Four persons made up the group who picked the pocket of Mr. Warner. One man, who gave his name as George Mitchell, 42; his sister, Rosie Miller, 38; his daughter, Laura Mae Mitchell and a 4-year-old girl, stopped at the Warner home and asked for a drink of water and something to eat.

During the process of receiving the water and food which Mrs. Warner offered them, they divulged the information that they were faith healers and pulled Mr. Warner up to their car and forced him to submit to their phony curative methods.

With all their mumbling and other hokus pokus they lifted \$40 from his billfold which was in his shirt pocket. The money was not missed until they had been gone for some time.

Authorities were notified and the foursome was picked up in Robert Lee. At first they denied having anything to do with the incident, but finally admitted they took the money from Mr. Warner. They tried to get Sheriff Paul Good to take the money back to the Warners, but he refused, telling them he would accompany them back to Bronte and they could return it.

So, Mr. and Mrs. Warner got their money back, and the Gypsies are well on their way from Coke County, as the Warners did not press charges against them.

## Brother of Mrs. Willoughby Is Buried Monday

George Griffith, who passed away Sunday morning, March 9, was buried Monday afternoon in College Park cemetery in Atlanta Georgia. A leukemia victim, he died at the Crawford Long hospital there. Rev. Alva Gregg officiated at the funeral services held in the Chapel of Howard Carmichael and Sons in Atlanta.

George Griffith came to Coke county with his parents at the age of five, having been born in La Vaca County in May, 1888. His parents moved to Bronte from Robert Lee and, at the age of 14, he decided to make a career of engineering.

With the financial help of an aunt, Mrs. Kate Nevill, he finished Tri State College in Angola, Indiana. At this time he took a job in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania doing designing and construction work as an underground engineer for the Westinghouse company. He continued his studies in night school.

After transferring to Detroit, Michigan and staying there several years, he took a job in Oklahoma City to be nearer his family, and later moved to Dallas to work with the Dallas Power and Light company. During the time in Dallas, he also assisted in the blue prints and construction of the underground lines for the City of Dallas. His mother moved to Dallas at this time to send his two younger sisters to school.

Griffith married while in Dallas and moved to Atlanta. At this time the New York Electric Bond and share company offered him a position in which he was to do quite a bit of foreign work. For several years he worked as an engineer in Cuba, Central America, Brazil and Venezuela.

In the early 1930's, Griffith moved his family back to Atlanta and they have lived there ever since with the exception of a four year period in South Carolina.

Union No. 4 Elizabeth McCutchen, northeast outpost to the McCutchen Cisco sand field was swabbing Wednesday. There was some oil but results are not encouraging. Perforations were made in a 5-foot pay section from 3,992 to 3,997 feet.

Lone Star Producing Co. No. 1 Wendland cemented surface casing at 526 feet. The wildcat is several miles southwest of Bronte and is 300 feet south of the Colorado River.

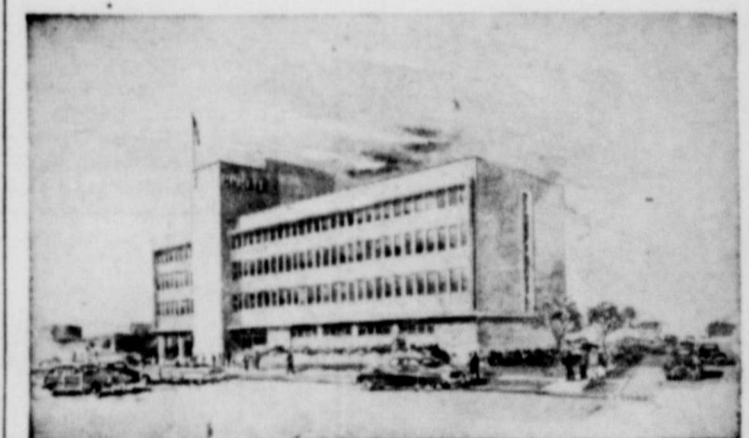

Humble's exploration, production, and pipe line employees in West Texas now total 1,100, of whom 191 work in the new building at Midland.

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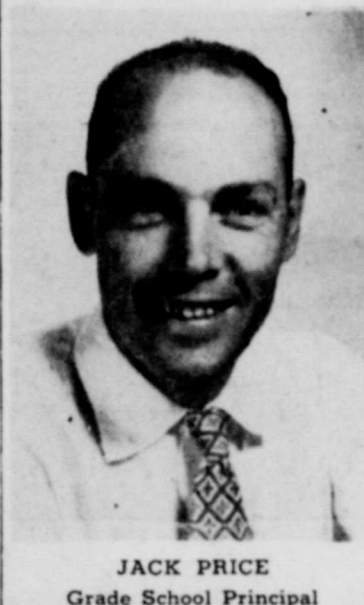
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## Minstrel Show To Be Here Friday Night, March 21

