The San Angelo Telephone | Company has made a proposal to the patrons of the Blackwell exchange to install a dial system and remove the switchboard from the town effective July 1. Blackwell residents have registered strong protest to the measure and voted to join the Rural Cities Association in the San Angelo Telephone Co. area.

The group from Blackwell refused to negotiate with the telephone company officials, saying that the association would speak for them and make any negotia-

Mayor H. O. Whitt of Bronte is president of the association and he conferred with John E. Robbins, manager of the phone company, Wednesday. However, Whitt said that he did not feel like trying to negotiate with the company without consulting the other members of the association.

He said that representatives from all member towns will get together in the near future and try to work out some manner of solving the problem confronting the people of Blackwell.
