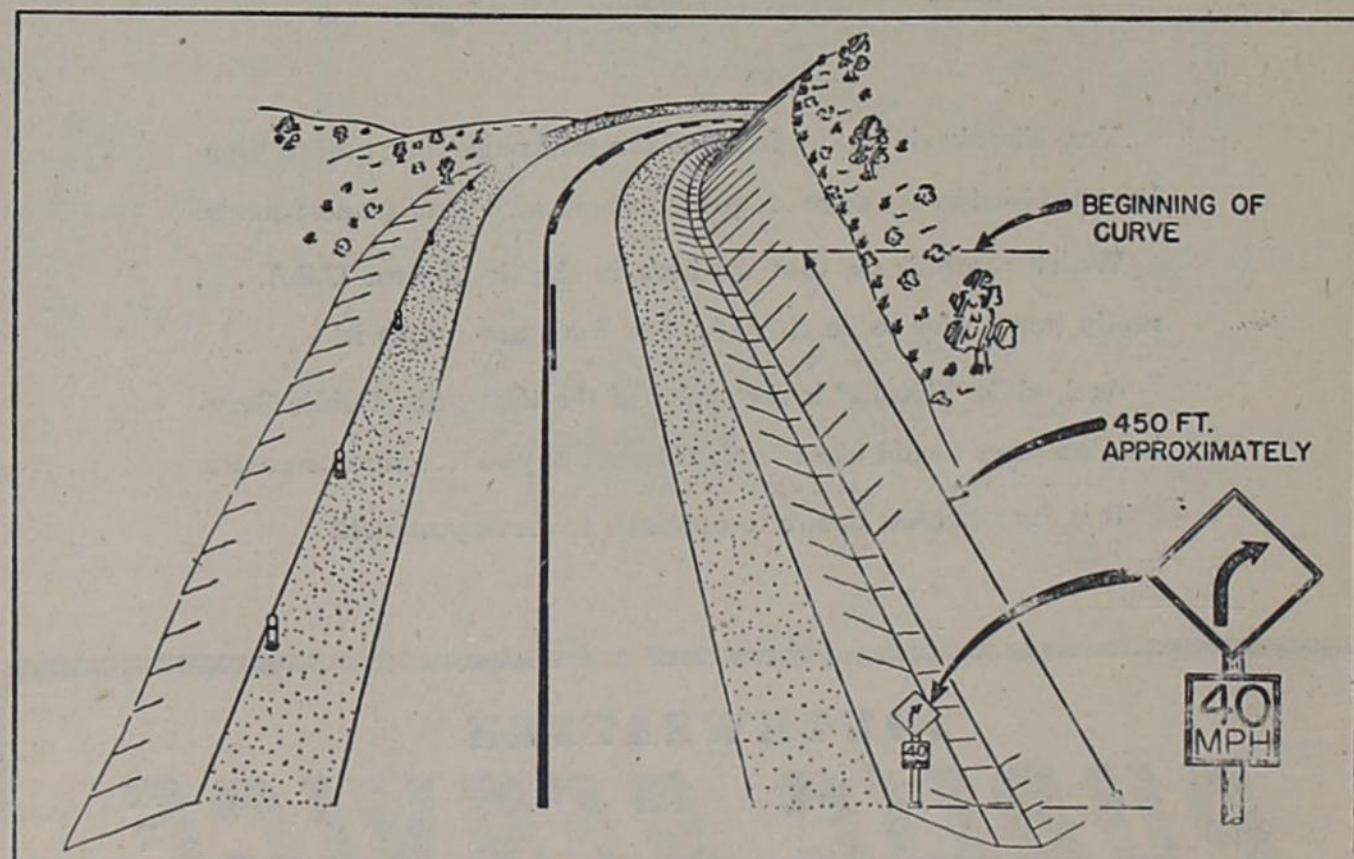
1. Get as much rest as possible. Stay indoors for the first day or so if you can.
2. Keep comfortably warm and dry. If you must go to work, wear clothes that will protect you adequately when you go outdoors, and avoid drafts and sudden chilling when overheated.
3. Drink plenty of citrus fruit juices, water, and other liquids. Eat simple foods which agree with you.
4. Protect other people as much as possible. Cover your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze. Use paper handkerchiefs or paper napkins that can be burned. Wash your hands frequently with soap and water.
5. Blow your nose gently. If you don't, you may force infected material from your nose into your sinuses or middle ear and develop sinus trouble or serious ear infection.
6. If a cold starts with chills, fever, or aching, or seems more severe, or lasts longer than usual, consult a physician without delay.

