Charlie Baker, 51, Former Resident, Dies in Ft Stockton

Charlie Baker, former resident of Bronte, died Wednesday night at 7:30 of a heart attack. He had been in ill health for some time, suffering with a heart ailment.

Charlie had lived in and around Bronte most of his life until 12 years ago, moving from here to Fort Stockton. He had been the Pecos County Sheriff for the past six years and had been re-elected to his fourth term as sheriff Tuesday.

He was born in Tennyson Dec. 23, 1900. While living in Bronte he was a service station operator for the Magnolia Petroleum Co.

He was a past master of Masonic lodges at Bronte and Fort Stockton and was a member of the Baptist church.

Funeral services will be held today at 10 a. m. in Fort Stockton. The Owen Funeral Home there is in charge of arrangements with graveside services in San Angelo at 4 p. m. Friday.

He is survived by his wife, one son, Billie C. Baker of San Angelo and two grandchildren, of San Angelo. Three sisters, Mrs. Annie Butler, Mrs. May Baker of San Angelo and Mrs. Montie Little of Tennyson; and five brothers, John, Clifford, and Jim of San Angelo, Herbert of Ozona and Neal of El Paso also survive him.

Doyle Holland, 22, Succumbs to Polio

Doyle Holland, 22 year old Sun employee of Silver, died on Tuesday afternoon in the polio ward at the Shamson Hospital in San Angelo. He and his wife, the former Martha Weddell of Blackwell, resided at Colorado City.

Survivors are his wife and two sons, Jerry Wayne, 2, and Guy Edwards, 10 days old.

Funeral services were held on Thursday at 4 p. m. from the Johnson Funeral Home chapel in San Angelo, with burial in the Fairmount cemetery there.

The family had previously lived in Robert Lee but moved to Colorado City about a year ago.

The second annual Jr. Market Turkey Show at Robert Lee last Saturday was the scene. The actors were about twenty-five 4-H boys and girls who were showing what can be done with turkeys in Coke County, even in the face of the much talked of drouth. The judges were F. Z. Beanblossom, Poultry Marketing Specialist and George Draper, Poultry Specialist, both from Extension Service, College Station.

One hundred and fifty-six turkeys were exhibited and sold out of the show. Tommy Jew Hood gave a repeat performance by winning the Grand Champion Award on a pen of three hens. Tommy exhibited the grand champion pen at last years show.

More recently he showed the reserve champion pen of toms at the Dallas Fair. Leslie Nell Wink had the reserve grand champion at this year's county show. Her birds went to Mac' Cafe at \$1.00 per pound also.

Benny Corley, a first year 4-H member from Tennyson showed his three toms to champion honors and sold them to a group of business men at Bronte for \$1.12 per pound. Those in on the purchase were Arnold Ball, Caperton Motor Co., Sims Food Store and the First National Bank. The

reserve champion toms shown by Victor Collett sold to Paul Burns of the Burns Service Station for 90 cents per pound. Victor also was among the high point boys at the Dallas Fair, having shown the reserve champion turkey hens there.

Coke Votes Democratic; State, Nation Go to GOP

Coke County stayed in the traditional Democratic column last Tuesday in the General election while the State of Texas and the rest of the nation joined the Republicans to send Dwight D. Eisenhower, rolling up over 31 million votes, to the White House for the next four years.

Eisenhower, polling the largest popular vote ever, trailed Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson for Coke County by the narrow margin of 738 to 579. In the Bronte box, Stevenson carried 269 to 127.

Over 1300 votes were cast in the election in Coke County.

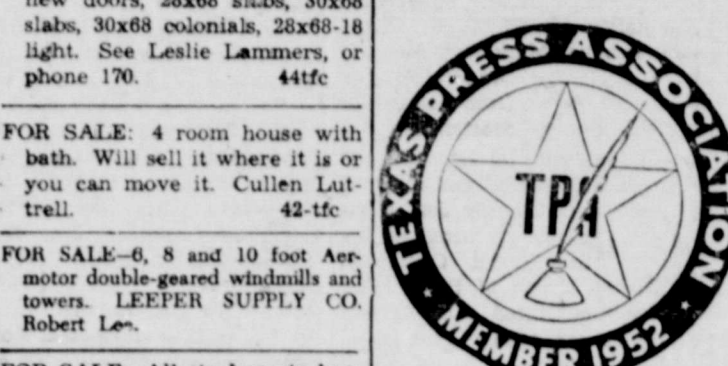

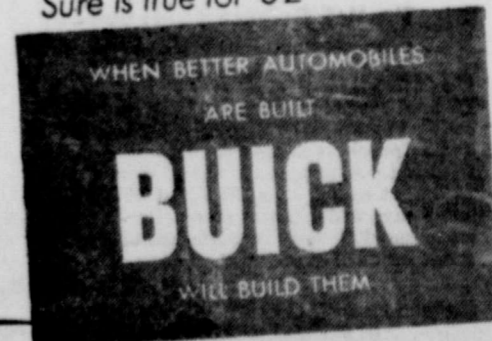

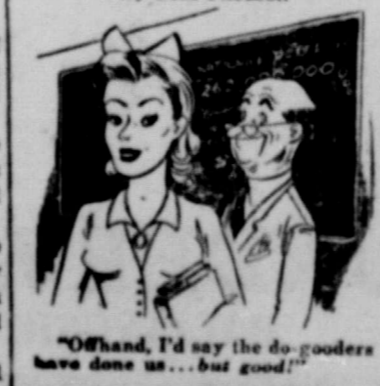
