## Oil News

Oil play in the Bronte area appeared to be on the upgrade this week after practically being at a standstill for some time because of the shortage of tubular steel.

It was reported this week that five additional rigs were being moved into the Bronte area in the next few days, and apparently this is correct as several have been seen going through Bronte, heading for the Fort Chadbourne field.

Rowan Drilling Co. was moving in another rig this week between Bronte and Ballinger. This makes three rigs for that company in this area.

The rig used to drill Humble No. 1 M. A. Rawlings, discovery well three miles north of Bronte, was moved on to Bob Butler's place to drill an offset to the No. 1 Rawlings. This rig has been stacked.

Humble has cleaned off two locations in the Bronte field in its Olive Mae Keeney lease. Also, Humble recently released the daily potential figures for its No. 3 Keeney. The well flowed 217.03 barrels of 48.3 gravity oil in 24 hours. It is a three-quarter mile extension to the Bronte-Gens lime field.

A large number of persons were seeking housing in Bronte this week, and many more who are to be employed here were going to other towns because of the water shortage here.

In addition to the drilling crews, Atlantic pipeline is putting another man on at their pump station here.

## Workers for School Lunchroom and Bus Drivers Hired

Mrs. Monroe Alexander, Mrs. Mary Walker, Mrs. T. G. Gleghorn, Mrs. W. B. McShan and Mrs. T. E. Tidwell have been hired as workers at the school lunchroom for the school term which opens Sept. 1.

Mrs. Alexander will be supervisor again this year. The action was taken at a meeting of the Board of Trustees last week. A new double oven stove was purchased for the lunchroom and the trustees are considering the possibility of air conditioning the lunchroom.

Bus drivers for the school system were also rehired, with the exception of Frank Miller, who has resigned. They are T. G. Gleghorn, Mrs. T. E. Tidwell, Mrs. W. B. McShan and Mrs. Pete Gentry.

All routes this fall will have new buses, three of which are Chevrolets and two are Internationals. All are fully equipped with heaters, defrosters and ventilators and Supt. Carroll said they are looking forward to buying mud chains for them.

Forty new desks have been ordered for the 4th grade room and the school is being repaired and painted this week. Additional classrooms are being fixed up in the basement of the building.

Supt. Carroll also said that the price on school lunches probably will have to go up from 25 cents to 30 cents this fall. Federal aid to the school has been cut from 7 cents to 5 cents for lunches with milk and from 5 cents to 3 cents on lunches without milk. Carroll said that last year the lunchroom showed a loss of \$211.94, provided the school gets all the reimbursement that is coming to it. However, he warned that the school may not get reimbursed for April and May, which will bring the total loss for the lunchroom to \$521.26.

The school lunchroom last year served 26,839 lunches, or an average of 155 each day. The loss was about 1.9 cents on each lunch served.

## Drouth Aid Meet Held in Abilene

Members of the Coke County Mobilization Committee attended a meeting in Abilene Monday for the purpose of discussing the drouth disaster loan program.

Under Secretary of Agriculture C. J. McCormick, Washington, D. C., told the group of the help which the Department of Agriculture could be. B. F. Vance, chairman of the state PMA committee, had charge of the meeting.

The farmers and ranchers of Coke County can now obtain loans to buy feed for their livestock. These loans are available to farmers to buy feed and seed to produce another crop. These loans are available only to those farmers and ranchers who can not obtain operating loans from banks or other private lending agencies. The loans will be made through the Farm Home Administration of the county.

Attending from Coke County were Oscar E. Kresta, chairman of the PMA committee; Clarence E. Arrott, vice chairman; A. V. Sheppard, work unit conservationist with the SCS; George Thomas, member of FHA committee; and J. E. Quisenberry, Jr., secretary of the Coke County PMA.

A movement was underway this week to urge Gov. Alan Shivers to ask President Truman to declare the entire state a drouth disaster area. This has been done in several southern states and federal aid is being given them.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38**

providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50A, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State

"Sec. 50A. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the es-

tablishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."  
Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

