Funeral Held Here Monday Afternoon For Mrs. Chapman

Funeral services for Mrs. O. W. Chapman, 69, were held at 2 p. m. Monday from the First Methodist church here. Interment was in the Fairview cemetery under the direction of Cliff Funeral Home.

The Reverend J. E. Fuller read the services and the music was played by Mrs. John McMillan, organist from San Angelo. The choir was composed of friends.

Mrs. Chapman was born June 30, 1882 at Georgetown, Texas and attended high school and the Academy at Cherokee, Texas. She was married to O. W. Chapman on December 28, 1907.

She is the former Miss Julia M. Altizer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Altizer. She was a member of the Christian church.

Except for a brief period in San Angelo, Mrs. Chapman had made her home in and near here since 1913. She was an active member in the Senior Home demonstration club, the Woman's Progressive club and a teacher in the Methodist Sunday school.

Mrs. Chapman died at 4 a. m. Sunday morning, November 11, in the Karen-Gay hospital here after being hospitalized for about three weeks. Her death was attributed to a heart ailment.

Third Pay Discovered in Bronte Field; Flows at Rate of 736 Bbls.

Bronte oil circles were aghast this week with talk of the new and third pay which has been discovered in the Bronte field about 1 1/2 miles west of town.

The discovery was made on the field test, Humble Gas Unit No. 1 and is situated on the property of R. E. Hickman. The first test which produced oil was taken on Nov. 10. Section tested was from 4,840 to 4,855 feet in the Goens lime. Gas came to the surface in 11 minutes but the well did not

flow. However, when the drillstem was broken down 4,500 feet of clean oil and 100 feet of heavy oil and gas cut mud were recovered.

A second test was run on Nov. 11 and the section tested was from 4,855 to 4,867 feet. Gas came to the surface in 4 minutes and oil began to flow in 11 minutes. Estimated rate of flow was 736 barrels per day. The oil tested 46 gravity. Prior to the test a core was cut from this section

in which there were four feet of porous lime with good oil showing.

A third test was run Wednesday, Nov. 14 on a section from 4,867 to 4,882 feet. Gas came to well again kicked off and flowed the surface in 4 minutes and the in 43 minutes.

Operator's immediate plans on Wednesday were to core another 20 feet and if further oil showing is encountered another drillstem test is to be run. Present plans

call for further drilling until the gas section is hit at about 5,050 feet. This well when started was planned to be a gasser and a representative of Humble said that so far as he knew no changes would be made in the original plans. However, he did say that careful exploration would be made in the remaining drilling.

Better than 40 feet of pay section has already been tested and found to contain oil. Cree Drilling Co. has the contract for the well.

WILDCAT STAKED

A wildcat has been staked on the E. C. Rawlings Estate six miles north of Bronte. R. A. Jolley, Inc., of Houston No. 1 Rawlings will be 330 feet from the north and east lines of section 365, block 1-A, H&TC survey. The test is projected to 6,500 feet, and drilling is scheduled to begin at once.

The test will be six miles north of the Bronte field and 1 3/8ths miles southeast of Lion No. 1 Rawlings, a failure which was plugged and abandoned last April.

BRONTE FIELD

In the Bronte field, the daily potential for Humble No. 4-C J. L. Brunson has been announced as 51.71 barrels of 46 gravity oil per day. The well is located in the southeast part of the field in N. Eastland survey. Gas-oil ratio for the test was 286-1; the well was completed on the pump.

In the Coke sector of the Fort Chadbourne Field Stanolind No. 3 Edna Wylie has been completed for a daily flow of 196.43 barrels of 45 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 809-1. It is located in Pedro Martinez survey 299.

Stanolind No. 1 Carter, wildcat northwest of here was at 6,507 feet in Ellenburger early this week.

In the McCutchen field west of town, Union No. 1 Mrs. Elizabeth McCutchen has been completed for a daily flow of 187.2 barrels of 42.5 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 205-1.

The Chicago Corp. of Abilene has filed an amended application as the operator of No. 1 Dr. R. J. Warren. It was originally filed as Lester Rice, Inc., No. 1 Warren. The wildcat is located in John Johnson survey 966 1/2.

