## 217 WELLS IN FORT CHADBOURNE SHUT-IN BECAUSE OF GAS WASTE

The Fort Chadbourne field northeast of Bronte was shut in last Friday morning to prevent the flaring of approximately 11-million cubic feet of gas daily.

The shut-in was ordered by the Railroad Commission of Texas and will remain shut-in until the

operators can show either that pressure maintenance is not feasible in the field or that pressure maintenance is being undertaken.

A Railroad Commission engineer inspected the field Friday and reported that all producing companies had complied with the order. All of the field's 217 producing wells were shut in with the exception of two Humble wells which furnish gas for the Humble camp.

Officials of the producing companies had not announced their plans earlier this week.

## City Election April 1; Must Enter by Mar. 1

Mayor H. O. Whitt this week called attention to the fact that Bronte will have a city election April 1 this year, with the Mayor and three Councilmen positions being voted upon.

Mayor Whitt also said that all names which will appear on the ballot must be turned into him at least 30 days before the election or by March 1.

In addition to Whitt, Councilmen J. P. McGuire, J. B. Mackey and Joe George Wilkins are to be replaced or re-elected to their respective positions. H. A. Springer and Sam Spruell are hold-over councilmen.

A person may put his own or someone else's name on the ballot. Whitt said, of course, the consent of the party involved should be obtained before his name is submitted to the Mayor.

The Mayor said he hoped several citizens of Bronte would feel sufficient interest in the city's welfare to place their names on the ballot. "The next two years are going to mean a lot to the growth and development of the City of Bronte and we are going to need men for these jobs who are willing to work and who are truly interested in its growth," Whitt said.

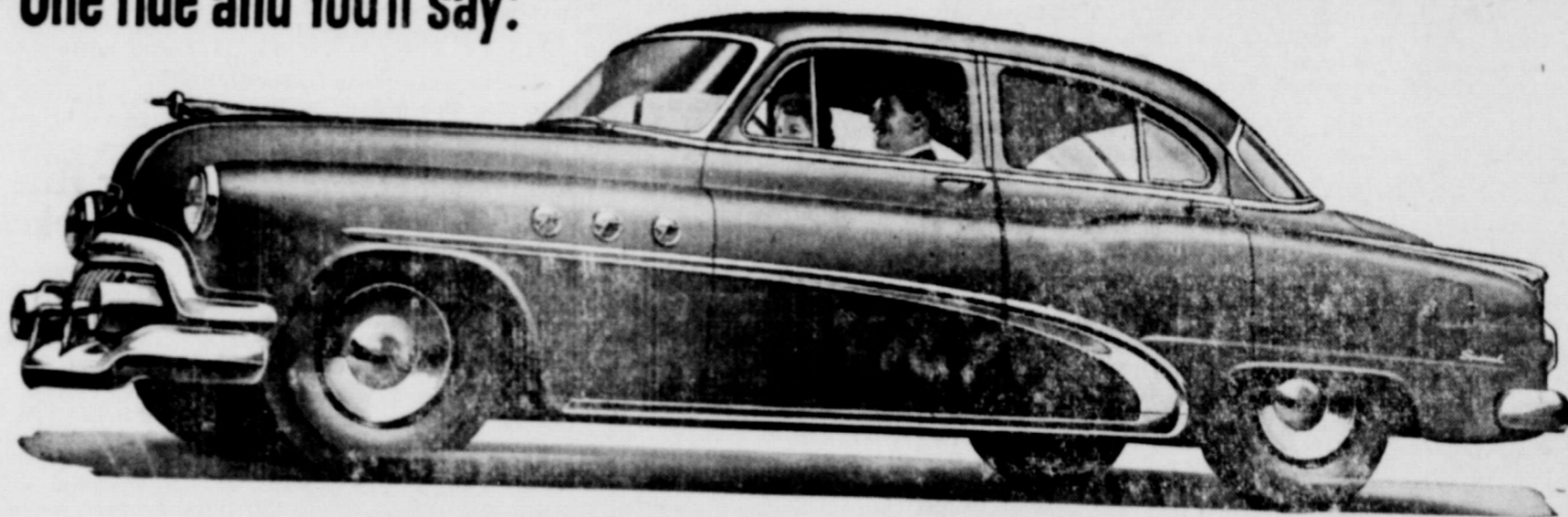
