## Bronte Boys Lose First Game In District Playoff To Mertzon

### Child Run Over After Falling From Vehicle

Tommy Glenn Hildebrand, 3 son of Mr. and Mrs. Joyce Hildebrand, was released from a San Angelo hospital Tuesday. He was injured Saturday afternoon after he fell from a car and was run over by a pickup.

The accident occurred near the railroad tracks in Bronte. The lad accidentally opened the car door and fell from the moving vehicle. A pickup, rounding the corner, driven by Bub Gentry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Gentry, hit the child before his mother could pick him up.

The boy was given emergency treatment in the Karen-Gay hospital and was taken on to San Angelo. He suffered multiple bruises and lacerations.

A rodeo, staged by Gene Autry and associates with Everett Colburn as producer, will be presented daily at 2:15 during the four-day stock show.

## Gallaway in Race For Congressman

COLEMAN, Feb. 20—Judge Ira Gallaway, County judge of Coleman County, this week announced his candidacy for U. S. Congressman to represent the 21st Texas Congressional district.

The 29-year-old public official pledged himself to serve in Washington as a "practical, hard-working, positive Congressman."

Judge Gallaway said: "In these critical times we must have vigorous, alert, energetic leadership. We cannot follow the leadership of men who are merely against a few things and say nothing, do nothing, accomplish nothing. 'Can't do' Government won't do any longer. It is now time to change."

The widely-known young civic leader added that "those men who have been in Washington cannot escape blame for the condition we are now in with taxes at an all-time high, spending going on unchecked, waste and corruption rampant everywhere, all while our finest young men die in a war which seems to have

no end."

"Those who have been supposed to represent us have been either grossly negligent or hopelessly ineffective," Judge Gallaway declared. "It is time to change now, while there is still time to set our country on the Christian course of honesty, integrity and courage."

Judge Gallaway announced that he will undertake a vigorous campaign in all 27 counties of the 21st Congressional District. He promised to "hit hard" on the issues.

In announcing his candidacy, Judge Gallaway pointed to the accomplishments of his administration during his tenure the county government has been put "in the black."

"We have balanced our budget, paid off our debts, cut down on unnecessary expenses, and we are now operating on a sound financial basis," Gallaway reported.

"What we have done on the county level can be done, too, on the national level, if the people's representatives are willing to work hard enough, long enough."

Gallaway was elected County Judge in Coleman County in 1950. In that election he received 9 out of 10 votes cast by the voters in his community—the men and women who know him best.

Gallaway was born at Glen Cove. He finished high school at Talpa. In 1941, 8 months before Pearl Harbor, he enlisted in the Air Corps and served five years. He married Sally Baxter of Friona in 1942, and they now have three children: Jerry, 8, Cindy, 5, and Craig, 2.

A busy civic leader in West Texas Judge Gallaway was selected as one of Texas' "Five Most Outstanding Young Men" in 1951. This award was presented to him in January by Governor Allan Shivers.

Whitt expressed the hope that several Bronte men would muster up enough interest in local affairs to place their names on the ballot. Friends may place a person's name on the list, but permission must be obtained from the candidate.

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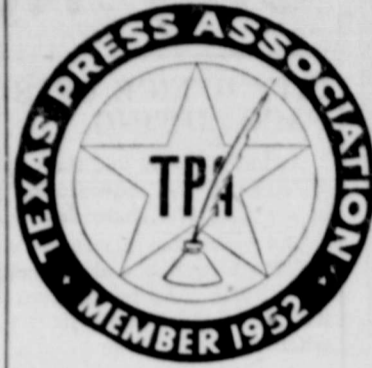

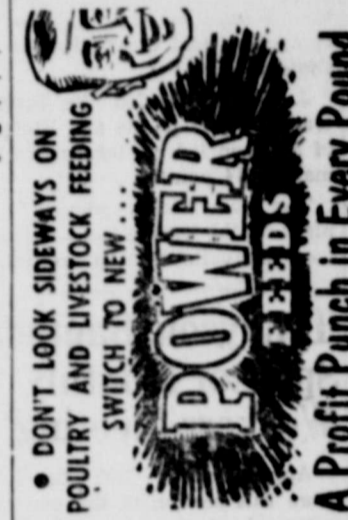

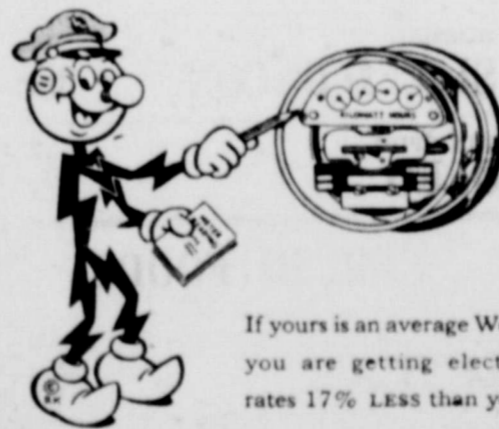
