## Well Completions Made in This Area

Lion Oil Co. 1 Mary Rawlings, Coke County wildcat in 390-1A-H&TC, five miles northwest of Bronte, has recovered free oil on a drillstem test in Canyon sand. The test was taken between 4,178-93 feet, with tool open one hour and 18 minutes.

Gas surfaced in 18 minutes, oil in 69 minutes. The drillpipe unloaded while tool was being pulled. Recovery was 1,500 feet of free oil and 50 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud.

Operator then cored from 4,193-4,210 feet, recovering eight feet of sand with no shows. It was coring ahead.

Additional pay has been logged in Humble Oil & Refining Co. 2 M. A. Rawlings, indicated 1/2-mile north extension to production in the North Bronte Field. It is in 397-1A-H&TC.

On drillstem test No. 7, taken between 5,286-96 feet in the lower Gardner, with tool open 120 minutes, gas surfaced in 48 minutes and recovery was 1,426 feet of free oil and 14 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. Flowing pressure was 282 pounds 21 minute shutin pressure, 1,950 pounds. Operator set a one-inch top and 5/8-inch bottom choke.

On drillstem test No. 8, also in the lower Gardner between 5,296-5,308 feet, with tool open 95 minutes, gas surfaced in 43 minutes and recovery was 2,408 feet of free oil and 12 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. There was a good blow at the start of this test. Flowing pressure was 625 pounds; 22-minute shutin pressure, 1,920 pounds.

Drillstem test No. 7 also had a good blow.

The lower Gardner was topped by drilling break at 5,271 feet on derrick floor elevation of 1,190 feet.

The project was going into the hole Wednesday afternoon to take drillstem test No. 9 between 5,308-22 feet.

Humble 3 Rawlings, 397-1A-H&TC, 1/4 mile west of production, has been plugged and abandoned as a dry hole at total depth of 5,471 feet in lime and shale. Operator was unable to pick any tops in this hole.

Cam-Tex Corp. of Dallas (formerly Kewanee Oil Co.) No. 1 H. G. Wendland, wildcat, C. Rubio Survey 23, cemented 5 1/2 inch casing at 3,835 feet, then perforated between 3,763-65, 3,767-70, and 3,774-77 feet in McCutchen sand, then swabbed 100 per cent salt water.

Union Oil Co. of Calif. No. 1 Bell et al, wildcat, I&GN and J. M. Harrell survey, drilling below 4,932 feet in lime and shale. The Bronte 4800 field of Coke County has been extended 1/2 mile southwest with the completion of Humble 4 O. L. Johnson for a daily flowing potential of 478.20 barrels of pipeline oil daily.

Potential was calculated, based on an actual six-hour flow of 119.55 barrels of oil plus 2 per cent basic sediment and water. Corrected gravity was 50.2 and gas-oil ratio was estimated at 375-1.

Completion was natural from the Goens lime, topped at 4,830 feet. Tubing pressure was 485 pounds and casing pressure was 495 pounds. Operator had pulled the swab four times after displaying mud with water and the project kicked off.

Location of the extension is 467 feet from the north and east lines of L. J. Good survey 6.

Humble 13 R. E. Hickman, Bronte 4800 test, was bottomed at 4,831 feet drilling formation. Operator had set 4 1/2 inch casing at 4,818 feet with 700 sacks. The project topped the Goens at 4,815 feet on derrick floor elevation of 1,831 feet.

Humble No. 4 Olive Keeney, 453-1A-H&TC, Bronte 4800 test, drilling below 1,496 feet in shale. Stanolind Oil and Gas has started its 21 Edna Wylie 1/4 mile northwest of production in the Fort Chadbourne Field of north-eastern Coke County.

The test will be drilled to 5,600

feet with rotary when permit is granted. It is on a 2,062.17 acre tract. Location is 5,600 feet from the north and 2,750 feet from the west lines of Pedro Martinez survey 299.

## City Council Gives Lone Star Gas Rate Increase

The Lone Star Gas Company's application for a franchise and a rate adjustment affecting approximately 200 residential and commercial customers in Bronte was approved by the City Council at its meeting on November 7, 1952. The increase to the average residential user (family unit) will amount to less than 3 cents a day, it was pointed out by G. O. Wilson, Dist. manager for the company. He said similar rate revisions have been sought throughout Lone Star's operating territory in Texas and Oklahoma.

Wilson expressed his appreciation to the City Council for "consideration of the gas company's application," pointing out that the "new rate makes it possible for us to continue to maintain our standard of service on the plane desired and expected by our customers."

The gas company manager emphasized that residential and commercial rates charged by Lone Star have not been increased generally within the last 25 years, but, conversely, the rates were reduced ten cents per thousand cubic feet in May, 1942. He said the new rate here is only three cents per thousand cubic feet higher than the rate charged by Lone Star prior to the 1942 reduction.

"Under the new rate," Mr. Young said, "the increase per customer (family unit) will average 58 cents per month or less than 3 cents a day. Of each additional 58 cents paid by the customer each month, 43 cents will go to various taxes, thus leaving the company only 38 cents."

"The Lone Star Gas Company has taken a great deal of pride in the fact that we have been able to furnish a good, adequate and dependable fuel service to our customers at the lowest possible price conducive to good business and sufficient earnings," he continued. "Our application for the rate revision here represented only the most essential and absolutely minimum increase consistent with present economic conditions. We believe it highly conservative."

"The additional revenue," he said, "is required to meet losses in net income due to increased taxes, costs of gas in the field, rising costs for gas exploration and development, wages and salaries and numerous other items. We are confident that our customers as well as regulatory bodies understand our situation because all businesses—and individuals, too—have had to wrestle with the problem of rising costs."

