OIL NOTES

On a drillstem test from 4,615-32 feet Humble No. 10 R. E. Hickman recovered a couple of stands of oil. It was reported that the operator would core several more feet and test again. If commercial production is obtained from this depth, it will make the fourth pay in the Bronte field. The section was identified as Capps formation.

Lone Star No. 1 H. G. Wendland, wildcat seven and one-half miles southwest of Bronte, was drilling Tuesday at 5,587 feet in Strawn shale. It recovered 90 feet of drilling mud and 4,500 feet of sulphur water on a drillstem test from 5,437-57 feet.

Humble No. 1 M. A. Rawlings, wildcat 3 miles north of Bronte, was drilling the first of the week at 3,900 feet. It was reported that a good show of oil was found at this depth.

JUDGING TOMORROW IN 4-H DRESS REVUE

First judging of 4-H girls garments to be entered in the County 4-H Dress Revue will begin at 9:30 A. M. tomorrow (Saturday), April 19, in the Home Demonstration agent's office.

Two judges will be present to judge the girls and their costumes for general appearance. Garments will then be left in the agent's office and be judged for construction during the following week.

The 4-H Dress Revue will be presented on Saturday, April 26, at 2 p. m. at the Alamo Theater in Robert Lee. The public is invited to attend.

However, a spokesman said, no judging will be done on the day of the revue so all girls who are going to enter the revue must be present for the preliminary judging tomorrow.

All garments must be completed at the time and the entrants must wear the same accessories that they will wear in the dress revue.

First National Shows Increase In Bank Deposits

At the close of business March 31, the First National had \$2,568,728.27 on deposit as compared with \$2,548,164.54 on December 31, 1951.

Loans and discounts, disclosed in response to national and state bank calls for condition of business March 31, were \$667,365.97. Loans and discounts on Dec. 31, 1951 totaled \$646,472.49.

Claude Dean, former resident of Robert Lee and father of County Judge Jeff Dean, died Sunday night at Clifton after an automobile accident.

Funeral services were conducted at Weatherford, where he and his family moved about 4 years ago, at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday. Burial was at Weatherford.

Mr. Dean is survived by his widow; six daughters, Mrs. Nora May of Weatherford, Mrs. Duncan Kingston of Balmorhea, Miss Della Dean of Wickenburg, Arizona, Mrs. Cecil Lewis of Weatherford, Mrs. Hodges Escue, now living on the East Coast and Mrs. Bobby Baker of Robert Lee; three sons, Jeff Dean of Robert Lee, Edmund Dean of Marfa and Sgt. Douglas Dean of Fort Hood; and ten grandchildren.

The accident occurred Sunday night at 9:15 on the Bosque-McLennan county line. Dean and his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Douglas Dean, were returning to Weatherford from Fort Hood where they had taken Sgt. Dean. The car in which the two were riding failed to make a curve on the highway and overturned. Mrs. Dean suffered head lacerations and shock. She was unable to attend the funeral but was expected to be improved soon.

Mr. Dean was born in Travis County, Texas, on May 6, 1884. He was married to Miss M. E. Bristol. The couple farmed in Dawson county and moved to Robert Lee in 1941. They sold their holding there in 1948 and moved to their present home near Weatherford.

JEFF DEAN ELECTED PRESIDENT OF W.T. JUDGES, COMMISSIONERS

Jeff Dean, Coke County Judge, was named president of the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association at its annual meeting last weekend. The group met in Brownwood. The territory covered by the association covers the western half of Texas, embracing 127 counties.

Judge Dean succeeds Joe W. Anderson of Seminole who has held the post for the past year. Tom Clifton of Channing, Hartley county commissioner, was named vice-president of the association and Judge Howard Mays of Nocona is secretary-treasurer.

San Angelo was selected as the 1953 convention city for the or-

ganization. Other towns seeking the 1953 convention were Mineral Wells, and Sweetwater.

Judge Ira Gallaway of Coleman County is the retiring secretary and treasurer and Judge Paul Counts, of Fort Stockton, is a director.

The convention this year was held at Hotel Brownwood. The speakers on the program included John C. White, commissioner of Agriculture; Price Daniel, attorney general; John Ben Shepard, former secretary of state; W. N. Williamson, assistant director of the State Extension service and Rep. Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde.

Next week has been designated "Clean-up and Paint-up" week in Bronte and citizens are urged to take the week seriously and clear their premises of all trash and other unsightly and unhealthy conditions.

The special week was announced in an official proclamation by Mayor H. O. Whitt. Whitt said that the town needs a general cleaning up before summer in order to help keep down disease, insects, as well as to make Bronte a more attractive place to live.

Next Thursday has been set for

the cleaning up of the down town area. Merchants are asked to give their time to the work or to provide someone to help. Trucks will be provided by the city to haul off the trash.

