Bronte School District Voters Defeat Bonds

Patrons of the Bronte Independent school district turned down the \$260,000 bond issue by a vote of 243 to 142 last Saturday.

The proposal to issue \$260,000 in bonds was for the erection of a new elementary school building.

Two other propositions were also on the ballot and were also defeated. The second was a proposal to levy a maintenance tax and the third would have provided for assumption of the bonded indebtedness if the first proposal had been approved.

Sweetwater Trio In Accident Here

Another auto accident occurred near Bronte last Tuesday afternoon, injuring two persons, though it was not believed that they were seriously injured.

The accident happened three miles west of Bronte when C. C. Smith, 60, of Sweetwater lost control of his Studebaker and it rolled over. SECOND PRIMARY BALLOT TO HAVE FEW NAMES ON IT

Seven names will appear on the August 23 run-off election ballot here. Only one County office is at stake however. That is the hotly contested spot for Commissioner in Precinct 3 between Ed Hickman and T. R. Harmon, incumbent.

Heading the ballot will be the name of Martin Dies of Lufkin, seeking nomination for the place of Congressman-At-Large. A run-off developed in the race when Dies, who led, failed to poll the necessary majority over John Lee Smith of Lubbock. Smith has since withdrawn from the race and Dies is the only candidate for the nomination.

For Supreme Court Justice, Frank P. Culver of Tarrant County opposes Spurgeon Bell of Harris County. Culver led in the July Primary.

For 51st district judge, Clyde Vinson and Joe L. Mays, both well known and popular attorneys in San Angelo, seek the nomination.

Absentee voting has already begun and persons who desire to vote absentee should either go to the County Clerk's office at the Court House in Robert Lee and vote or send their application for an absentee ballot to County Clerk Weidon Fikes and a ballot will be mailed to the applicant.

Water Still Scarce But Seep Hole Is Helping

Bronte's water situation was still on the "critical" list this week, though somewhat improved over last week.

City officials have had a seep hole dug in the bed of the Colorado River and it apparently is going to help in supplying thirsty Bronte residents.

Mayor H. O. Whitt said Wednesday that the hole was pumped

all day Tuesday and that he could not tell it if the water level lowered any. Water is still being obtained from the lake on the Ballinger highway also.

The Mayor repeated his request of the past two weeks that all residents of Bronte quit using city water to irrigate lawns, flowers, gardens, etc. He said the situation is still so critical that none

can be spared for non-essential uses. A few residents have reported to The Enterprise that they are going to haul water once in awhile to keep their lawns and trees from dying.

Meanwhile unseasonable heat, even for mid-August, continues increasing the water consumption of the town. Temperatures reached the 100 mark for several consecutive days and the "possible showers" forecast for this vicinity had failed to materialize late Wednesday.

Work on the filter plant in the north part of town is going ahead and the contractor is scheduled to finish laying the eight-inch part of the pipeline this week. The line from Oak Creek reservoir will be completed with six-inch pipe on into Bronte.

And at the site of the dam, construction work is almost finished. The road on top of the dam has been completed, the highway bridge is practically complete and about all that lacks completion is the asphalt topping on the highway and a little work on the spillway.

1. DOES EXERCISE STRAIN THE HEART?
2. CAN CLUBFOOT BE CORRECTED?
3. WHO DISCOVERED PENICILLIN?

Answer to Question No. 1: Moderate exercise cannot strain a basically sound heart. Exercise is beneficial for most people because it stimulates circulation and digestion. Excessive exercise by people not used to it can be harmful, and people with heart disease should follow the advice of their physician. Cardiologists (heart specialists) are developing a system of gradual exercise to improve the functioning of the damaged heart. With the approach of the summer months, be sure NOT to over-exercise.

Answer to Question No. 2: Clubfoot is a deformity found at birth that causes one foot or both feet to turn in abnormally. If treated properly and promptly, the deformity can be corrected not only from the standpoint of function but also appearance. "Promptly" means in early infancy. Treatment is rather prolonged.

Answer to Question No. 3: In 1928 Dr. Alexander Fleming discovered a mold on a culture plate that had been left uncovered. The mold was dissolving a group of germs (staphylococci). Thirteen years later Sir Howard Florey and Dr. Ernst Chain completed the research, and the modern technique of drug production made penicillin available in quantity for use during and since World War II. In 1945 these three men shared a Nobel Prize. The seventy-year old Fleming and his teammates are continuing this research work. (Copyright 1951 by Health Information Foundation)

FORT WORTH—The Monday trade on cattle and calves at Fort Worth was very slow with a weak to unevenly lower undertone. Some of the best fed cattle and fat calves held about steady with other slaughter classes weak to 50 cents, spots \$1, and more lower. Stockers and feeders were the slowest in several weeks. Some feeder heifers and thin stocker cows sold near steady but other stockers, and especially calves, were sharply lower, some drastic declines in effect later in the day.

Butcher hogs advanced 50 per hundred and sows were 50 cents to \$1 higher. The restriction on sending feeder pigs back to the country was still in effect and any pigs that were on the market had to sell for slaughter at sharply reduced prices.

Sheep and lambs generally held steady prices as compared with the previous week's close. Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings cashed at \$26 to \$32.50. Plain and medium slaughter kinds sold at \$15 to \$27 and cull yearlings \$12 to \$14.

Fat cows brought \$14 to \$17, and canners and cutters cashed at \$8 to \$14, some old shells under \$8. Bulls drew \$13 to \$22. Good and choice slaughter calves sold at \$25 to \$28 and plain and medium butcher sorts cashed at \$16 to \$24, with culls from \$12 to \$15.

Good and choice stocker calves drew \$24 to \$29 and plain to medium quality sold for \$16 to \$22. Stocker and feeder steers and yearlings of good and choice kinds sold at \$22 to \$25.50, and common to medium sorts sold at \$15 to \$20. Stocker cows drew \$14 to \$18.

Good and choice butcher hogs reached a top of \$23.25, most sales \$23 down. Sows cashed at \$16 to \$19. Pigs sold at \$10 to \$12.

Medium, good and choice fat Spring lambs sold at \$20 to \$27 and stocker and feeder lambs sold at \$12 to \$20. Stocker and feeder yearlings cashed at \$10 to \$15. Old wethers sold from \$10 down. Two-year-olds sold from \$12 downward. Slaughter ewes cashed at \$6 to \$7.50.

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50A, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 50A which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50A. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural
