### LOCAL PERSONS IN ACCIDENT

Injured and hospitalized in San Angelo after an automobile accident on the Ballinger highway, near the San Angelo city limits, Wednesday night were three local people. Hospitalized were Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Millikin and R. S. Walton. Mrs. Walton was also in the automobile but was uninjured except for minor cuts and bruises.

The Millikin automobile was in collision with a pick up truck, driven by Charles Benjamin Schniers of Miles at about 7:30 p. m. Highway patrolman Frank Perkins, who investigated the accident, said that it was believed the collision was caused by a third vehicle which pulled onto the highway as the Schnier and Millikin cars were passing.

Mrs. Millikin sustained a fractured left arm, cuts, bruises and a nose injury; Millikin was suffering with cuts, bruises and possible internal injuries, the extent of which were not known Thursday and Walton had a chipped hip bone. He underwent surgery yesterday morning at 10:30 for the injury and was reported resting well after the operation.

Schniers was not hurt in the accident which turned his pick up over but extensive damage was reported on both cars.

### Phone Rates Being Discussed Again

The San Angelo Telephone Company is again demanding a rate raise in the rural towns of this area served by the company. A meeting was held in San Angelo last Thursday night to discuss the matter and members of the Rural Cities Association, after much discussion, went on record as favoring a 33 per cent raise in the rates.

John E. Robbins, commercial manager for the company, held out that the company needs a larger raise than was proposed by the representatives of the small towns. About a year ago the company stated they would have to increase the rates 100 per cent in order to make a "fair profit on their investment."

## Council Asks Residents To Save Water Supply

Bronte's water supply is getting shorter by the day and the dry winds which have been blowing for the past several days are hastening the depletion of the supply, Mayor H. O. Whitt said Wednesday.

The Mayor has asked The Enterprise to publish the request of the city council that all watering of yards and gardens and washing of cars be stopped immediately.

Whitt said that he hopes residents of Bronte will voluntarily cooperate in the conservation

measures, so the council will not have to pass an ordinance to enforce them.

"We have about a 30-day supply of water left," the Mayor said, "and possibly it will last longer than that if everybody will do his part to save it and the wind doesn't cause too much of it to evaporate."

Bronte people are eagerly awaiting the day when they can obtain water from the newly built Oak Creek reservoir. Work is progressing on the pipeline which will bring the water to Bronte, as well as on the dam itself, which is nearing completion.

### Oil News

No official reports were available as to the amount of oil it made, but Humble No. 3 Olive Mae Keeney, Bronte field test, had oil "running all over the place," according to observers, Wednesday on a drillstem test of the Capps formation just below 4,600 feet. Operator was drilling ahead as the contract calls for testing of the Goens which has been found in the field just below 4,900 feet.

It was also reported that Fullerton No. 1 W. H. Mackey had a good showing Wednesday between 3,400 and 3,500 feet. It was scheduled to be drillstem tested Thursday and no results of the test were available at press time Thursday.

### Commissioners In Special Session

Coke County Commissioners Court held a special meeting Monday morning. Main purpose of the meeting was to grant an easement to the UCRA for laying a pipeline along the county road right-of-way from Fort Chadbourne to Bronte.

Judge Jeff Dean said that the commissioners also set new boundary lines for the Justice of the Peace Precincts of the county. The new J. P. Precincts coincide with Commissioner precincts.

The Justice of the Peace in Precinct 1 will take care of duties in Precinct 3, Judge Dean said, while the Bronte J. P. will look after matters in Precincts 2 and 4.

The Commissioners will meet again July 7 as a Board of Equalization, Dean said.
