Good Rains Cover This Area, Breaking Drouth

Farmers, ranchmen and everybody in general were feeling better this week because of the rains which fell in the area last week-end.

Bronte received a total of 2½ inches, giving the farmers and ranchmen of the area "enough to start on."

About an inch was received in showers which fell intermittently last Friday and Saturday. Monday night a hard, blowing rain brought the measurement up to 2½ inches. Some instances of small damage were reported from

the Monday night blow, which sent many persons to their storm cellars, but the moisture received more than offset the wind damage.

The ground around Bronte was practically covered by hail which fell early Monday morning. Little damage resulted from it either and the shower following it melted the ice in a few minutes.

Farmers were busy this week making preparations for the coming planting season. A few in the

sandy parts of the area were in the fields Monday morning and others were driving their tractors by the middle of the week.

MORE RAIN NORTH

North of Bronte up to four inches of rainfall was reported. The small dam on Oak Creek which had been built to keep water away from the big dam under construction was washed out, but contractors reported that it would not seriously hamper progress on the main job.

Bronte's city water supply was not helped a great deal by the rains, as spreader dams and tanks caught most of the water on the city lake watershed before it ran into the lake basins. About a foot increase was gauged in the lake on the Ballinger highway.

Robert Lee gauged 2.60 inches total rainfall and received a larger amount of hail with the Monday night rain.

TRUCK DRIVER DIES SUDDENLY

Eugene D. Wilkins, 36, of San Angelo, died suddenly yesterday morning in the lobby of the Karen Gayl hospital here. The man was apparently feeling ill and went into the hospital for medical attention. He collapsed before Dr. John R. Harris reached him and died about ten minutes later, apparently of a heart attack.

His death occurred about 9 a. m. Wilkins was a truck driver for the Scurlock Oil Co. of Houston, Texas. He was born Nov. 29, 1914.

Wilkins is survived by his wife and two sons, age 1 and 4, who reside at 3008 W. Houston in San Angelo. He is also survived by a brother and a sister, both of Hamlin.

The body was taken to the Cliff Funeral home here where funeral arrangements were pending late Thursday.

10 Hickman Completed; Rig Moves to McQueen

Humble No. 10 R. E. Hickman is ready for completion after drilling to the Goens lime. The D. L. Rose and Son rig was being moved off Thursday to a location across the highway on O. R. McQueen. Operator plans to bring in the No. 10 Hickman in the next few days. No tests were run in the Goens section.

Drilling contractor on No. 11 R. E. Hickman, another test projected to the Goens, had hard luck with it. The hole was being drilled at an angle and the rig had to be moved over several feet and drilling has started again on this test.

Humble No. 1 M. A. Rawlings tested Wednesday from 4,147-84 feet, in what was reported to be Canyon lime. Recovery was drilling mud with the bottom 100 feet and gas cut. Drilling was proceeding below the tested section.

Official potential has been filed for Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 6 J. L. Brunson, N. E. Eastland Survey 330, located two miles south of here in the Bronte Field.

On the 24-hour potential test it pumped 37.26 barrels of 45.5 gravity oil. No. 6 Brunson is producing from an open hole at 4,316-4,455 feet with the pay section topped at 4,328 feet. Operator treated the well with 1,000 gallons of acid.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field there was quite a bit of activity this week.

The field gained a new oiler and at the same time applications were filed with the railroad commission for permission to drill three new projects.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 53 Sallie Odum, Felix Sosa Survey 302, on the daily potential test gauged 175.68 barrels of 46.2 gravity oil.

Appointed to command the United States Lines' new superliner United States, largest passenger vessel ever built in this country, Captain Harry Manning, commodore of the company's fleet and one of the most distinguished American shipmasters, is now at the Newport News, Va., shipyard where the 990-foot vessel is nearing completion. The United States will sail from New York July 3 on her maiden voyage to Havre and Southampton.

No. 29 J. Brannon, I. C. Brown Survey located 16½ miles northwest of Robert Lee, on the daily potential test gauged 68.4 barrels of 43.7 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 669-1.

Sun's No. 25 H. H. Jameson, Section 316, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey, located 16 miles northwest of Robert Lee, on the daily potential test flowed 201.45 barrels of 46.4 gravity oil. Completion was on a ¼-inch choke with packer on the casing and 350 pounds of pressure on the tubing. Gas-oil ratio was 1,300-1.

Bronte had the usual lineup with McCutchen pitching until the sixth inning when Eddie Alexander took over to finish the game.

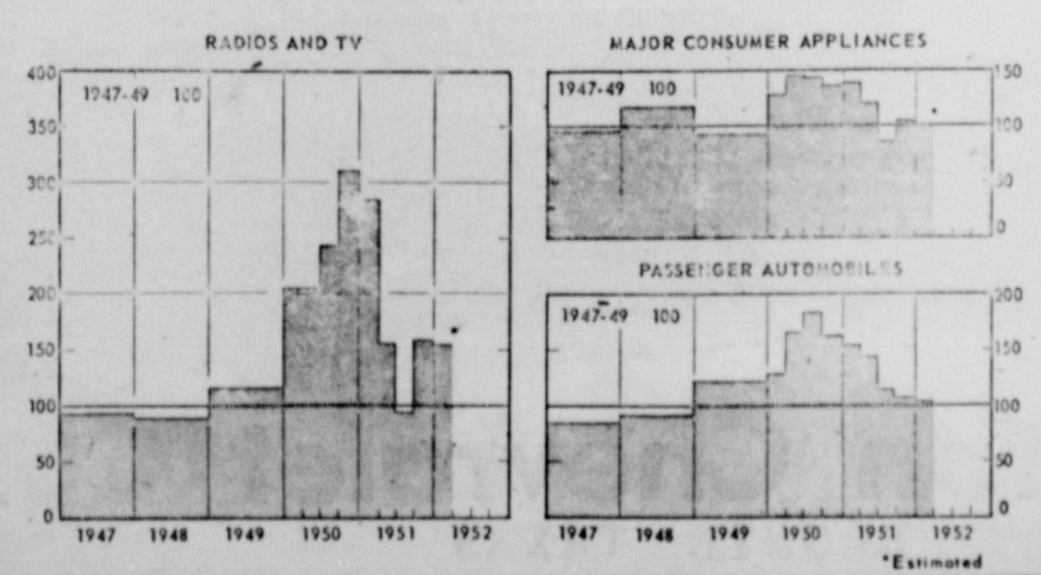


