AUTO ACCIDENT INJURES THREE

Three persons were injured late last Thursday in an automobile accident which occurred directly in front of the Karen-Gayl hospital. Injured were Mrs. Fred McDonald, Jr. and daughter, Jo Alice and Mrs. McDonald's mother, Mrs. O. V. Looney, all of Robert Lee. The three were in the front seat of the McDonald Chrysler while two children riding in the back seat were uninjured.

Mrs. McDonald sustained cuts and bruises and a cracked arm; Jo Alice McDonald suffered a forearm fracture and Mrs. Looney had both bones in her left arm broken.

The accident occurred when Mrs. McDonald turned into the hospital and was hit by a new Mercury, driven by Myron E. Ice of Abilene. Officers investigated the accident and charges were filed against Ice, owner of the Ice Drilling Co. A high speed for the Ice car was indicated by tire marks on the pavement.

Both cars will require costly repairs. Mrs. McDonald and her daughter were taken to the Coke County Memorial hospital and Mrs. Looney is being treated in the Karen-Gayl hospital. All are reported doing well.

Rawlings Test Prospects Still Good; Has 3 Pays

Humble No. 1 M. A. Rawlings, wildcat test three miles north of Bronite, was drilling this week below 5,300 feet. The test has had promising shows in three sections, the Palo Pinto and another section of the Pennsylvanian.

Recovery on a test last week was 3,870 feet of pipeline oil testing 46.2 gravity and 500 feet of oil-cut mud during a 35-minute drillstem test from 5,166-5,800 feet. Gas surfaced in four minutes but was not gauged.

Three drillstem tests in the Palo Pinto between 4,446 and 4,589 feet, returned oil and gas with a small amount of water on the third test. A one-hour drillstem test from 5,046-60 feet in the Goens lime yielded 2,000 feet of 46 gravity oil, 350 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 90 feet of salty sulphur water.

In another drillstem test in the Pennsylvanian late last week and recovered salt water. On a one-hour drillstem test from 5,180 to 5,200 feet, the test recovered 900 feet of salt water and 50 feet of gas-cut mud. Contract depth is 6,100 feet or the Ellenburger.

No. 1 Rawlings is 600 feet out of the southeast corner of section 397 1-A, H&TC, 3 miles north of the Bronite field and separated from it by a failure, Hickok & Reynolds No. 1 Rogers.

A. J. Bishop In Race for State Representative



A. J. Bishop, 27-year-old farmer and Quarter Horse man, of Winters, announced his candidacy for the office of State Representative from the 77th District, made up of Coke, Runnels, Coleman and Concho counties.

Bishop states "After serious consideration of the many important issues that face the people of our district and our State, I have decided to file as a candidate for the office of representative, believing that our people deserve and need public servants that understand their problems and will represent them."

"I earnestly solicit the support and the votes of the people of this district, and so that all may know me, I will carry this campaign to all voters of this area."

"Altho this is a new field in which I am entering, it is my sincere purpose to serve the people of this district in which I was born and reared."

Bishop, a graduate of Winters High School and Texas Tech College, is a veteran of World War II. He served with the 42nd (Rainbow) Infantry Division in Europe. After being discharged from the army, he entered Texas Tech College and obtained a Bachelor of Science Degree in Agriculture in 1950. While he was a student at Texas Tech, he was a very active leader and outstanding man on the campus. Upon graduation he returned to the farm and became an associate in farming and the Quarter Horse business with his father.

In 1951 Governor Alan Shivers appointed him to serve as a member of the Texas Pasture Improvement Committee.

"I have no selfish interest to serve," Bishop said, "but to represent all the people living within the four counties of this district."

"I am particularly interested and will seek the continuation and support of the important farm and ranch programs of this area, and will work for the elimination of the waste and extravagance that have caused higher taxes."

Bishop is single and a member of the Drasco Methodist church. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Bishop of Winters.

FORMER JUDGE DIES

O. E. Gerron, former county judge and county attorney of Coke County, died last Wednesday in Odessa. At the time of his death he was county judge of Eck County.

Judge Gerron served as a county official in Coke County in 1931 and 1932.

The Fort Chadbourne field had two new producers this week.

Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 12 Edna Wylie, four miles south east of Fort Chadbourne in Coke County, P. Martinez survey 299, has been completed for a daily flow of 116.8 barrels of 45 gravity oil.

The well flowed through 9-64 choke with 225 pounds on casing and 450 pounds on tubing from open hole at 5,441-5,507 feet. Top of the pay was 5,451 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,420-1.

Across the county line into Runnels county, Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 58 Sallie Odom, J. L. Allen Survey, was completed for a daily gauge of 156.87 barrels of 43.7 gravity oil.

That well flowed through 1-4 choke with 700 pounds on casing and 125 pounds on tubing from open hole at 5,492-5,560 feet, withtop of the pay being picked at 5,505 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 687-1.