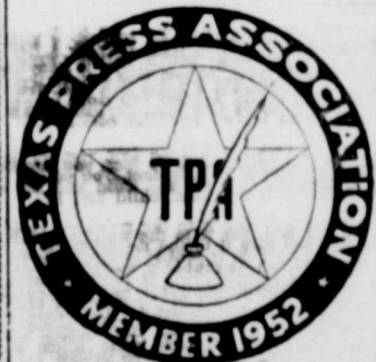

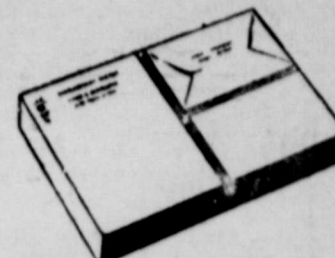

## VOTE FOR CLYDE VINSON FOR JUDGE OF THE 51ST DISTRICT COURT



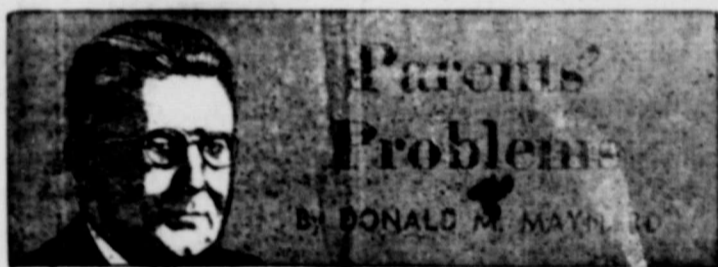

Clyde Vinson's opponent does not claim any district court trial experience. The qualifications for a county judge and district judge differ so profoundly that under our Constitution a county judge does not have to be a lawyer. WILL YOU VOTES FOR THE MAN WITH QUALIFICATIONS OR FOR THE MAN ON THE POLITICAL MERRY-GO-ROUND?



Our teen-age son is causing us considerable trouble. He does not enjoy staying at home as he formerly did but is continually running about with the gang. When we urge him to stay at home he says he wants to have fun with his friends. What should we do?

Permit me to suggest the following:

1. Accept his behavior as being more or less normal for a boy of his age. Remember that it is exceedingly important for his own sense of worth that he "fun" with his peers. Furthermore, he feels torn by conflicting emotions. In many respects he is a child, but in others he is maturing rapidly. He is trying to convince himself that he is grown up and one way to do this is to run around with the gang most of the time rather than to stay at home with his family.

2. Try to be understanding of him as you possibly can. It may help to think of your own teens. Did you not try to break the strings that tied you to your home? Keep in mind, however, the fact that the community and society patterns then were not the same as they are now.

3. Don't scold or nag about what he is doing.

4. Encourage him to bring his friends to your home, but remember that he will not do so unless there is something there to appeal to them. Have available things that adolescents enjoy, such as records—yes, even jazz—games, and a ping-pong table. When the youngsters come, give them the freedom they crave and let them do what they want to do. Have plenty to eat.

5. If he doesn't respond to your suggestions and invite his friends to, accept let me urge you not to nag. Accept the fact that, for a time he will be running around with the gang most of the time.

Let me urge you, also, to assume that he will do that which is right to be right when he is out with the gang. Adolescents may not show it, but they will love when they find that parents do not trust them.

I do not want my little seventeen-month-old girl to be selfish. I want to teach her to share her toys with other children. When she is playing with her doll and our neighbor drops in, should I take the doll from her and give it to the neighbor's child, who is two months older, and vice versa?

Of course your daughter doesn't want to give up her doll. In fact, you can be thankful that she doesn't as it indicates that she is a normal child and has a will and a mind of her own.

Should you forcibly take the doll from her and give it to the neighbor child, it certainly wouldn't miraculously make her unselfish. It probably would do just the opposite. The spirit of unselfishness comes from within; it can't be forced upon one. If you should take the doll from her and give it to the neighbor child, your daughter probably would feel bewildered and resentful. Her sense of security would be lessened as she discovered that the one upon whom she thought she could depend had "turned against her." So in answer to your question, let me say "no."

It is essential to be sure that children should learn to be unselfish and to share their toys with others. It should be remembered, however, that these learnings come slowly and that we must not expect our children to be more unselfish than is normal for their age. Your seventeen-month-old daughter is almost too young to learn even the value of taking turns. As she gets older, however, and increasingly plays with other children, she gradually will learn that it pays to take turns. As she learns really to like other children, there will be a greater incentive to share with them.

Who don't you have several different toys, and perhaps dolls, on hand so that when the neighbor girl visits there will be a doll for her, too, even though it will not be the favorite doll of your daughter? Scenes frequently can be avoided by directing the attention of children away from that which they cannot have to something that is interesting to them. Have something planned for the neighbor child when she comes.

On the other hand, it may be that if the neighbor girl brings her own doll when she visits, both she and your daughter will be willing to exchange dolls for a while, although it is by no means certain that this will be the case. If you can incidentally arrange the situation so that your little girl's doll is not in evidence when the neighbors visit, that may help.
