## Bronte Falls to Hobbs Panthers Friday; Meet Loraine Tonight

The Bronte Longhorns suffered defeat at the hands of the Hobbs Panthers Friday night on the Hobbs gridiron, with a score of 19-0.

Hobbs' excellent holding on the line stopped an opening passing attack from Bronte. Midway in the first period, Hobbs End Neves completed a pass and ran seventy yards for the first score of the game. Eaton made the extra

point on a run through center. Bronte used the quick kick several times on the third down. Hobbs lost yardage on several passes through center.

In a passing attack in the second quarter, Masters of Hobbs ran ten yards for a touchdown on a pass play. Conversion failed and Hobbs led 13-0 at the end of the first half.

Although no points were racked up in the third quarter, both of the teams played excellent ball. Masters opened the fourth period with a touchdown on a pass run around end. Again conversion failed, and the final score was 19-0.

Captains for Bronte for the game were Jimmy Gray and Billy Paul Thomason. Brigman was the only Longhorn injured in the game, and he was soon back in play after a leg injury.

Tonight's game is expected to be another tough battle. The Longhorns journey to Loraine for another conference tilt. Coach

Jolley's boys are in good shape, but are facing a heavy and highly favored eleven.

The Robert Lee Steers last week took a 27-0 victory over the Loraine eleven in a tough game at Robert Lee. The Steers are the only team in the conference that remain undefeated in conference play.

## Copeland Land Is Purchased By City of Sweetwater

The City of Sweetwater agreed Wednesday to pay \$90,000 to Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Copeland and Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Copeland for their land in Coke county needed for the Oak Creek Lake Site.

Although the Copelands will retain mineral rights on the land, the city gets outright ownership of 416 acres, rights on the adjoining 72 acres, flood easement on 160 acres and severance damages on 3464 acres.

This completes transactions on all the 3000 acres of land needed for the site except one 177 acre tract, on which negotiations are now being made.

Work is proceeding on the new highway and railroad crossing over the lake. Nineteen miles of 21 inch pipe from the lake to the top of Callahan Divide was recently completed.

The lake is expected to be completed and begin impounding water by the first of next year. Bronte will receive its water supply from the new lake.

## MORE THAN 2 1/4 MILLION DOLLARS ON DEPOSIT AT BRONTE BANK

Deposits for the First National Bank in Bronte reached one of the highest points they have ever been as of October 10, when the Comptroller of the Currency called for a report. The local deposits totaled \$2,274,413.44 on that date.

Deposits at last report on June 30 totaled \$2,160,823.50, which is an increase of \$113,589.94 during the last quarter. Deposits on Oct. 4, 1950 were \$2,031,431.73 which shows an increase of \$242,981.71 during the past year.

Since October, 1950 total assets of the bank have increased from \$2,160,135.81 to \$2,427,830.56, an increase of \$267,694.75. Likewise loans made by the bank have increased. Money out to borrowers on Oct. 10 amounted to \$810,876.50 compared with \$563,547.60 on Oct. 4, 1950, an increase of \$247,328.90.

During the past year a change has also been made in the capital structure of the bank. Capital stock remains at \$50,000.00 but the surplus fund has been increased to \$75,000. Undivided profits on Oct. 10 amounted to \$28,417.12.

## New Almanacs Will Be On Sale At Enterprise

There has been almost as much economic progress in Texas during the last ten years as in all preceding history, according to data in the 1952-53 edition of the Texas Almanac which has just been issued by the Dallas Morning News.

Highest percentage of gain was scored by the manufacturing industry which more than doubled during the last decade, as measured in employment and volume of physical production. The number working in Texas manufacturing plants increased from 163,978 in April, 1949, to 449,800 in June, 1951. All classifications of industry showed gains, but especially notable were developments of the chemical, aviation, and iron and steel industries.

Retail stores of the state now do approximately seven billion dollars of business annually as compared with \$1,803,716,000 in 1939. This leaves a wide margin of increase in turnover of goods after allowing for price inflation. These changes have been accompanied by an increase of 20.2 per cent in total population, 1940-1950, and with an increase of 66.2 per cent in urban population. The great shift of rural to urban population consisted primarily of removal of tenant farmers to industrial centers.

Figures presented in the new Texas Almanac show comparable gains in civic, educational and cultural activities. Changes in the public school system after two years under the Gilmer-Aiken act are presented, including tables giving data on all independent and common school districts.

About 10,000 subjects are covered in the new volume, including Texas history, population, government, politics and elections, natural resources, weather, crops and livestock, industries, trade, transportation, finance, commercial services, recreation and athletics. A pronunciation guide to names of Texas counties, cities, and towns is included. The new state senatorial and representative districts are shown.

All articles and maps for the 254 Texas Counties have been revised to include new highways and other developments. A large folded map gives detail in four colors, including highways and railroads.

A stock of the new almanacs have been ordered by the Enterprise and are expected in time to be offered for sale this week end.

## SHEPPARD PRAISES PAROLE BOARD MEMBERS OF COKE

UNTY CO OCALRREL Aleta Secretary of State John Ben Sheppard stated in a report to Dr. J. K. Griffith, Robert Lee, Chairman of the Coke County Voluntary Parole Board, that the Texas Voluntary Parole System is functioning economically and satisfactorily.

Sheppard reported that when he assumed the duties of Secretary of State in Feb., 1950, there were 600 parolees unaccounted for in Texas. He commended the Texas Voluntary board members for their assistance in enabling the Department to reduce the number of missing parolees to 60.
