Bronte Blasts Ira 39-12 Last Friday

The Bronte Longhorns stomped over the Ira Bulldogs by a score of 39-12. The Longhorns, playing a great offensive game, made 13 first downs to Ira's 12. The Bulldogs did all of their scoring in the second half while the Bronte reserves were playing.

Bronte scored first in the first quarter when Gentry plunged over from the yard line. J. O. Bagwell kicked the conversion to make the score 7-0.

Second Longhorn Touchdown came after the Longhorns took over on downs on the Ira 40. From there Bronte went all the way with Enzor going over the 3 yard marker. Bagwell again kicked the extra point. The score then stood Bronte 14, Ira 0.

The next Longhorn score came in the second period after Bagwell intercepted a Bulldog pass on the Ira 29. From there the Longhorns continued the drive, for their third touchdown with Stephenson going around right end from the one yard marker. The conversion was missed on an attempted placement by Bagwell. This ended the scoring in the first half with Bronte leading 20 to 0.

Ira came back in the third quarter to score their first touchdown. Woosley, the Ira quarterback, went around right from the five yard line. On the try for the extra point, Woosley passed to Sumrall, the left end, but it was not counted because of an offside penalty against Ira.

The next Ira touchdown came in the fourth period on a pass play from Woosley to Maupin, the right end. The play netted 10 yards. The try for conversion through center failed.

The Longhorns scored another TD in the third quarter. Lyndon Waldrop romped around right end from his own 20 to go 80 yards for the fourth Longhorn

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK
BY TED GOULDY

Fort Worth—Heavy pressure continued on cattle and calf prices this week. Another excessive run of grassers and short feds appeared at the 12 major markets Monday when over 165,000 cattle and calves appeared and roughly 75 per cent of these were grassers and stockers and feeders at many markets. This was over 23,000 over a week earlier and over 42,000 over the same day last year.

Most cattle and calves ruled 50 cents to 11 or more lower at Fort Worth, with some spots \$1 to \$1.50 off on calves and yearlings and the plain and medium steers. Stocker demand remained narrow over the country and packers reported excessive supplies of meat other than strictly choice fed beef.

Deterioration of pastures in Kansas and Oklahoma increased the rush from those areas. Continued lack of moisture dampened prospects for wheat grazing over the Texas-Oklahoma-Kansas plains.

Hogs opened the week with 25 to 50 cents higher prices and a top of \$20.75 to \$21. Sows drew \$17.50 down. Sheep and lambs opened steady.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings sold for \$23 to \$30, odd club calves \$33 to \$34, while the plain and medium slaughter kinds sold at \$14 to \$22 with cutter grades from \$10 to \$14. Stocker steer yearlings bulked at \$14 to \$24, with a few choice lightweights to \$26. Stocker heifers sold from \$22 down.

Fat cows cashed at \$13.50 to \$17, with canners and cutters at \$9 to \$13.10. Stocker cows sold from \$14 to \$18.50. Bulls sold \$12 to \$19.

Good and choice slaughter calves cleared at \$20 to \$27 and plain and medium slaughter kinds sold from \$14 to \$19, with cull sorts from \$10 to \$14. Good and choice stocker calves sold mostly at \$20 to \$27, while plain medium sorts sold from \$15 to \$19.

Good and choice fat lambs sold from \$18 to \$22 and stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$10 to \$17. Cull lambs, yearlings and two's sold from \$8 to \$10. Fresh shorn lambs and sheep usually sold \$1 to \$2 under woolskins.

Yearling wethers sold at \$17 \$17 down, and two-year-olds soft from \$12.50 down. Aged wethers cashed at \$10 down. Slaughter ewes sold from \$5.50 to \$7, and some solid mouthed ewes drew \$7 to \$8.50. Old bucks cashed at \$6 to \$6.50. Feeder yearlings sold from \$10 to \$12.

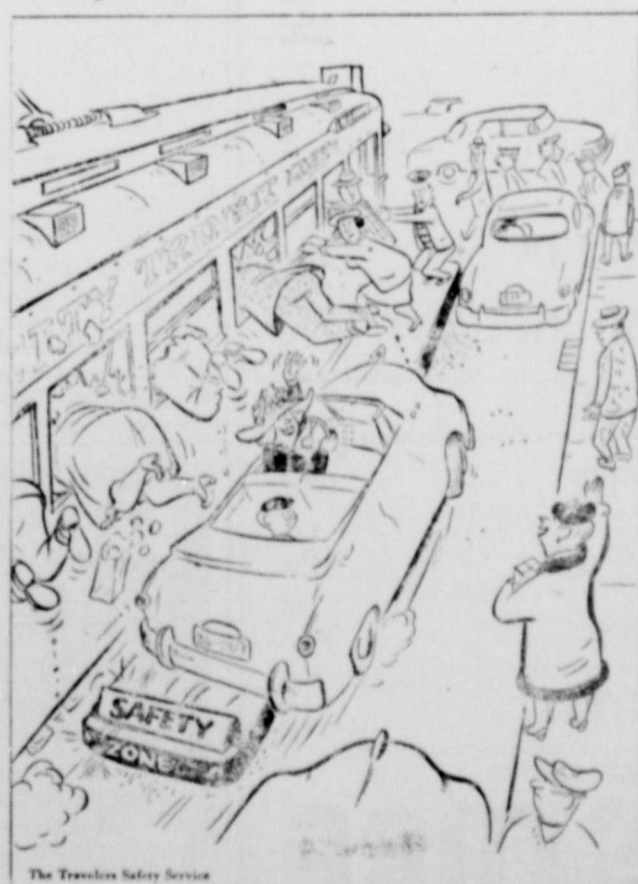
Mrs. BRIDGE HAS PROGRESSIVE CLUB
