## Bronte Takes First in District 18-B Track Meet Here Saturday

The Bronte Longhorns won the District 18-B track and field meet here last Saturday with a total of 72 points. The Robert Lee Steers were runners-up with 45 points. Metzron came in third with 18, Norton fourth with 10 and Water Valley fifth and sixth.

Coach H. A. Jolley was the director of the tournament.

In the junior division, Bronte came in second with 19½ points. Robert Lee won the first place with 29½ points. Wall was third and Metzron fourth and sixth.

Norton won the grade school division with 20 points. Miles was second with 17 points and Bronte took the third position with 13½.

Next Tuesday, April 1, Bronte voters will go to the polls to elect a mayor and three councilmen. The names of Mayor H. O. Whitt and Councilmen J. S. Mackey, Joe George Wilkins and J. P. McGuire are on the ballot, unopposed, for re-election.

The election will be held in the Bronte City hall and all qualified voters are urged to go to the polls and vote even though no contest is indicated. In a statement last week, the Mayor said that the entire council would feel better if the voters will only indicate that they are behind them in the city administration. Whitt also said that the next few years are going to be busy and important ones for the city and that a vote of confidence from Bronte voters would help a lot.

## UCRA to Sign Pipeline Contract in Next 10 Days

### E. B. Fuller In Race For Coke's County Attorney



E. B. Fuller, 27 year old lawyer, announced this week that he is a candidate for the office of County Attorney. He is opposing Frank Dickey, who now holds the job.

Fuller, who was born at Fort Stockton, graduated in January, 1931 from the University of Texas with a Law Degree. Prior to that he served with the Third Army during World War II. He was admitted to the Texas Bar in May, 1931.

Fuller is married to the former Dorothy Sims of Corpus Christi. They are moving to Robert Lee from Austin and have rented a house there already. They expect to be in residence there by April 1.

He is the son of Rev. J. E. Fuller, pastor of the Methodist church here.

Fuller stated that he will greatly appreciate the votes of any and all qualified voters in Coke county, and that he hoped to make the acquaintance of many local people during the months ahead.

### Older Persons Benefit From Social Security

"Your new social security may be greater than you think—and that's particularly true if you are employed regularly on a farm or in a private household," says Geo. Clark, manager of the San Angelo social security office.

"People who work in a commerce and industry generally understand how important old-age and survivors insurance is to their families," Mr. Clark says. "But I suppose it will be some time before people who were first covered by social security in 1951 will understand what it really means for themselves and their families in old age and for their families in case of death," he added.

"The other day a farm worker told me that he supposed he was too old to build up much of a retirement payment before he was 65. He felt a lot better when I told him that his regular cash wages of \$150 a month will mean \$57.50 each month for him when he retires and \$28.80 for his wife."

People who are now approaching retirement age may need less than 2 years of work covered by social security to qualify for retirement payments. Under the new social security law, the amount of the payment may be figured on average wages after 1950 for people who retire after mid-1952.

Farm workers and household workers are covered by the social security law only if they are regularly employed.

A household worker in a private home is covered by the law if she comes to work two days a week or oftener.

A farm worker is covered by the law if he has been continuously employed by the farm employer for three months and then continues to work full time for the same employer on 60 or more different days in each 3-month period.

Directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority opened bids Tuesday but did not award the contract for building the pipeline from Oak Creek Reservoir to the Bronte City Limits.

L. T. Youngblood, chairman of the UCRA, said that the contract was not let for two reasons: first, the lowest bid was some what higher than the engineers had estimated and approval on payment was needed from the Bronte City Council was needed before a definite commitment could be made, and, second, the deeds on some of the right of way

have not been secured, though oral agreements have been made for all of it.

Youngblood said that he hopes the contract can be awarded within ten days and that work on the project can begin soon.

Low bidder was the firm of Wilks, Duke and Steed of Tyler, who made a bid of \$214,322. Second and third lowest were Pelphrey and Basham, Inc., Fort Worth; R. B. Hodgson & Co., Lubbock. The UCRA is holding bid bonds on the three low bidders, pending clearing up of the right-of-way deeds and the approval of the City Council.

The original plan was for the city to pay back the loan for building the pipeline at the rate of \$700 per month for 25 years, but the increase in cost will require a longer period of time than had been planned. Mayor H. O. Whitt said members of the City Council indicated Wednesday that they would approve the longer period of payment in a special meeting to be held soon.

The contract which the UCRA expected to let within the next ten days or so includes construction of the pipeline from the lake to Bronte, necessary pump stations and pumping equipment and a filtration plant.

The UCRA has a right to one-tenth of the water which the big Oak Creek dam will impound. It will provide Bronte with approximately 600,000 gallons of water per day if needed. Not only has the agency secured the water for Bronte, but is financing the construction of the pipeline and other equipment at no interest charge to the city.

