Rampy Resigns Representative Job to Become Runnels Judge

W. H. Rampy, state representative and secretary-manager of the Winters Chamber of Commerce, was named Runnels County Judge in Ballinger Tuesday at a meeting of the Runnels County Commissioner's Court.

Rampy replaces E. C. Grindstaff who resigned Tuesday to accept an appointment as 119th District attorney. Grindstaff will continue to handle county judge duties until Rampy takes over the office, probably Dec. 1.

Rampy submitted his letter of resignation as representative for the 92nd district shortly after his appointment to the new job. He resigned from the Chamber of Commerce post late Tuesday.

Vacant Post

The representative post may or may not be filled at the discretion of Gov. Allan Shivers who has the power to call a special election for that purpose. Rampy expressed doubt that the Governor

would call the special election. Under provisions of the redistricting law the district will be changed to include Coleman County next year. The 77th district has been composed of Coke, Concho, and Runnels counties.

Rampy has served six regular terms in the Texas House of Representatives and was, until his resignation, chairman of the House Appropriations committee

Funeral Services Held Wednesday For A. C. McAulay

Funeral services for A. C. McAulay were held from the First Methodist church in Bronte Wednesday afternoon at 2 p. m. Interment was in the Fairview Cemetery under the direction of Newby-Davis and Clift funeral homes. Rev. J. E. Fuller, pastor of the Bronte Methodist church, officiated. Mrs. I. M. Cumbie was organist for the services.

McAulay was born December 1, 1908 at Maverick and attended the Bronte and Maverick schools. He married Miss Bonnie Fairish October 2, 1932. He was farming three miles north of Maverick.

A member of the Methodist church, he was also a member of the Masonic Lodge. Masonic rites were conducted at the graveside.

McAulay was killed Monday morning when a gun accidentally discharged, hitting him in the abdomen. He had stopped his car at a gate on the Claude Gentry ranch and apparently was reaching for the gun to shoot at something when the accident occurred. A man on the way to see Gentry found him still alive but he was dead upon arrival at a Ballinger hospital.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Bonnie McAulay; a daughter, Mrs. Eddie Sue Carter of Roy, Utah and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. McAulay of Maverick. Pallbearers were Don Edmiston, W. H. Maxwell, Jr., Pete Gentry, Claude Gentry, Leonard Bowden and Royce Lee. His widow has designated that all of his many friends be considered as honorary pallbearers.

Such contract is to provide for the construction of a pipeline, filtering plant and other property essential for the operation thereof by the Upper Colorado River Authority; the reimbursement by the City of Bronte to said Authority for the cost thereof; the purchase by the City from said Authority of as much of the water made available to said Authority under the terms of a previous agreement between said Upper Colorado River Authority and the City of Sweetwater, Texas, dated December 1, 1949, as the City of Bronte may require to be delivered to the City through a pipeline to be constructed by the Upper Colorado River Authority, pursuant to the terms of such contract, a full and complete copy of which proposed agreement between the City of Bronte and the Upper Colorado River Authority, together with a copy of the contract above referred to between said Authority and the City of Sweetwater, Texas, are available for public inspection at the office of the Mayor at the City Hall in said City of Bronte at any time during regular office hours until and including the date of such election.

McCutchen, Fort Chad. Fields Gain Producers

Oil prospects for this area continued good this week, with quite a bit of trading going on. However, no new tests have been announced in the Bronte Field. Since the discovery of oil in the Goens lime section in the field, it has been reported that Humble plans to drill a test soon after

the first of the year. North of town Josey No. 1 E. C. Rawlings, wildcat, was drilling below 3,500 feet.

In the McCutchen field, about six miles west of town, Union No. 2 Elizabeth McCutchen has been completed for a daily flow of 146.66 barrels of 42.5 gravity oil.

Gas-oil ratio was 250-1. Completion of this well extends the McCutchen field one location to the east.

Stanold No. 1 T. P. Carter has plugged back to 3,978 feet after drilling to a total depth of 5,601.

Southwest of town, Los Nietos No. 1 Wendland was drilling early this week at 4,121 feet in lime and shale. On a drillstem test from 3,873 to 3,916 feet, 3,106 feet of salt water was recovered.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field, Humble No. 18 Sallie Odum has been completed for a daily potential of 72.71 barrels of 45.8 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 633-1. The new producer is in S. J. Burns survey 52 1/2.

Seaboard No. 1-A Billie Hanks, 6 1/4 miles northeast of Blackwell in Nolan county was drilling at 5,250 feet this week.

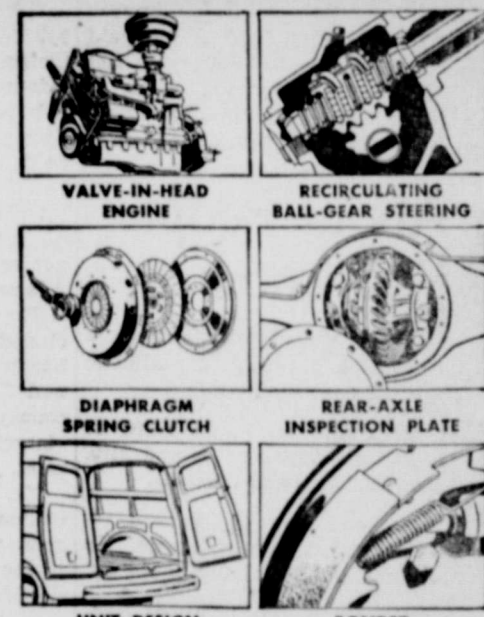
