## Trent Plays the Longhorns Fri.

The Bronte Longhorns journeyed to Coahoma last Friday night and suffered their first defeat of the season. The Bulldogs, a much larger and more experienced ball club, romped over the Longhorns by a score of 35-6. The Longhorns could never seem to get rolling in the first half, making only 2 first downs.

The first Coahoma score came after Kiser, the Bronte punter, kicked into the end zone and was brought out to the 20 yard line. From there the Bulldogs went all the way with Springfield going over from the one yard marker. Bill Read kicked the conversion to make the score 7 to 0.

Later in the same period Rob-

inson intercepted a Longhorn pass on the Bronte 30 and returned it to the 5 yard line. On the next play Spears went around right end for the score. Read again kicked the extra point to make the score Coahoma 14, Bronte 0.

In the second quarter the Bulldogs took up where they left off in the first quarter. The Bulldogs started the drive for their third touchdown on the Longhorn 38 yard line with Springfield going over right tackles to go 20 yards for the score. Read for the third time kicked the extra point. The score at the end of the first half, Coahoma 21, Bronte 0.

In the third period Read went around right end for the fourth Bulldog score. Read kicked the extra point for the fourth time to make a score of 28-0.

The Longhorns came back in the third period with a passing attack, completing seven passes. The only Longhorn score came on a passplay from Waldrop to Smith, netting ten yards. The extra point try by Bagwell was blocked by Jackie Lepard.

Later in the fourth, Jack Owens, the left end, intercepted a Longhorn pass on the fifty to go all the way for the final score of the ball game. Read kicked the extra point for a perfect night and the score ended Coahoma 35, Bronte 6.

### Coke Turkeys Rate Good At Fair

Coke County 4-H boys and girls did themselves proud at the Texas State Fair at Dallas with their turkeys this week. Tommy Jett Hood had the reserve champion toms while Victor Collett won reserve champion honors with his hens. Each of the boys' group of five turkeys sold at auction for \$100. The average price received by all others in the show was 60 cents per pound.

Out of 39 blue ribbon groups of hens, Coke County 4-Hers won 47 per cent of the blue ribbon awards. The show is a classification show in which each exhibitor gets an award according to the quality of his exhibit. Altogether, Coke County turkey exhibitors brought back home \$230.46 in prize money and \$2,403.66 in sales, making a total of \$2,634.12 for the 200 turkeys actually exhibited in the show.

The writer wishes that he could go back to the beginning of football at Bronte High School but that is impossible. To be accurate, I will write about football teams that start with H. R. Gassiot's district champions of 1947. However BHS produced more greater teams than this one in earlier years.

The 1947 model Longhorn machine was one of the heaviest in history. Next to a concrete defense, Gassiot's Longhorns featured a hell on wheels ground attack that saw LeDrew Arrott and Bill Herron carry the mail. When Herron wasn't toting the pigskin he was crucifying would be tacklers with catapillar efficiency.

In the 1947 season opener, the Longhorns made a very poor showing by losing to Ozona 6-0. A week later the Longhorns powered the Melvin Bulldogs 19-0, and then followed through with a convincing 29-0 conquest of Robert Lee. Rochelle was the next opponent and one of the most notorious slugging boys in history ended in a 6-6 tie. The referees for some reason could not catch the Hornets in the act, but the Longhorns, who like to do battle in the open, skinned Rochelle noses to the tune of almost 200 yards in penalties.

Next on the list was the Eola Eagles. The Longhorns plucked the Eagles 26-12 in the lull before the storm. The storm came when the Menard Yellowjackets thundered to a 12-7 victory over our Longhorns. The Longhorns sprang into the district race by crushing Norton 26-0, and Miles 33-0, on successive weekends. The Longhorns encountered plenty of trouble before sidetracking the Christoval Cougars 20-13. In the traditional Thanksgiving game, BHS conquered the District Championship when they slaughtered Robert Lee 33-0. In the Bi-District game, played at Ballinger, the Menard Yellowjackets did a repeat performance, this time the final score read 19-6.

