

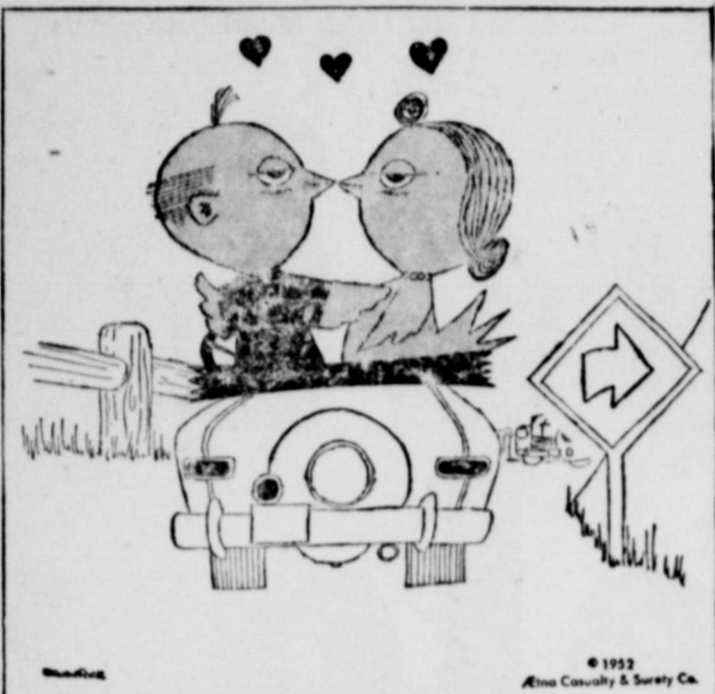

SEPTEMBER 6 DEADLINE FOR CAR INSPECTION IS GETTING CLOSE

The two inspection centers for automobiles in Bronte warned this week that the time is growing short for having cars inspected, in accordance with the law.

Caperton Chevrolet Co. and Home Motor Co. are the only two inspection stations in Bronte.

Matthew Caperton of the Chevrolet firm said last week that an official of the Texas Highway Department of Public Safety told him that fewer than one-third of the cars in Coke County carry the sticker which is given when an automobile is okayed for use on the highways.

Bob Knierim of the Home Motor Co. said he thought it would be impossible to inspect all the cars in this area which have not

been inspected before the Sept. 6 deadline.

Meanwhile a movement is underway to get the deadline moved up again. It was postponed until Sept. 6 last spring. There is also much talk about repealing the law when the legislature convenes again.

However, officials advised motorists to have their cars inspected, regardless of how unpopular the law may be. "It is the law," they say.

Spokesmen for both Home Motor Co. and Capertons said they would greatly appreciate having auto owners bring their cars in just as soon as possible instead of waiting until the last few days before the deadline.

Last Rites Held Here Saturday for J. W. C. Warner, 84

Last rites were held at 3 p. m. Saturday for Joseph W. C. Warner, 84, pioneer of this section. He had lived in and around Coke County since 1890.

Mr. Warner died at 8:30 Friday morning, August 8, at the Bronte Hospital, after an illness of 12 days. He had been in failing health for the past several months however.

Funeral services were conducted at the Kickapoo Baptist church with Elders C. W. Coleman and C. L. Carroll officiating. Interment was in the Fairview cemetery, with Cliff Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Warner was born in Trinity County, Texas on January 15, 1868, the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Warner.

Mr. Warner had farmed and ranched in this section for more than 60 years. He was married in 1894 to Miss Ester Herron, who survives him. He was a Christian for over 70 years, having been converted and joined the Baptist Church when he was 14 years of age. He joined the Kickapoo Baptist Church in 1921 and was ordained a deacon in the church in 1922.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Earnest Warner of Vancouver, Wash., and Joe Warner of Stamford; four daughters, Mrs. Martha Alexander, Mrs. Ella Pruitt, Mrs. Opal Beaver and Mrs. Pearl Mae Andrews, all of Bronte; two sisters, Mrs. Mattie Gibson and Mrs. Ruth Spencer, both of Bronte; 19 grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

Palbearers were Noah Pruitt, Jr., Francis Pruitt, Dwain Pruitt, Jethel Warner, Warren Beaver, Eddie Alexander, Jim Sanker and Bill Labenske, all grandsons of Mr. Warner. Honorary palbearers were the deacons of the Kickapoo Baptist Church.

Coke County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, ending their session as a Board of Equalization. They approved the county bills and approved an order to issue and sell \$175,000 in bonds for the Silver Common school district to the Columbian Securities Co.