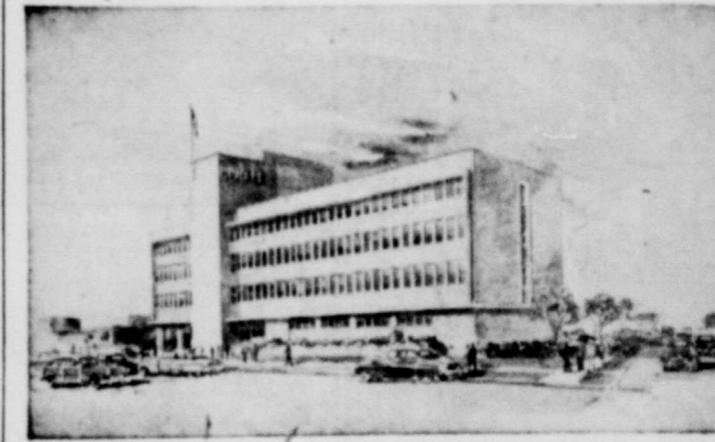

The years since the building of the two modest adobe brick offices in McCamey have seen progress for West Texas and for Humble. Discovery of rich oil fields in the Permian Basin in the early twenties had brought about great interest in the area by oil companies, and Humble was busy with exploration, production, refining, and sales operations there.

Humble Pipe Line Company had already constructed one major line in West Texas and was laying another in 1927.

By the late twenties and early thirties, drilling and producing had spread into many new counties in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. Humble's division headquarters were moved in 1935 to Midland, more centrally located for the region. Offices were first in the Petroleum Building and later in the Tower Building.

At the first of this year, the Production Department had almost 1,300 producing wells in the division. Daily production was about 45,000 barrels. Between 1925 and January 1, 1952, Humble Pipe Line Company transported more than one billion barrels of crude oil out of West Texas and New Mexico, approximately 25 per cent of the area's total production since oil was first discovered at Big Lake in 1923.

Humble's exploration, production, and pipe line employees in West Texas now total 1,100, of whom 191 work in the new building at Midland.

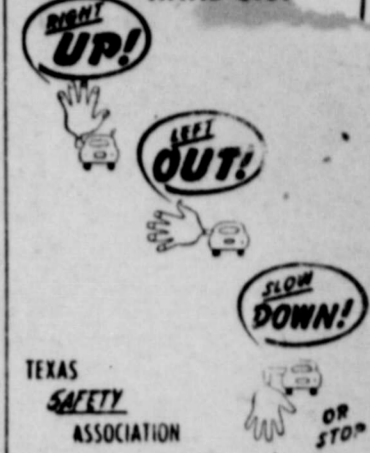

**Problems**  
By Donald M. Maynard

When friends and neighbors are with our three-year-old daughter they "make over her" and spoil her in spite of what I may object to. When she is at home now she expects us to give in to her every wish or desire which, of course, we cannot do. I ask the neighbor not to feed her, which she does anyway. And this has led her to telling me untruths about what she has been doing. What should we do?

I realize how indignant you must become at friends, neighbors, and relatives who persist in spoiling your child. You must be tempted really to "leave them out" for not paying any heed to your requests. And, indeed, in a few cases this may be desirable. By and large, however, there is no particular value in antagonizing your thoughtless friends and relatives.

Take time to have a good, heart-to-heart talk with them, in which you help them to see that your daughter rapidly is becoming spoiled because of the attention she is getting from outsiders. I have no doubt that many of your friends, when they see how earnest and sincere you are, will make a definite effort to cooperate with you.

In spite of everything you can do, however, there probably will be those who continue to spoil your daughter. Your clue, then, is to follow the procedure you evidently are following now; that is, you will refuse to spoil her at home. Remember that it is possible to be firm with her and at the same time to give her plenty of affection and understanding. The latter are tremendously important for your child's sense of security, as you realize, but it should be remembered that the feeling of insecurity does not arise out of firmness by parents so much as it does out of their lack of consistency.

Let me suggest, too, that you avoid putting your daughter in situations in which she is tempted to tell a lie. You must realize that an untruth does not have the moral significance for her that it has for you.

My oldest son is 2½ years. He has been separated from his father most of his life as my husband is a Regular Army Officer. Each time we are together, the question of discipline and authority arises, and frequently leads to discussions as to just what can be done.

The child does not accept his father as his authority, and comes to me for all of his needs and wants. We do not like this situation, yet at the same time the boy is not to blame as he met his father for the first time when he was 13 months old, and had become entirely dependent on me. This rejection hurts my husband. Yet forcing himself as the parent upon the child is not the answer, we know. It all comes to one point—the child is too dependent on me, and how can I transfer some of that dependence upon his father?

Let me congratulate you and your husband on the fine, sensible approach you are taking toward this problem, incidentally, that many returning servicemen are facing. Perhaps the following suggestions may be helpful:

1. Continue to remember that your son's dependence upon you will not be overcome immediately. It will take time for the change to occur and you and your husband will need to be patient and understanding.

