Phone Co. Wants Change at Blackwell

The San Angelo Telephone Company has made a proposal to the patrons of the Blackwell exchange to install a dial system and remove the switchboard from the town effective July 1. Blackwell residents have registered strong protest to the measure and voted to join the Rural Cities Association in the San Angelo Telephone Co. area.

The group from Blackwell refused to negotiate with the telephone company officials, saying that the association would speak for them and make any negotiations.

Mayor H. O. Whitt of Bronte is president of the association and he conferred with John E. Robbins, manager of the phone company, Wednesday. However, Whitt said that he did not feel like trying to negotiate with the company without consulting the other members of the association.

He said that representatives from all member towns will get together in the near future and try to work out some manner of solving the problem confronting the people of Blackwell.

FARMERS URGED TO JOIN COTTON GROUPS

It's time to join a cotton improvement group.

This reminder comes to cotton farmers today from H. J. Matejowsky of Production & Marketing Administration's cotton classing office, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Abilene, Texas.

"If you belonged to a group last year, get with your neighbors and bring your organization up to date," Mr. Matejowsky said, adding, "and if you don't belong to one, join one."

He explained an application form could be obtained from the county PMA office, county agent, or local ginners.

Farmers who organize into improvement groups get two special benefits from USDA—free classification and market news service.

Both are provided for under the Smith-Doxey Act, which encourages farmers to grow improved varieties of cotton particularly adapted to their soil.

Mr. Matejowsky said that as soon as all farmers in the group have planted their cotton, the application for classing and market news service should be mailed to his office. Address is P. O. Box 2001, Abilene, Texas.

Humble Rawlings Gets Showing in Strawn Lime

Additional shows have been logged in Humble No. 1 Rawlings, Coke County wildcat C SE 397-1A-H&TC, three miles north of the Bronte field.

The prospector recovered 4,400 feet of free gas in the drillpipe and 90 feet of gas-cut mud, no shows of oil or water on a 45-minute drillstem test between 5,446-5,471 feet in a lime thought to be Strawn.

Operator was preparing to core deeper. This is the fifth showing

that has been found in the wildcat.

The Fort Chadbourne Field this week gained three producers. On the Coke County side of the field, northeast of Bronte, Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 59 Sallie Odom, Felix Sosa Survey 430, was completed.

During the daily potential test No. 59 Odom pumped 35.16 barrels of 42.3 gravity oil from 224 perforations at 5,388-5,422 feet. Operator set casing at 5,473 feet while total depth was 5,488 feet.

Other two producers are located in Runnels County.

Having a daily potential of 390.59 barrels of 43.2 gravity oil

was Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 64 Sallie Odom, J. S. Acklin Survey 299½.

Completion was on a ¾-inch choke with 6680 pounds pressure on the casing and tubing. Production is from an open hole at 5,413-80 feet with the pay section topped at 5,425 feet. No. 64 Odom had a gas-oil ratio of 879-1.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 74-B Sallie Odom, Pedro Martinez Survey 299, was potential for a daily gauge of 471.67 barrels of 44.5 gravity oil.

Production flowed through a ¾-inch choke with 675 pounds pressure on the casing and 600 pounds on the tubing from an open hole at 5,298-5,365 feet. Top of the pay section was 5,311 feet. The well, having a gas-oil ratio of 741-1, was treated with 2,900 gallons of acid.

In that same field, eight and one-half miles southwest of Wingate, Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 The Norton properties, L. N. Survey 66.6 has been plugged. Total depth was 5,780 feet, plugged back to 5,209 feet. A completion attempt at 5,342-62 feet failed.

Coke County Jameson Field, 16 miles northwest of Robert Lee, gained two producers this week.

Sun Oil Co. No. 32 C. E. Mathers, L. R. Mathers Survey, during the potential test gauged 296.88 barrels of 46 gravity oil.

Completion was on a ¾-inch choke with 575 pounds pressure on the casing and 350 pounds on the tubing. It is producing from an open hole at 6,029-69 feet, pay section topped at 6,030 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,618-1.

Having a daily gauge of 50.9 barrels of 46.1 gravity oil was Sun Oil Co. No. 34 C. E. Mathers same survey.

Oil flowed through a ¾ inch choke with packer set on the casing and 100 pounds tubing pressure. No. 34 Mathers is producing from an open hole at 6,042 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,830-1.

In the Coke County Lygga Caddo Field, 20 miles northwest of Robert Lee, A. G. Hill of Abilene No. 9 R. H. Harris Estate, Section 10, Winfield Scott Survey, has been plugged at 6,875 feet.

Seaboard Oil Co. of Delaware No. 4-A Billie Hanks was spotted in the Hylton Northwest Field, seven miles northeast of Blackwell in that county. Site for the 7,000 foot rotary project is 3,086 feet from the south and 1,593 feet from the east lines of Section 28, Block 2, T&P Survey.
