Humble No. 11 Hickman Flows 430 Barrels in Day

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 11 R. E. Hickman, section 453, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey, has been completed for a daily potential of 430.34 barrels of 49.2 gravity oil. Location is one-half mile west of Bronte in the Bronte field.

Oil flowed through a 3/4-inch choke with 510 pounds pressure on the casing and 475 pounds tubing pressure. No. 11 Hickman is producing oil from an open hole at 4,832-78 feet with the pay section topped at 4,843 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 449-1.

Fort Chadbourne Field this week gained two new oilers. Several other wells are nearing completion in the field.

Two new producers are on the Runnels County side of the field. Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 78-B Sallie Odom, John Bird Survey 469, was completed seven miles west of Wilmeth.

On the daily potential the well gauged 331.04 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil, flowing through 3/4-inch choke with 940 pounds casing and 730 pounds tubing pressures. It is producing from an open hole at 5,352-5,410 feet with the pay section topped at 5,362 feet. Having a gas-oil ratio of 789-1, the well was treated with 2,000 gallons of acid.

In that same area, Humble No. 36-B Sallie Odom, P. Martinez Survey 299, gauged 391.07 barrels of 44.6 gravity oil during the 24-hour test.

No. 86-B Odom flowed through a 3/4-inch choke with 750 pounds on the casing and 700 pounds tubing pressure. It is producing from an open hole at 5,387-5,450 feet, pay section topped at 5,400 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 806-1.

Also in the Runnels Fort Chadbourne Field, Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 6 Irene Morrow, J. M. Lindley Survey 28, is completing. Location is three and one-half miles east of Fort Chadbourne.

During a 24-hour test the well gauged 126.97 barrels of oil on a 9-64ths inch choke with 225 pounds on the casing and 650 on the tubing. Completion is being made from an open hole at 5,438-90 feet.

Eight and one-half miles southwest of Wingate in the field, Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 The Norton Properties, L. N. Taylor Survey 6, is testing.

On the last gauge it swabbed three barrels of oil in six hours from six perforations per foot at 5,342-62 feet. Operator set casing at 5,380 feet while the total depth was 5,780 feet, plugged back to 5,369 feet.

New location to be staked on the Runnels side of the field is Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 68 Sallie Odom, located 7 miles southeast of Blackwell. Contracted for 6,000 feet with rotary, site is 6,013 feet from the south and 1,850 feet from the east lines of F. Sosa Survey 302.

On the Coke County side of the field, Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 11 Edna Wylie, P. Martinez Survey 299, four miles southeast of Ft. Chadbourne is testing.

Completion for No. 11 Wylie is being made through four perforations per foot at 5,445-70 and 5,478-89 feet. Casing is set at 5,508 feet. Total depth was 5,508 feet, plugged back to 5,495 feet.

In that same field and area, Stanolind No. 12 Edna Wylie is completing. During six hours it flowed 73 barrels of oil on a 16-64-inch choke with 250 pounds on the casing and 400 pounds tubing pressure. It is producing from an open hole at 5,453-5,507 feet.

Operator at last report was setting up tank batteries for No. 12 Wylie.

No. 13 Edna Wylie, three miles southeast of Fort Chadbourne, also on the Coke side, is drilling below 3,186 feet in lime and shale. Contract depth is 5,800 feet. Three miles east of Fort Chadbourne in that field, Coke County, Stanolind No. 9 Irene Morrow, J. M. Lindley Survey 266, was waiting on cement after setting surface casing at 268 feet.

LABORERS WANTED

The Lone Star Producing Co. has said that they will be able to use quite a number of laborers in their construction of the gasoline plant in the Fort Chadbourne Field. Welders, carpenters, laborers and others interested in securing work on the project are asked to report next Tuesday. Applicants should apply at the site of the project which is between the Fort Chadbourne Humble camp and Highway 277.

The drive, which was held in March, raised \$1,189.44 in the county.

W. S. Leslie Enters Race For Judge of 51st Judicial Dist.



W. S. Leslie, attorney of San Angelo, announces his candidacy for the office of District Judge of the 51st Judicial District, composed of Tom Green, Schleicher, Irion, Coke and Sterling Counties.

"Proper administration of justice," says Mr. Leslie, "is America's first line of defense against communism."

"I believe that our courts should be equally open to all people, and that the presiding Judge should be as impartial as human ability and diligent effort can make possible."

"I believe the courts should be open at all times, and that the presiding judge should engage in no other business that will take him away from his official duties."

"I believe in the diligent cooperation of the Judge in the elimination of unnecessary delays, and in the elimination of waste of time by Jurors and parties to suits."

Mr. Leslie is a member of a pioneer West Texas family, having been born and reared in Scurry County, and being the son and grandson of ministers who blazed the West Texas trail. He is 54 years of age and came to San Angelo just over 18 years ago. For six and a half years, in addition to the regular practice of law, he served as City Judge of the City of San Angelo under several changes in the City administration.

He is a World War I veteran, having volunteered at the age of 18, and for approximately 18 months was overseas with the 169th Aero Squadron, serving with Pershing's First Army in the battles of "The Meuse," "Defensive Sector," "St. Mihiel," and "Argonne Forest," having been in the Meuse-Argonne sector when the Armistice was signed November 11, 1918.

After returning home, he attended Texas University and Baylor University and graduated with an L. L. B. in 1925. He began the practice of law in Bay City, Matagorda County, in 1925, and continued there until the spring of 1934, when he came to San Angelo.

Mr. Leslie has taken an active part in civic affairs. He has served as a member and Vice-President of the Board of Directors of the Board of City Development of San Angelo. He is a member of the First Baptist Church, the Masonic Lodge, the

Blackwell Students Visit Cement Plant At Maryneal

Blackwell students were the first school group to visit and go through the Lone Star Cement plant at Maryneal. The group visited the plant last Tuesday morning.

Attending with the school students were C. L. Lofland, manager of the South Texas Lumber Co.; Ralph Cushman, San Angelo sales representative; Cleatus Hyatt, Mrs. Lucille Coleman, Miss Mary Lee Swindell and James Pearson, all Blackwell teachers, and Mrs. Charles Ragsdale, reporter.

The group was told that the Maryneal plant is the most modern Lone Star plant in the U. S. and that their other two Texas plants are located in Dallas and Houston.

The recently completed cement plant is operated 24 hours a day for 7 days a week. About 200 persons are employed there and the output is approximately 1200 sacks of cement per hour.

Clay used in the making of cement is shipped in and the limestone that is used is obtained from the quarry at the plant.

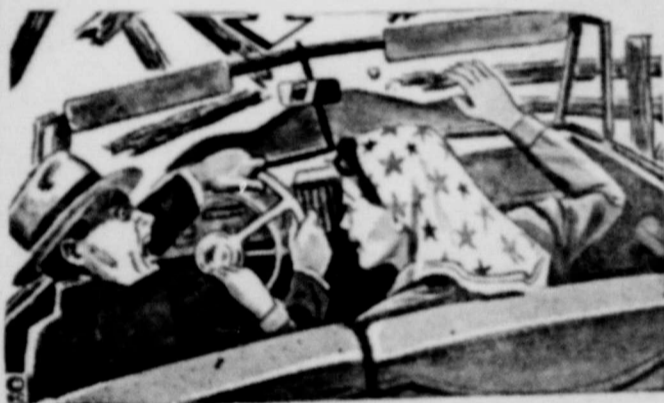
