Bronte Hospital Open House Will Be Sunday

Dr. John R. Harris is inviting the public to view the new wings of the Bronte hospital on Sunday, August 31. All the work on the enlarging and remodeling project will be completed at that time.

The room capacity of the hospital has been nearly doubled by the addition of the new wings. Formerly, the hospital had a capacity of eight beds; now the normal capacity is 14 and 18 can be used if necessary.

Work on the new wings was started about the middle of May. The north wing houses a new delivery room, nursery, out-patient room, labor room and main operating room. The new south wing has two single and two double patient rooms and a kitchen. Two large central heating and refrigerated air conditioning units have been installed, insuring proper temperatures in the patient rooms the year-round.

In the old part of the hospital, doors to the rooms have been widened so that a hospital bed may be rolled through them. New furniture has been purchased for the entire building and tile floors put down.

Dr. Harris came to Bronte July 15, 1947 when the Karen-Gay Hospital was opened by J. M. Ripptoe. He leased the hospital from Ripptoe about a year later and operated it under lease until a year ago when he purchased it. At about that time Dr. Harris opened a clinic next door to the hospital, where he also has his office. It is known as the John Harris Clinic.

The hospital will now be called the Bronte Hospital, Dr. Harris said. He is hanging a plaque in the lobby with the following inscription on it: "This hospital was built in 1947 by J. M. Ripptoe and named for his daughters, Belva Karen and Nona Gaylor."

The Doctor said that he is very proud of the newly enlarged and remodeled hospital and that he is glad to be able to furnish the people of this area with the most

School Repairs Almost Finished

Remodeling, repainting and repair work on the Bronte school is almost complete and is expected to be finished by the time school opens next Tuesday. Rearrangements of the classrooms had been effected in order to group the lower grades, junior high grades and high school grades as nearly in the same part of the building as possible.

A band room is being constructed along the west end of the gymnasium. The third and fourth grades will be housed in the east side of the basement. The 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grades will be on the third floor, as will the grade school principal's office, the choral and science rooms.

On the second floor will be the home making department, the 9th, 10th, 11th grade rooms, the high school principal's office and the superintendents office.

In the new part of the building the 1st and 2nd grades will have rooms on the first floor, with the study hall and 12th grade room on the second floor. Agriculture students will meet as usual in their building across the street from the campus.

Many of the rooms have received new paint jobs, new floors and new bulletin boards. A teachers storeroom and workroom has been built at the south end of the 4th grade room in the basement. New desks have been ordered for this room, with delivery expected about October 1.

Of these employees, Mrs. Landers, Mrs. Scott and Mrs. Richards have been with Dr. Harris and the hospital since the start and all except the trainees and Miss Lasswell have worked there over three years.

That Tired Feeling Can Be Caused from A Number of Things During Summer

"It must be the heat," is a common excuse these days for a run-down, no-good feeling. "The heat saps my strength," "All the starch has been taken out of me"—any number of sad tunes in the same key are offered as an excuse to get out of a tennis game or a dinner date. These fagged-out persons probably wish they had more git-up-and-go, but they just don't know how to come by it. Since causes for summertime tiredness may be

Why, each of its victims should look into his daily routine.

First of all, does he get enough sleep? The usual six or eight hours is not enough if it is broken by leaving to swat mosquitoes, get up and quiet a baby suffering with prickly heat or colic, or yell at the neighbors holding a watermelon party in their backyard. Of course, the obvious thing to do is to get rid of the cause of sleeplessness if possible.

Next, the worn-out fellow might think about the exercise he is getting. Is it enough or too much? Too little exercise can lead to sleep counting. On the other hand, it takes only common sense to know that 18 holes of golf in the midday sun is not good for comfort, much less for sleep. Swimming and sunning between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. can have the additional danger of sunburn, itself a sleep killer at times.

Diet is important. Because of less activity during the heat and because of the heat itself, the appetite may be expected to fall off. This is little excuse, however, for making snacks a regular routine or for "living out of cans." Even though less food may be needed, the right balance of fats, carbohydrates, and proteins is just as important as in cooler weather.

