UNTY CO OCALRREL ALeta Secretary of State John Ben Sheppard stated in a report to Dr. J. K. Griffith, Robert Lee, Chairman of the Coke County Voluntary Parole Board, that the Texas Voluntary Parole System is functioning economically and satisfactorily.

Sheppard reported that when he assumed the duties of Secreary of State in Feb., 1950, there were 600 parolees unaccounted for in Texas. He commended the Texas Voluntary board members for their assistance in enabling the Department to reduce the number of missing parolees to 60.