There has been some delay in the closure of the dam because of the steel shortage which has prevented completion of the new highway bridge across the lake. Highway officials are hopeful that it will be available some time in May.

The election will be held in the Bronte City Hall.

### Judge Arnold 80, Of Robert Lee Dies Suddenly

G. S. Arnold, 80, of Robert Lee, former Coke County Judge and County Attorney, was found dead at his home Monday morning. He had been in ill health for some time.

Funeral services were held on Thursday from the Robert Lee Methodist Church with the Rev. Ray Lee, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Robert Lee cemetery under the direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Judge Arnold moved to Bronte in 1912 and a short time later was elected County Judge. He then moved to Robert Lee and resided there until his death. He served as County Judge for several terms and was the County Attorney for ten years.

Survivors include two sons, Victor H. Arnold of Arlington, Va., and George Arnold of San Angelo.

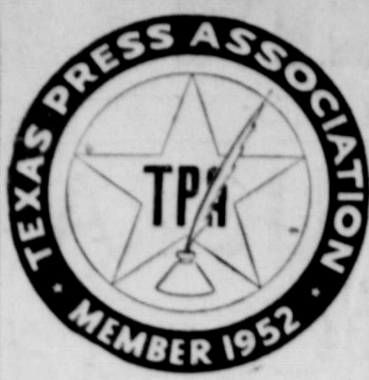

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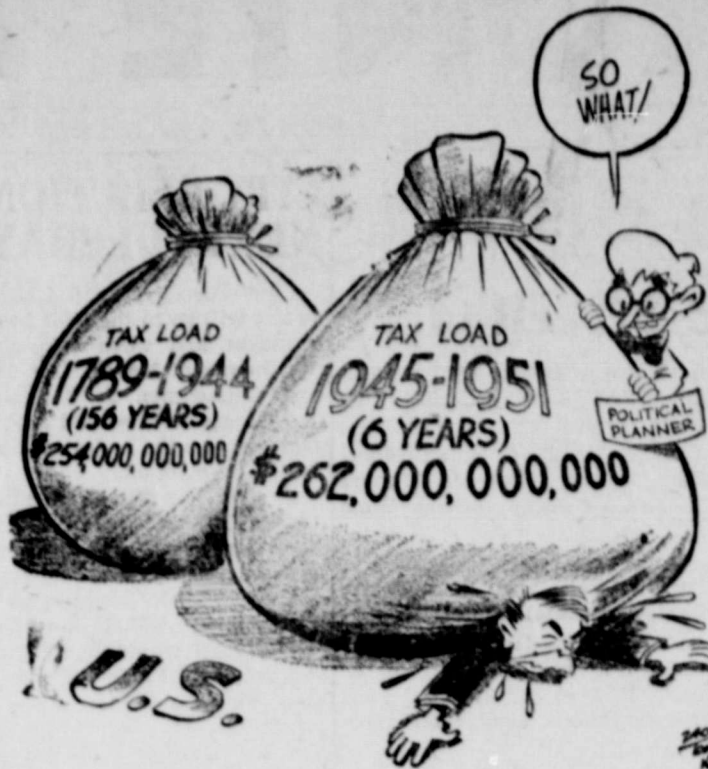

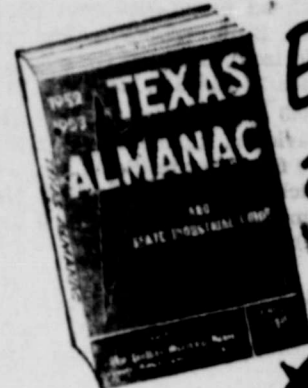

Parents' Problems

By DONALD M. MAYNARD

Screaming Spells

My baby has screaming spells. He is of a happy disposition—bright, alert, and healthy. Ever since he was six or eight months old he has responded by crying and yelling, often for a long period of time, over any little thing that didn't go his way. When he was a year old a person of some authority suggested that we shut him in a room alone until he stopped screaming. This produced hysterics, continuing an hour or more, and we thought it unwise to keep it up.

What should we do, completely ignore him? So far this treatment has worked the best although it has not lessened the number of attacks.

One would need considerably more information than is given above to answer this question adequately. The following suggestions, however, may prove helpful:

- 1. Find out if the crying is the result of physical causes. Food that does not digest, teeth coming in, undue fatigue, or other physical discomforts may be a factor in his tendency to cry frequently. Keep close, therefore, to your physician.
2. You are wise in discontinuing the practice of putting him in a room alone. This is the advice that frequently was given ten or fifteen years ago, but pediatricians are increasingly realizing that such advice is not wise.
3. Make every effort to avoid situations in which your child will feel frustrated. Your child will not be able all ways to have his own way, of course, but there is no reason why there should be frequent occasions when he feels thwarted. Right now he needs many happy and satisfying experiences. Be sure he has play materials that are suitable for him and that do not put him under tension.

- 4. Be certain that he has plenty of affection and love from both you and your husband. He needs these if he is to have that feeling of security that will enable him to face obstacles without being overwhelmed emotionally.
5. Although it may be necessary to ignore the crying when he has one of his spells, this does not necessarily mean that you must ignore him. At times you can divert his attention to something that is interesting and thus stop his crying. After he has stopped crying, be sure that he does not feel that you are angry with him.

Learning to Talk

Our son is eighteen months old. He has been walking for ten months. He is very active and independent physically, but he won't try to talk. Occasionally he says a word or so. Should we try to teach him to talk or let him take his time?

Most children begin to say words somewhere between the ages of one and two, so you should not consider your child in any way retarded in his speech development. Individual differences are quite apparent in the time that children begin to talk, and even though your child may not talk until the age of two, there is nothing particular to worry about. If at the age of two and a half

or three he does not talk, then you may have some reason for concern.

In your son's case, I rather suspect that when he wants to talk he will begin to do so. I would not unduly urge him to talk as this may cause him to develop more rapidly than is normal for him. I see no reason, however, why you should not teach him a word now and then and express approval when he uses one correctly. There is a difference between "urging" and "encouraging." Encourage but not urge, therefore, is perhaps the best way to indicate what you should do.

Wise parents will be sure that the child knows the name of various objects and will then refuse to give them to him until he asks for them by their correct names. When he does so, furthermore, they will be generous in their approval, although they will guard against giving so much approval that the child becomes spoiled and talks in order to show off. If the parents of these retarded children follow these suggestions and no improvement results, the retardation may be due to physical causes, such as deafness or malnutrition.

Let me urge you to secure from the United States Children's Bureau, Washington, D. C., the excellent booklet Your Children One to Six. You will find in it the answer to many of your questions.

Large Families

We have a happy home, three fine boys, and are mutually happy as husband and wife. For the last year or so, I have had a desire to have one or two more children, maybe even a girl! Or even more boys, as I love them all. The idea of the old-fashioned family strikes me favorably and I love it! However, in moments of consideration, I realize the strenuousness of these times, the financial responsibilities, doing our best by the three we now have; and in addition, the vital need for help in the communities, the schools, the churches. Is it practical, or advisable, in these days to have a large family? My husband agrees with my attitude.

It seems to me that you and your husband may be just the ones who should have a large family.

Certainly you should not let the needs of the church and the community for your services deter you from having additional children. There is no better way to serve either than by bringing up to maturity fine, intelligent children who are socially and spiritually sensitive.

If your family income, therefore, is such that you can assure your children wholesome living conditions and adequate educational opportunities, there would seem to be no reason why you should not have the family you desire.

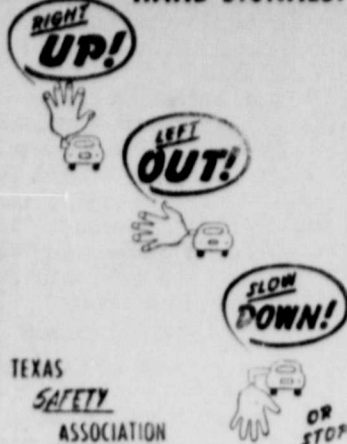

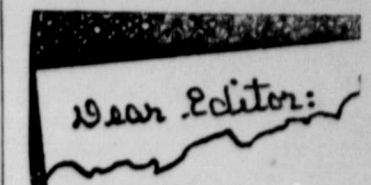

**All Texas Counties In Disaster Area**

All Texas counties are now under designation as disaster areas by proclamation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The action qualifies farmers who have suffered crop losses and who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere for loans from the Farmers Home Administration to put into 1952 crops. Announcement of the designation was made at Dallas, the headquarters of Farmers Home Administration, by L. J. Cappelman, State Director.

Bad weather conditions in 1951 reduced crop yields materially and tightened up credit restrictions, to the extent that many farmers were unable to finance crop plantings. Disaster loans are now available in each county. Farmers who have sustained pro-

duction losses on crops and livestock may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer and materials for insect control where needed, and oil for tractors, feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, machinery repairs and other expenses incident to the production of a crop.

Credit is advanced under authority of Public Law 38 and is available to farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds needed to plant a crop this year. Before a loan is made a County Committee of three farmers must certify that the applicant suffered a substantial production loss.

Farmers may apply for loans at the office of County Supervisor, Paul C. Shillingburg, located in the Agricultural Building in Robert Lee. The office is open each Thursday.

Funds will be available to ranchmen whose herds have been depleted by the drought. They can borrow to restock their pastures. Farmers who qualify under the disaster loan regulations may dis-

count their needs with the County Supervisor.

Better farming practices are emphasized in the FHA loan program. These will be discussed and agreed upon by the county supervisor and the applicant at the time the loan application is prepared. A program of diversification is recommended as the

safest course by the FHA.