The amount of salt which a person should have during hot weather varies some unduly. In general, unless one does hard

physical labor at extremely high temperatures in dry surroundings, he will not need any more salt than usual. If an extra amount is needed, however, there are any number of methods for getting it; salt can be used more freely in cooking or can be added to tomato juice, soup broth, or even beer. Salty foods such as crackers and sardines might be added to the diet. Still other ways are to take salt tablets by mouth (which occasionally may cause nausea and vomiting) or to dissolve a small amount of table salt in the drinking water.

A common question is what the temperature of drinking water should be. That is a matter of personal preference, as there is little evidence that cool water itself is harmful. Regardless of its temperature, large amounts of water as well as other liquids, are called for when the mercury soars. In moderation carbonated drinks and beverages such as iced tea and coffee are helpful.

Constipation, which may occur more often during summer, should be treated with an oil or vegetable laxative rather than a stronger medicine such as epsom salts.

Above all, if the weatherman predicts a severe heat wave, sickness such as heat exhaustion, sun stroke, and heat camps must be prevented by avoiding exercise, especially hard exercise, in the noon-day heat, by making working and living quarters as cool as possible; by taking sufficient liquid by mouth; and, if necessary, by increasing the amount of salt in the diet.

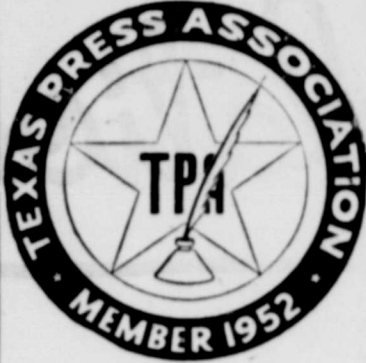

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK



Fort Worth — Heavy receipts again featured livestock marketing at Fort Worth and other points around the market circle. Prices of cows and bulls on Monday were 50 cents and spots \$1 lower, and grass steers and yearlings suffered a similar decline. Values were uneven, however, with prices steady on good and choice fed cattle, and steady on good choice fat calves. The medium and lower grade calves eased off 50 cents or more per hundred. High grade stocker cattle and calves ruled steady but the plainer quality was weak to lower.

The Monday reports from 12 major markets showed the biggest cattle run of the season, over 127,000, 28,000 above a week earlier and 54,000 ahead of a year ago on the same day.

Hog topped at Fort Worth at \$21.50, around 25 cents lower. Sows were steady at \$15 to \$18.

Sheep and lambs were steady, except some of the lightweight feeder lambs recovered some of last week's losses.

A few good and choice fed steers and yearlings brought \$26 to \$32, a package weighing 904 pounds from H. M. Erwin, Ledonia, at \$32. Common, plain and medium kinds drew \$15 to \$25. Cows drew \$13.50 to \$18, odds higher, canners and cutters got \$9 to \$15.50. Bulls sold at \$14 to \$22.50.

Good and choice fat calves \$25 to \$28, plain and medium sorts \$15 to \$24, culls \$12 to \$15.

Good and choice stocker and feeder calves and yearlings sold at \$25 to \$31, a load from L. L. Edwards, Jack County, at 578 pounds at \$31, and a load from W. M. and R. E. Shutts, Clay County, averaged 465 pounds at \$30. Common, plain and medium sorts sold from \$17 to \$24. Stocker cows drew \$14 to \$20. Older steers sold largely at \$24.50 and down.

Good and choice fat Spring lambs sold for \$25 to \$28, and medium to good kinds sold for \$20 to \$25, with culls down from \$10 to \$15. Stocker and feeder Spring lambs brought \$10 to \$19. Fat yearling wethers cashed at \$15 to \$18, and stocker and feeder kinds drew \$10 to \$15.

Slaughter ewes sold from \$6.50 to \$8.50, the canner ewes at the best price at Fort Worth in several weeks. Two-year-old wethers sold at \$15 down. Old bucks cashed around \$6.50.