Meanwhile, Lester Rice has purchased a new rotary drilling rig and will engage in the drilling business. The first location for the new equipment is expected to be the Warren wildcat location.

Tickets for the banquet are \$2.50 each and this includes a ticket to the football game. Everyone who ever attended school in the Bronte school is urged to come. Net proceeds of

the affair are to be applied to the bleacher fund.

Reservations were to have been in Wednesday, but there will still be some tickets on sale at the door tonight. The general committee, composed of Edward Cumbe, Mrs. Le Drew Arrott and Norman Kiker, has announced that several out-of-town reservations have been received.

HERMLEIGH DEFEATS BRONTE TO TAKE TOP PLACE IN DISTRICT 5-B

Hermleigh got into the district 5B lead Friday night when they beat the Bronte Longhorns 25-13 on the Longhorn gridiron. It was a still, perfect football night and the Bronte fans enjoyed the new bleachers installed last week.

On the kickoff, Waldrop took Hermleigh's long, low kick to the 40 yard line. A few minutes later, Hermleigh's Cooper scored on a pass from Chitsey, with the conversion failing.

Bronte opened the second quarter with a passing attack, and J. O. Bagwell scored on a short pass by Lyndon Waldrop. Bagwell's kick was good and Bronte led the visitors 7-6 at half-time. In the same quarter, Waldrop

intercepted a pass and made a long run, but the play was called back on an offside penalty.

The third quarter brought another touchdown for the Cardinals when Wahl drove through center for about one yard. The pass for the extra point was good. Lyndon Waldrop faked a pass, and ran 20 yards for the tying score. The point play was fumbled, making the score 13-13.

The visitors went way in the lead in the fourth quarter when they scored twice, once on a short drive through center, and once on a left end play. Both points failed and the final score was 25-13 in Hermleigh's favor.

With Trent beating Robert Lee 14-6 Friday night, Hermleigh's win put them in first place in the district contests. The district champions will be determined for sure in Hermleigh tonight when Trent and Hermleigh tangle.

Bronte and Robert Lee play their final games of the season here in Bronte tonight. Game time is 8 o'clock. It is the first annual homecoming for the local high school and a large crowd is expected out to see these traditional rivals meet. Bronte defeated the Steers 12 to 7 in an earlier game this year at Robert Lee. The Steers will be putting forth the best they have to even the score.

Small Turnout in Amendment Vote

Bronte had a light turnout of voters in the special election at the City Hall Tuesday. Only 49 voters came to the polls to vote on five proposed amendments to the State Constitution.

Bronte voted with the rest of the county and the state in turning down all the amendments except the veterans land appropriation increase.

The amendments and the local vote were as follows:

Amendment 1, on disability pensions for county employees, was defeated in the city election 35-8.

Amendment 2, concerning the University fund, also met defeat 24-15.

Amendment 3, on rural fire prevention, was voted down 27-12.

Amendment 4, The veterans Land Fund question, was the only amendment that carried in the city voting, 25-18.

Amendment 5, On assistance to needy persons, was voted down by a narrow margin of 21-19.

Robert Lee also reported a light vote, 46, with other voting boxes reporting as follows: Tennyson 18, Ft. Chadbourne 12, Juniper 13, Walnut 9, and Wildcat 8.