Water Problem Still Bad As City Turns to River for Its Supply

Bronte's water problem was going from bad to worse this week, with many residents on the west side of town being completely out of water most of the time. Residents in the lower east and south parts of town were

much more fortunate as they are connected with the lines which bring the water into town and have the first chance at it.

Mayor H. O. Whitt said Wednesday that the city will now be entirely dependent on the river

and the wells near the river, as the lake on the Ballinger highway is completely dry.

The Mayor said the seep hole which has been dug in the river bed is supplying a large quantity of water. He said he believes that enough water is available to "tide us over if everybody will do his part in saving it." The main problem is in getting the water pumped to town, he added.

Whitt also said he would like to urge everybody who lives in the south and east parts of town to be considerate in their use of water, so that those residents

living west of the railroad may have some. "Those of us who live in the lower part of town and along the lines coming into town can use every bit of the water we are capable of pumping, leaving those on the west side completely without water. I think we should be considerate of these people and use no more water than is absolutely necessary for household use," the mayor said.

A booster pump was being installed Wednesday to help in getting water into town. It is being set at the south edge of the city. Officials said they believe it will help a great deal in increasing the amount of water which can be pumped through the four inch line from the river.

The pipeline from Oak Creek lake is within 3 1/2 miles of Bronte and the filter plant on the north side of town is coming along according to schedule, it was reported. Once this line is completed and the lake gets some water in it, Bronte will have an abundant water supply.

BRONTE SCHOOL SET TO OPEN ON SEPTEMBER 1

Opening date for the 1952-53 school year has been set for Monday, September 1. Supt. J. L. Carroll said Thursday. Carroll said that the plans were made before the water shortage became so acute, virtually leaving the part of the town where the school is located with no water at all. He said that if present conditions still exist September 1, plans are underway to erect a storage tank on the school campus, and water will be hauled for school needs.

Other problems confronting the school officials and board of trustees are the hiring of four new teachers. The resignations of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Miller, Miss Betty Anderson and Miss Norma Turner have been accepted. Mr. and Mrs. Miller and Miss Sanderson resigned to accept positions in the Snyder schools. All except Mr. Miller were grade school teachers and he was high school science teacher. Mrs. Miller was also girls athletic coach.

Some applications had been received but no action was taken at the Monday night meeting of the board of trustees.

Santa Fe Trucks On New Routes

Direct truck service between Galveston and Houston in the Gulf area and Lubbock and Amarillo in the Panhandle will be inaugurated today (August 11) by the Santa Fe Trail Transportation Company, J. P. Cowley, vice-president and general manager of the Santa Fe Railway, Galveston, announced today. "The direct intra-state service will be operated by the SFTTC in coordination with the Railway and will provide a muchly desired freight handling to many main and intermediate points," Cowley said.

The new operation was made possible through authority recently granted to extend truck service between Lubbock and Amarillo.

Intermediate points benefiting between Lubbock and Amarillo include: Abernathy, Hale Center, Plainview, Kress, Tulia, Happy and Canyon.

The widespread intra-state operation of the coordinated truck train service now extends from Camp Hawze and Gainsville to Fort Worth and Dallas and southwest through Stephenville and Brownwood; southeast through Lometa, Killeen, Temple, Caldwell, Breneham and intermediate points; to Houston, Billville, Wallis and Thompsons and through Rosenberg and Richmond, Alvin and other points to Texas City and Galveston. The network operates to San Angelo and Ballinger, Coleman, Abilene, Sweetwater, Roscoe, Snyder, Lamesa, Seagraves, Slaton and north into the Panhandle.

R. V. Hinderliter traffic manager of the Trail Transportation Company, announced that with the extension of this service, the process of handling freight will be greatly expedited and all communities would benefit through the amplified service.

Authority for operations between Houston and Brownwood was granted last April.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50A, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 50A which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50A. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

Gowan of Clay County was loading better than 400 steers on rail cars at Bellevue when the main frightened the cattle and they tore down the fence and spilled all over the place. He was delivering the steers to the Corbett Ranch of Breckenridge in Stephens county. Some of the cattle rampaged for ten miles before being rounded up again.

Both Gowan and Corbett are well known at Fort Worth and ship many top quality cattle to market each year. The late Quincy Corbett, in addition to being a fine ranchman, was also one of the best cattle feeders in Texas and before his death, annually topped the market with prime finished heifers or steer yearlings.
