No origin for the fire had been found at noon yesterday. The building was a temporary structure as the original depot was also destroyed in a fire about two years ago.

Car Owners Urged To Get Inspection

"Get your vehicle inspected and avoid the delay and inconvenience of having to wait in line," said Chief G. W. Busby, Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, Department of Public Safety, Austin.

Caperton Chevrolet Company and the Home Motor Company in Bronte have been approved as official inspection stations. In Robert Lee vehicle owners may have their cars inspected at Harvey Chevrolet Co. or Ivey Motor Co.

The 2700 official inspection stations licensed in Texas so far are inspecting some 50,000 cars per week and in order to inspect all the cars in this state by the deadline, September 6th, the number of cars inspected per week will have to be doubled.

There can be no further extension of the deadline and operators of vehicles not inspected on September 7th will be subject to arrest. The law provides a fine of not to exceed \$200.00 for any person guilty of operating a vehicle after September 7th when such vehicle has not been inspected and approved.

"More and more stations are being licensed in Texas daily and the operators of these stations are waiting to inspect your car at your earliest convenience. Take your car to the inspection station of your choice and get your approval certificate while there is still plenty of time and no waiting," Busby urged.

"When you get your approval certificate on your car, you will take pride in knowing that your car is safe to operate and that you are helping contribute to a safer Texas," he concluded.

Besides Parker and Harris, C. N. Webb and Carroll Robbins were on the ballot.

The votes were counted as follows: C. N. Webb, 22; Jesse Parker, 61; Carroll J. Robbins, 45; Dr. John R. Harris, 52.

Parker has been on the board for the past two years and Harris replaces G. M. Powell, who did not seek re-election.

W. F. Fikes and Dave King were elected from Precincts 1 and 3 to serve on the County Board of Education.

Bronte Boys Win District Volleyball Playoff April 4-5

In the district volleyball tournament held this year at Water Valley the Bronte teams were well represented. This year the playoff was made by the winner of two out of three games.

The Bronte high school boys went through the tournament to win the district championship by defeating Mertzon 15-2 and 15-0. Members of the winning team were Marlon McCutchen, Dean Brigman, J. W. Caudie, Herbert Stephenson, Bobby Lasswell, Lyndon Waldrop and J. O. Bagwell.

The tourney began last Friday night with all four of the Bronte teams playing Water Valley. The High School boys won 12-10 in the first game and 14-5 in the second and last game.

The High School girls were beat out of the tournament after winning the first game 8-5. They lost the last two to Water Valley 14-7 and 13-9. Of the eight girls seeing action two were seniors, Kitty Gaddy and Barbara Robertson.

The grade school girls won with just two games. The scores were 17-13 and 15-1, another victory over Water Valley. The grade school boys also beat Water Valley in two games with scores of 15-9 and 15-4.

On Saturday morning the high school boys won from Robert Lee, Bronte won their first game 14-7 with Robert Lee taking the next game 15-2 and Bronte winning the final one 1-6.

The grade school girls played and lost to Robert Lee Saturday morning by scores of 15-4 and 15-6. This placed them as third in the district.

The grade school boys beat Norton Saturday morning by 15-7 and 15-12. They met Miles in the finals Saturday night and lost to them 15-9 and 15-4. They rated as second in the district.

MAYOR WARNS NOT TO RIDE BICYCLES ON SIDEWALKS

Mayor H. O. Whitt warned the youngsters around this week that it is against a city ordinance to ride bicycles on the downtown sidewalks of Bronte.

The Mayor said that he has received several complaints in regard to this matter and that he would like to see it stopped before somebody gets hurt or has to pay for a broken plate glass window as well as a fine.

Mayor Whitt said that it is extremely dangerous to the riders of the bicycles as well as to pedestrians and property, and that the practice must be stopped.

6-Year-Olds Must Be Enumerated

Children who will be six years old before September 1, 1952, should be enumerated, Supt. J. L. Carroll said this week. He also said that anyone who is under 18 years old on Sept. 1 should be counted.

The \$60 per capita allotment received from the state is based on the number of school children counted in the district and in order for Bronte Schools to receive the maximum benefit from this money all school-age children must be counted.

Supt. Carroll said that anyone who has a child in either of these two groups may come by his office and report the fact.

"Of course," the superintendent added, "if they are in school, we already know about them and there is no need for the parents to come by."

Special Easter music and sermons will be offered at Sunday services in the Bronte churches this Sunday. Regular services will be held at the churches with the pastors in charge except at the Methodist church where the district superintendent, Rev. Fred J. Brucks of San Angelo will conduct the services. The pastor, Rev. J. E. Fuller, is ill.

There will also be a special christening service for babies at the Methodist church on Sunday morning. The children's Sunday school classes will have their Easter egg hunts at the church Saturday afternoon.

The annual sunrise services will be held on the mountain top at the Harry Weaver ranch 10 miles south of Robert Lee. This service has been held for the past few years and annually attracts a large crowd. Rev. Rodney Gibson, Presbyterian minister from San Angelo, will be the speaker. Mr. and Mrs. Weaver, owners of the ranch serve coffee and donuts to the sunrise worshippers at the close of the service.