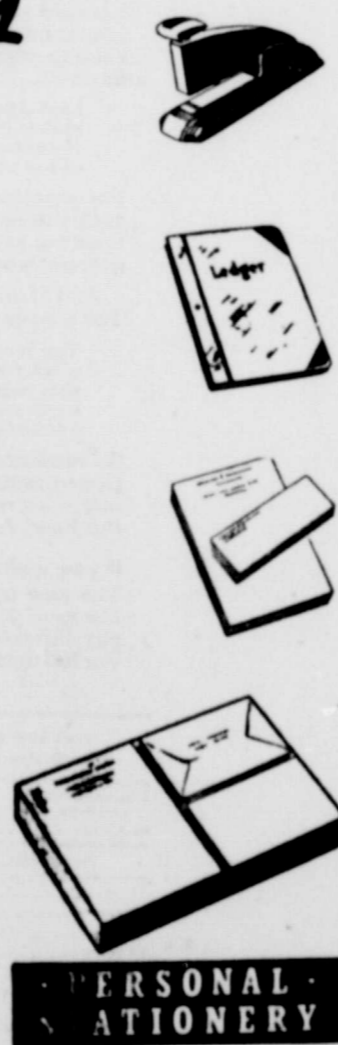

Parents Problems

By DONALD M. MAYNARD

My five-year-old daughter is bossy, stubborn, defiant, and argues so much with her father and me. The subject may be toys, candy, or bedtime. After using up all other resources known to us we usually try a few slaps. We invariably have more trouble. Now our three-year-old son is beginning to copy her antics. My husband says we must be more severe. Then we argue, (after the children go to bed), I'm worried that such punishment may result in more resentment followed up by fear or hate. What do you think?

Whether or not your worries are justified depends largely upon the feelings of rapport you and your husband have with your daughter. If the three of you have many good times together and if she feels secure in your affection and in assurance that you are proud of her, she probably can take those occasional slaps and even an occasional argument without its causing a great deal of resentment on her part.

I realize, of course, that a brief question or description, such as you have given, does not present an accurate picture of a family group. If your description is accurate, however, and your method of dealing with your daughter is primarily that of arguing and punishing, you have every reason to be disturbed. She is likely to grow in her resentment and hostility toward you and your husband. These attitudes, furthermore, probably will be accompanied by a sense of guilt, which, in turn, may lead to further undesirable behavior.

Many times attention has been directed in this column to the growing feeling of independence that characterizes five-year-old children. It has been noted, too, that this desire to be independent frequently leads these children to be bossy, stubborn, defiant, and argumentative. Your daughter, therefore, fits this description beautifully! It may well be, however, that in addition to this factor, your daughter has resented the attention you necessarily have had to give to her three-year-old brother. In fact, I get the impression that she may not be too certain of your affection and that she feels that you are disappointed in her.

If there is any likelihood of this being true, make special efforts to help her feel that you really do love her and are proud of her. Be understanding and patient. Realize that arguing and spanking do not get at the source of the difficulty. In fact, they multiply your problems.

For whatever comfort it may be, let it be said that in six months or a year your daughter probably will be much less bossy and stubborn. You will continue to have problems, though!

Our first baby is now eight months old and I am interested in finding a book which is written by a respected authority on the development and behavior patterns which may be expected of infants and children as they grow. I need something that deals specifically with each age and with the concerns of that age (i.e., toilet training, etc.). I should also like suggestions for creative activities with the different ages. Have you suggestions, aside from Spock's *Pocket Book of Baby and Child Care* (Pocket Books, 35 cents), which I have? Would you recommend Gesell and his two volumes?

The books by Gesell (*The First Five Years of Life* (Hoeber, \$4.50) and *How a Baby Grows* (Hoeber, \$2.50)), two of his well-known books on children, are excellent and I believe you would find them helpful.

The book by Powdermaker and Grimes entitled *Children in the Family* deals with the physical and mental and emotional life of babies and growing children and contains many excellent and helpful suggestions. Unfortunately, this book is out of print, but you can probably find it in your public library.

A book by Flanders Dunbar entitled *Your Child's Mind and Body* (Random House, \$2.95) has real significance for parents. She deals specifically with toilet training and other problems of child guidance that are not always dealt with in other books.

Creative Activities, by Rebecca Rice, published by the Pilgrim Press in Boston (\$3.50), would provide you with suggestions in this area.

As you know, there are any number of fine books in the field of child development and the ones mentioned above are simply ones that I am sure you would find to be helpful.

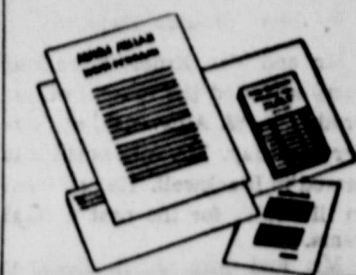

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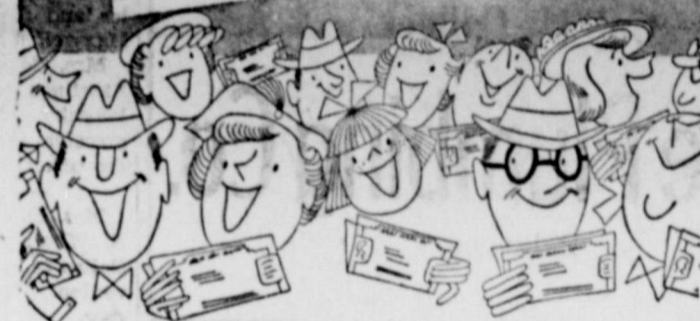