Residents here will remember the outbreak of polio in the city and county three summers ago. The first clean-up campaigns were inaugurated at that time and have been held regularly since.

Citizens are reminded that every effort should be made to eliminate the housefly and the mosquitoes and their breeding places.

Dr. J. K. Griffith Services Are Held At Robert Lee



Death closed the colorful career of Dr. Joseph Kimberlin Griffith, 86, of Robert Lee, last Saturday. The long-time resident of Coke county had been in ill health for some time and had been critically ill for the past few weeks. His passing occurred in the Coke County Memorial hospital.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Monday from the Robert Lee Methodist church with the Rev. Ray Lee officiating. Burial was in the Robert Lee cemetery under direction of Cliff Funeral home.

Dr. Griffith was born in Missouri in 1866. He was also a graduate of the Kansas City Medical college, now the medical department of the Kansas State University.

He practiced medicine in Oklahoma, Missouri, Kansas and settled in Robert Lee in 1927 as the partner of Dr. C. E. Eaton. He bought Dr. Eaton out in a year and practised in Coke county until he retired a couple of years ago.

He married Miss Carrie Sloan at Creighton, Mo., Dec. 24, 1891. They celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary last year.

Dr. Griffith was active in all civic affairs. He served as chairman of the Coke county democratic party for five years, was a member of the Methodist church, the Masonic lodge, Lions club, the Chamber of Commerce and an honorary member of the Tom Green-Eight County Medical society and County Health Officer.

Survivors include the widow; a son, Byron of Long Beach, Cal., three daughters, Mrs. R. D. Wells, of Quanah, Mrs. D. T. Walling of Carlsbad, New Mex., and Mrs. D. W. Parrish of Abilene; six grandchildren; five great grandchildren and a sister.

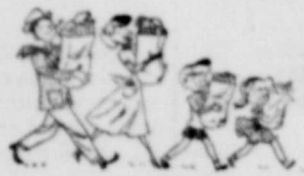

SMALL SCHOOLS ASS'N PASS SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS

The Texas Small Schools Association meeting at Austin on March 28 passed some resolutions which will be of interest to residents of this area.

Purpose of the resolutions are to "improve and strengthen the small schools for the purpose of offering better educational opportunities to the boys and girls in each community."

The group resolved that the basis for accreditation should be based on the needs of the boys and girls in each community rather than upon college entrance requirements.

It was also resolved that teachers be allowed at least three field endorsements, thus making them more versatile and of more value to the small schools where the number of teachers is limited.

The resolution read further that the association recommended that the minimum salary for a teacher with a degree should be \$3,000 per year.

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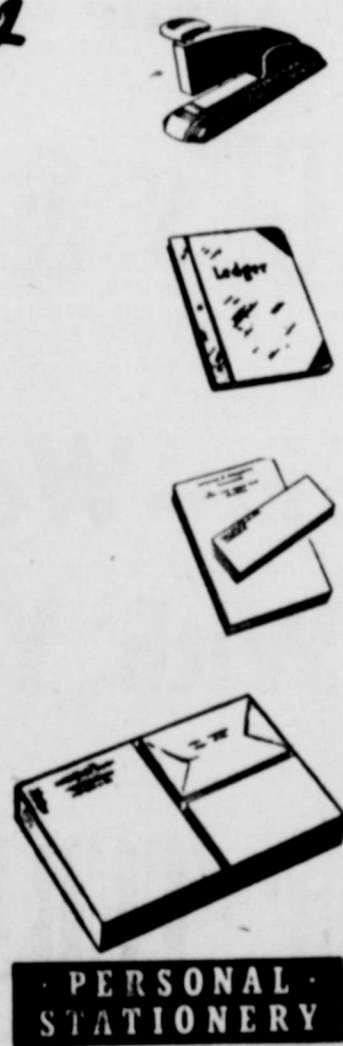

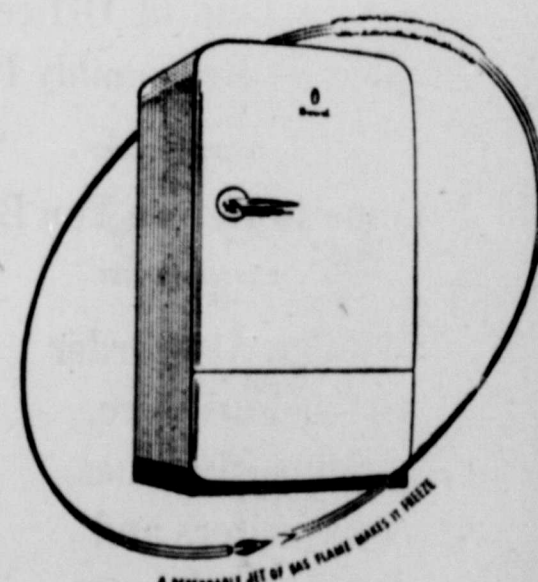
