cation Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the es-

tablishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."
"AGAINST the Contitutional

Amendment providing for the es-tablishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expresing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by

same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publica-tion and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.