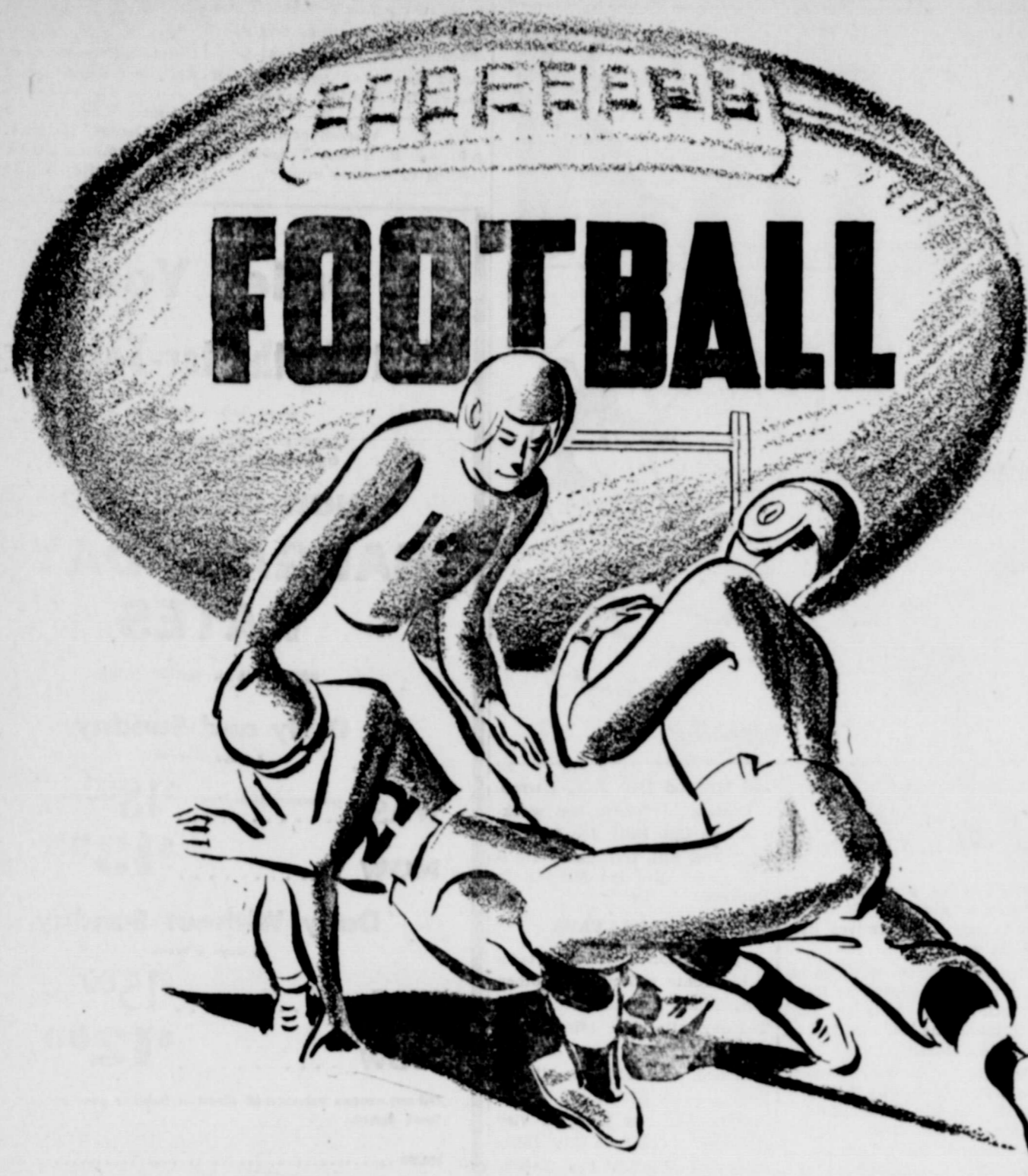