In the Millican Field in Coke County 12 miles west of Robert Lee, Son Oil Co. No. 17 A. Cummings, Section 187, Block 2, H&TC Survey, was completed for a daily gauge of 178.9 barrels of 44.7 gravity oil.

That well flowed through 1-4 choke with 950 pounds on casing and 575 pounds on tubing from open hole at 5,928-6,813 feet. Pay was topped at 5,909 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 2,935-1.

Laan-Tex Oil Co., Dallas, staked No. 1 Russ Mathers as a wildcat 18 miles northwest of Robert Lee.

Location for the 7,000-foot rotary test is 2,200 feet from the southwest and 330 feet from the southeast lines of W. Scott Survey 8, A-635.

The New Seven Falls Oil Co. is to drill No. 1 R. B. Allen as a Jameson Field location.

It is projected to 6,500 feet with rotary, and is located 467 feet from the south and east lines of Section 1, J. O. West survey.

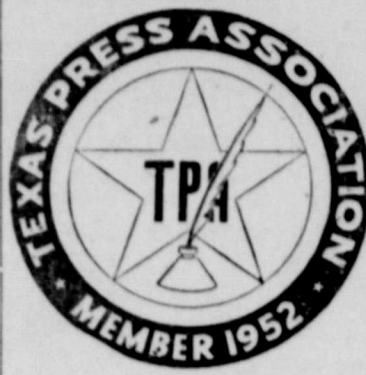

RED CROSS AID TO VICTIMS OF MARCH 21 TORNADOES NEARS MILLION DOLLAR MARK

The twisters destroyed 1,044 homes, caused other losses to 4,510 families, killed 214 persons, injured 2,000 others of whom 636 needed hospitalization. The Nelsons' young daughter was one of hundreds for whom Red Cross paid medical bills.

Meeting actual needs, not losses, Red Cross is aiding 775 families in rebuilding homes and additional hundreds are receiving awards—outright grants, not loans—to pay for household goods, medical bills, and other needs. Expenditures now are nearing the million dollar mark.

Less than two months ago, hundreds of families had a grim, uncertain future after March tornadoes slashed through seven Southern States. Among the more than 4,500 families who suffered tornado loss, these families faced a lifetime of indebtedness—hospital bills, doctor bills, mortgages. In many cases, the bread winner had been killed, or injured so badly that it would be weeks or months before the family again had an income. Meanwhile, they were homeless.

For help in meeting their needs, 2,337 families turned to the Red Cross. Today, 85 percent of them are off to a new start, with definite plans for their futures, and the financial means of making the plans work. The plans have been carefully made with Red Cross caseworkers, experts in family assistance, and the money to put the plans into action is there because people from all parts of the United States make it available when they give to the Red Cross.

To meet the emergency needs of the people in the 36 tornado areas, and to plan individually with each family for Red Cross rehabilitation assistance, a staff of nearly 200 Red Cross workers was on the job in the seven states. White County, Arkansas, where the tornadoes virtually wiped out the town of Judsonia and dealt heavy blows in the vicinity of Searcy and Bald Knob, is the only one of the 36 areas in which Red Cross workers still are engaged in individual family planning. There the Red Cross has completed assistance planning with 596 of the 876 families who have asked for help, and Red Cross commitments to provide the needed family aid, so far total \$328,735.

Total Red Cross commitments in the seven-state area now amount to \$890,000, just about half of what the Red Cross estimates the complete tornado operation will cost. Necessary Red Cross staff, with hundreds of chapter volunteers, will remain on the job in the seven states until every one of the 2,337 applications for Red Cross assistance has been handled, the amount of each applicant's need determined, and the needed assistance given. This probably will be mid-June.

The largest part of the \$890,000 committed by Red Cross so far is for assistance in rebuilding or repairing storm damaged homes and essential farm buildings, this phase of Red Cross rehabilitation now having passed the half-million dollar mark. With 1,044 dwellings destroyed in seven of the states, Red Cross has received applications for assistance in repairing or rebuilding 775.

The next most costly item of Red Cross assistance is for medical and nursing need. The tornadoes killed 214 persons and injured 1,820. Of those injured, 802 suffered serious injury and 636 were hospitalized. At the peak of the emergency, there were 22 Red Cross nursing staff members on duty, along with 140 volunteer nurses and 47 nurses paid by Red Cross for this operation. In addition, the Red Cross used the services of four Metropolitan Life

be found, most of the families applying for Red Cross assistance had substantial need which their own resources could not meet. Red Cross assistance has ranged from a few hundred dollars to thousands of dollars, depending upon each individual family's need.

One of the largest awards of Red Cross assistance was made to a Tennessee family. In three generations of this family, four persons were killed, including 13 members of the family required hospitalization. Red Cross assistance to this family includes payment of medical bills and rebuilding the farm home.

The Red Cross assistance this family received—assistance in meeting the tornado caused need that the family was unable to meet—is an outright gift, as is all Red Cross help given families