New Highway Signs Caution Motorists As To Maximum Safe Speed



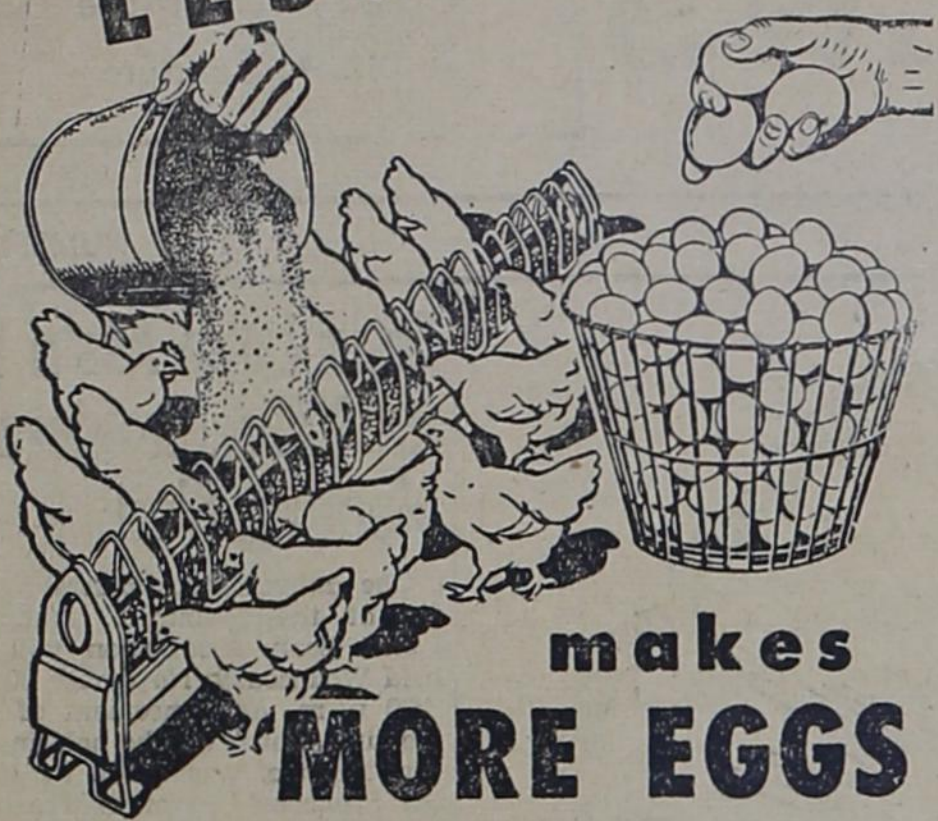
Austin, Texas November 14—A view like the one pictured has now been in existence on most Texas Highways for the past few months. This type of highway sign serves to warn of the maximum safe and comfortable speed for curves and turns.

These signs are part of a program of advisory speed zoning by the Texas Highway Department and represent a step recommended by the Governor's Highway Safety Conference.

Motorists who utilize the speed advised on these signs have found that there is no side-throw in their cars at this speed.

The speed indicated on the sign was determined by a scientific study of each individual curve and turn, and will vary because of the different elements such as degree of turn and the amount of bank on each separate curve.

Anniversary Gift SPORTS AFIELD

Whether you hunt in the northern wilderness or near home, the one thing on which you may depend is that the habits of white-tailed deer are everywhere very much the same. Dr. William J. Long, one of our best known naturalists, has for many years studied the whitetail during different seasons as well as in widely separated localities. So he feels quite safe in setting down a few conclusions, which he calls an ABC primer of deer ways.

Deer, unless much disturbed, cover a good part of their range every day to feed or just move around and they travel by regular runway. If you wait by any runway or feeding ground, you have a chance not only to see a deer but to hear him coming. The only requirement is to be quiet, absolutely quiet.

When the weather becomes too cold to stay motionless, then stalk but change your gait. At any regular rustle or crunch a deer knows that someone is walking toward him. But if after every short advance you stop for a longer period, that is something new in the woods, and every wild animal is so curious about a new thing he may approach to find out about it.

Dr. Long thinks any man could walk down a deer, or at least get within shooting distance by simply taking his time about it. A startled but unharmed deer does not run out of the township before stopping. His range is not country-wide, but only a mile or two in diameter, and when he comes to its limit in any direction he invariably turns back.

For every buck you jump there is probably another, maybe two or three, that you do not see or hear. A deer bolts only when he sees or scents you coming straight at him. If he thinks you will pass at a safe distance he will stay where he is; or if you are coming too close for his comfort he will sneak silently away to another hideout.

A startled buck expects you to follow right on his trail. Do the unexpected by following far to one side of the trail; at intervals circle in to where you can see it and so catch the buck when he is looking for you in a different direction.

A feeder deer lifts his head two or three times every minute for a quick look around. Move slowly toward him when his head is down and freeze just before he lifts it. If he catches you moving, don't crouch or try to hide. Without a halt move quietly at a broad angle that will take you to one side of the buck; don't turn your head to look at him; keep going till you are behind an outcropping ledge or a dense thicket; then stop and creep back while the buck waits for you to appear on the other side! He is not a patient waiter, and the chances are about even that curiosity will impel him to come out of concealment in order to see where you have gone. But if he bolts, then try the fascinating game of walking him down.

Books In The Library

Change your thoughts, says Dr. Peale, and you change your world. He does not merely exhort you to substitute confident faith for negative self-destroying thoughts. He shows you how, particularly in the chapters on marital happiness and on meeting sorrow.

"A Guide to Confident Living" is written in "plain talk" style, packed with examples, practical in spirit, scientific and religious in outlook. Its aim is to help the reader to more energy, a bolder outlook, and a rock-like confidence that he can master his problems. Dr. Peale's prescription for confidence is not a sedative but a stimulant to a health.

Livestock numbers should be adjusted to fit the grazing capacity of the range and this should be based on the number and amount of good grasses present. Low producing and poor quality animals eat more than their share of the range vegetation. They should be replaced with quality livestock.