In the year 1948, Bronte High School lost everything but the stadium via graduation. Chances

of being a contender wilted as eight good prospects had to be ruled ineligible because of poor marks. And a reshuffle by the Interscholastic League threw Bronte and Robert Lee into a har- rem of strong district competi- tion.

New head coach W. N. Gaddy chose effort over suicide and did a very creditable job. His Long- horns ended a long "Ozona Jinx" by drubbing the Lions 12-6 in the season inaugural played at O- zoma. Then Daddy Gaddy's Green Horns lost three in a row to Mel- vin, 9-26, Robert Lee 0-26, and Eldorado 6-19. In their first taste of district competition, BHS deadlocked the Roby Lions 7-7 to gain a moral victory. The Longhorns were upset by Lo- raine 18-7 and trounced 27-14 by the Coahoma Bulldogs in two more district encounters. In a non-district set with Miles, the Longhorns trampled the Bul- dogs 41-13. The district cham- pion Hermleigh Cardinals nipped the fastly improving Longhorns 12-6, on mistice Day at Herm- leigh, and on Thanksgiving Day, Senior Quarterback Douglas Ray Stevens sparked the Longhorns to a near upset of the tough Robert Lee Steers. A mere point after touchdown gave Robert Lee a 13-12 victory.

The 1949 football season was disastrous. There was no short- age of talent, but there was a lacking in spirit, dissention mil- dewed what should have been a definite title threat. New Coach Jack L. Price's Longhorns dropped a 19-0 first game to the Class A Lakeview Chiefs. One week later the outlook was brighter as the Longhorns spilled Robert Lee 14-0. Then came the big letdown. BHS was smashed by Eldorado 7-31, shaded by Wylie 7-13 clipped by Stanton 0-21, trimmed by Coa- homa 7-13. Four losses in suc- cession before they knocked off cellar dwelling Lorraine 21-6. In a game played in the rain, Ozona splashed to a 6-0 victory over the Longhorns and repeating district the boom for a 27-6 win over the champion Hermleigh, lowered local eleven. In the Coke County Championship battle, the Long- horns came down off their high horses to take a 70 verdict from the neighboring Robert Lee Steers.

The 1950 Longhorns were hurt by graduation losses and had another poor year. Gerald Sandus- ky was named all-district Full- back for the third year in a row as he steamrolled over one thou-

sand yards rushing. The team started off no better than could be expected by losing to Wylie 6-24, and Robert Lee 0-26. The passing combination of Mc- Cutchen to Sandusky netted the Longhorns a last minute victory over the Rochelle Hornets. Then the Longhorns were beaten three times in a row in convincing manner. Hobbs was the first vic- tor 45-6, district champion Stan- ton followed with a 37-13 win, and Ozona followed with 47-6.

The rejuvenated Longhorns slipped past Lorraine 20-13 then lost a 12-14 thriller to Coahoma, fell to always tough Hermleigh 6-19 and dropped the Coke Coun- ty Championship game to Robert Lee 12-25.

Last year new head coach Houston A. Jolley took over the smoldering ruins of the Long- horn corral. The Longhorns began the season by losing two in a row to Class A opponents. Wylie nailed the Longhorns 3-6 and Junction's Eagles thumped the Longhorns 19-6.

Playing against Class B com- petition, Bronte topped Robt. Lee 12-7 before going into a long dis- trict grind.

The district story saw the Longhorns fall to Coahoma 6-21, surprise Trent 18-12, lose to Hobbs 0-19, squeeze by Lorraine

13-12, startle Ira 33-0, lost to district champion Hermleigh 13-25 and drop a homecoming de- cision to Robert Lee 19-25.

It was about ten years ago that the present Bronte High School Longhorns were small children in Elementary School. They knew what a football was and they idolized some Bronte High School stars. As fate would have it, those stars might have been Elbert Stephenson or James (Tinker) Vaughn. They died so that these same little boys might have the privilege of playing football as free men of a young generation.