2. Let your husband not only play with your son, but also have some definite effort to cooperate with you.

Give your child his share of home responsibilities. Dr. Maynard says in his new booklet, "It's free to readers of this newspaper. Mail a postcard to Donald M. Maynard, 810 Broadway, Nashville 2, Tennessee, and ask for a copy."

Home responsibilities in connection with his care, if this is possible. Perhaps he can be responsible for dressing him or for putting him to bed.

3. It may be well for you to take a short trip and leave your son in his father's care during your absence. What I am trying to say is that every opportunity your husband has to be alone with his son and to be responsible for his care, hastens the day when the boy will accept him not only as a good playmate but as a parent.

4. If on occasions you defer to your husband's judgment (which incidentally is not a bad thing for wives to do!), your son will gradually realize that the father, too, has authority. It will help, too, if when talking to him you frequently say, "Let's ask Daddy what he thinks or would do."

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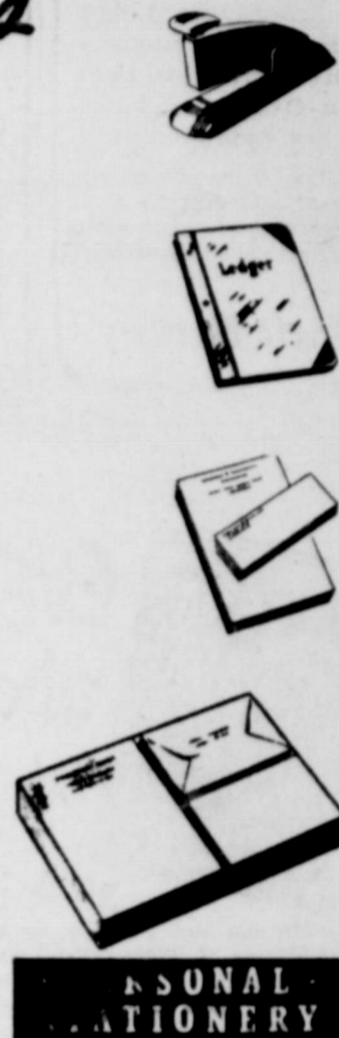

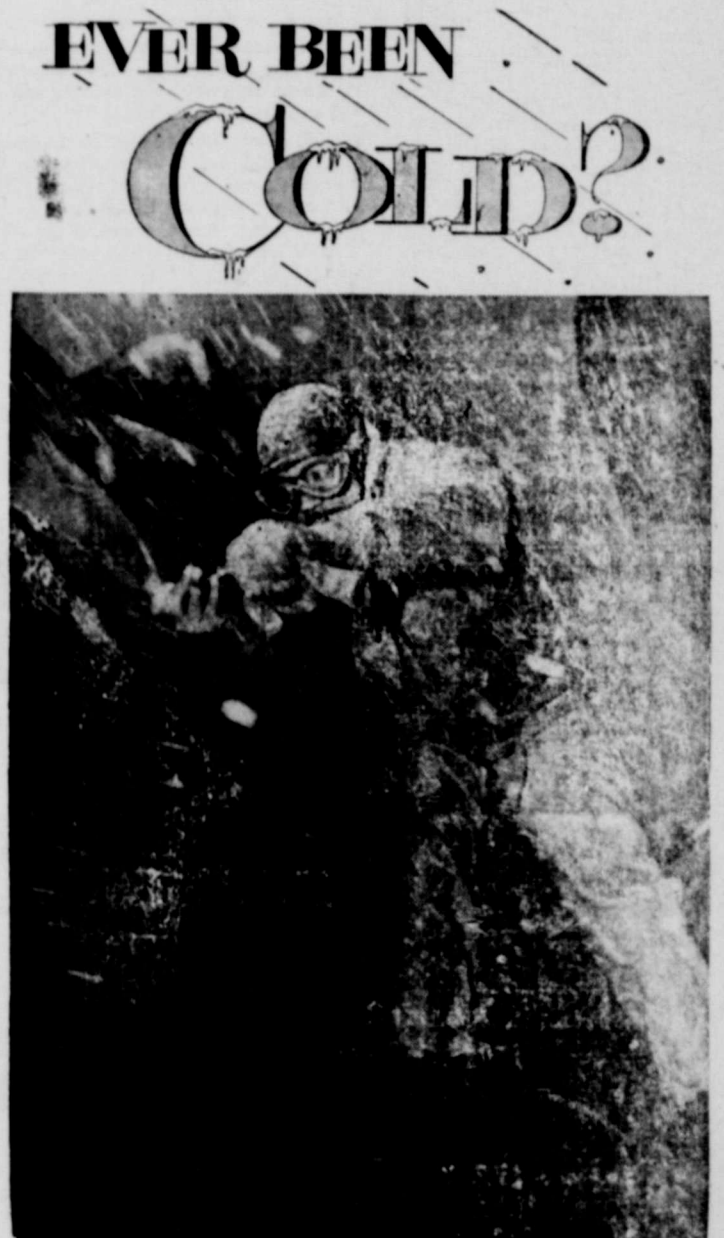