Members of the Council also discussed safety problems in Bronte with representatives of the Diversity Club, Mrs. A. S. Whatley, Mrs. Wade Rees and Mrs. T. F. Sims, Jr. Other routine matters were attended to. The Council voted to employ J. G. Mills to collect and haul off trash and garbage from the City every two weeks. Residents are asked to keep their trash in an accessible place at all times so it will be easier to load.

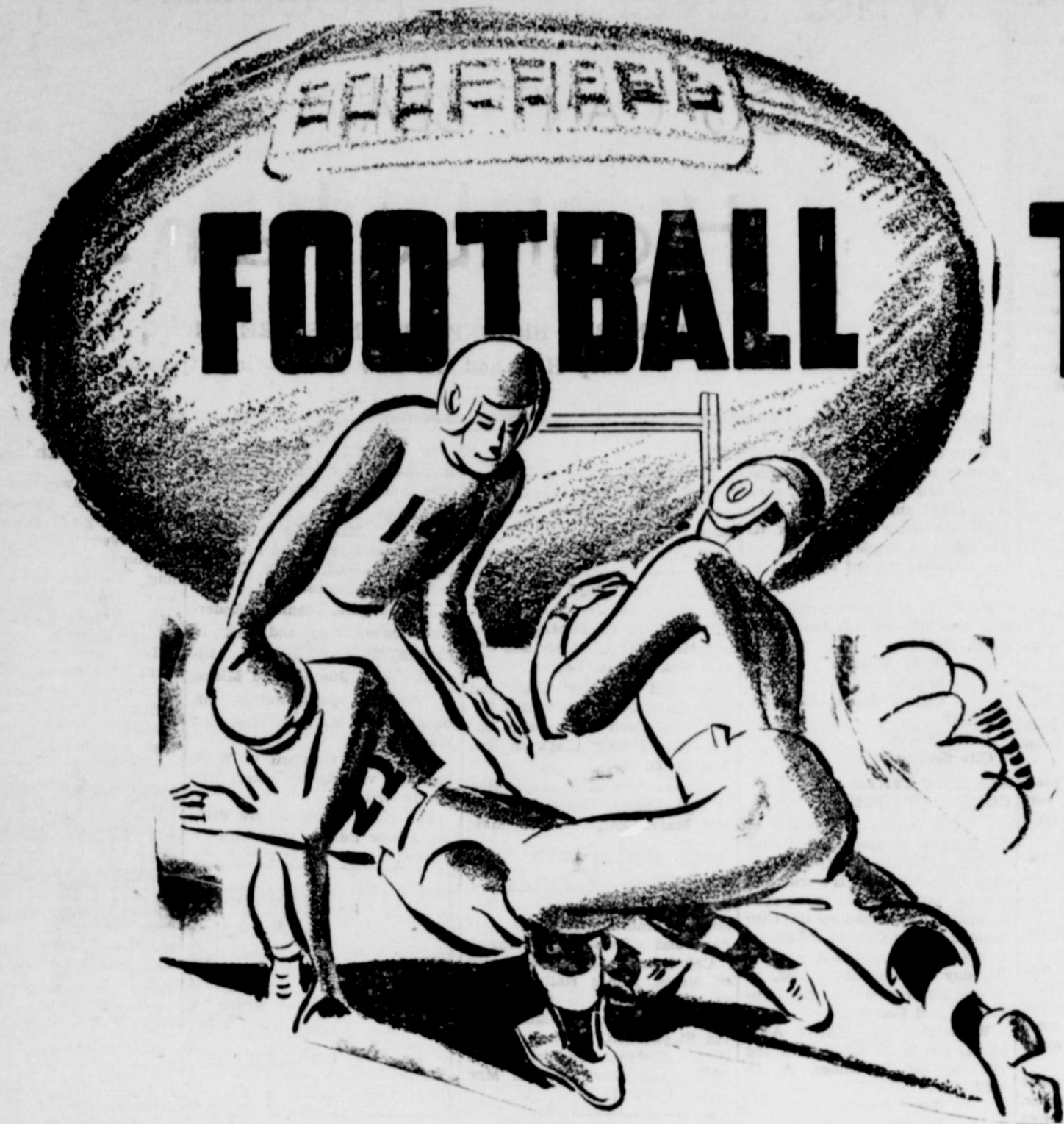
After supper the group enjoyed games of 42 and dominoes.

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING RATES AND CHARGES TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BRONTE, COKE COUNTY, TEXAS, PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATES AND CHARGES MAY BE CHANGED AND AMENDED AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered after date of passage and approval of this ordinance the rates and charges for sales of natural gas and natural gas service rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Bronte by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, are hereby fixed and determined to be as follows:  
Minimum Monthly Bill .....\$1.53  
First 1 m.c.f. at \$1.70 per m.c.f. gross; \$1.53 per m.c.f. net.  
Next 1 m.c.f. at 1.422 per m.c.f. gross; 1.28 per m.c.f. net.  
Next 3 m. c. f. at 867 per m.c.f. gross; 78 per m.c.f. net.  
Next 20 m.c.f. at 589 per m.c.f. gross; 53 per m.c.f. net.  
All Over 25 m.c.f. at 533 per m.c.f. gross; 48 per m.c.f. net.  
Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.  
Except with respect to rates, all charges for natural gas service now in effect shall remain in effect unchanged.

The above rates and charges are applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.  
SECTION 2. The rates and charges set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or the company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law.  
SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an immediate change and adjustment in the rates and charges for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency and the reading and

passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the mayor.
