SHIVERS DESIGNATES NOV. 17 TO DEC. 25 CHRISTMAS SEAL MONTH

Austin, Nov. 15.—A bright little scrap of paper which challenged mankind's deadliest enemy almost half a century ago will reach more than a million Texans through the mails this week.

It is the Christmas Seal. And, it has powered the campaign of tuberculosis associations through out the nation to bring under control the disease which has taken more human lives than all others combined.

Gov. Allan Shivers has designated Nov. 17 to Dec. 25 as Christmas Seal Month in Texas, calling attention in his official memorandum to the "needless waste of human life and resources" caused by TB and its "staggering" cost to Texans.

It is the forty-fourth annual sale in Texas.

One man, just launching his career in medicine, was directly responsible for the first Christmas Seal Sale in the state. He is Dr. Z. T. Scott of Austin, who still serves the TTA as treasurer.

Doctor Scott, now retired from active practice, relates that he became interested in the tuberculosis problem as a medical student around the turn of the century. It had cost the lives of several members of his family.

He read of the Christmas Seals sold in Delaware to keep open a tiny sanatorium caring for a few tuberculosis patients. That was Christmas 1907.

People were learning then, he explains, that the disease could be cured, that it need not necessarily mean a death sentence.

"When I read of the Christmas Seal," he recalls, "I thought here is a way... a way to get funds to DO SOMETHING about this disease."

Meanwhile on a train enroute to Washington in September 1908 a group of Texans headed by the state health officer, Dr. W. M. Brumby of Houston, and bound for a meeting of the International Congress Against Tuberculosis, had organized the Texas TB Association.

HEART ATTACK CLAIMS LIFE OF A. J. VAUGHAN

Funeral services for Albert Janson Vaughan, 50, were held Wednesday at 4 p. m. from the Baptist church. Rev. D. L. Sinclair of Asherton, Texas and the Rev. J. E. Fuller, pastor of the Bronte Methodist church, officiated.

Vaughan died suddenly Tuesday of a heart attack. His passing came about 4 p. m. in the Bronte hospital, where he had been admitted only a few minutes before his death.

He was born May 29, 1902, in Eastland County, Texas. He was married Feb. 20, 1920 to the former Willie Horn in Wichita county, Texas.

He had been an employee of Humble Oil and Refining Co. for the past 23 years and had been employed at Freer, Holliday and at Bronte. He and his wife were making their home in the Bronte Humble Camp at the time of his death. He was a member of the Baptist church.

Interment was at Burk Burnett, Texas yesterday, Thursday, Nov. 20, at 3 p. m. Arrangements were directed by Cliff Funerary Home.

He is survived by his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Viola Sinclair of Temple; his mother, Mrs. Debora Vaughan of Wichita Falls; three brothers, Harvey of Irving Texas, George of Wichita Falls and Winfred of Wichita Falls; one sister, Mrs. Mary Bledsoe of Moxee, Washington; and two grandchildren, Linda Joyce and Charlotte Sinclair of Temple.

The Bronte Longhorns rolled over the Divide Trojans last Friday night by a score of 60-6. The Longhorns outplayed the Trojans all night, making 17 first downs to Divide's 5. The Bronte lads gained good yardage throughout the game and ran the ball all over the field.

The first Longhorn score came after they blocked a Trojan punt on the 4-yard stripe. On the next play Gentry went around right end to pay dirt. The extra point was kicked by Bagwell.

A few minutes later the Longhorns broke through to recover a Divide fumble on the 29 yard

line. Two plays later Gentry went 20 yards for the score. Again Bagwell kicked the extra point to make the score 14-0.

In the second period the Longhorns drove 63 yards to score. Phillips took it over from the 1 for the counter. Bagwell missed the try for point.

Again in the same period Waldrop went 11 yards to score. This ended a drive of 71 yards. Bagwell ran the try for extra point, making the score at the end of the half 27-0.

6 Pays Found in N. Bronte Area

Much oil excitement was evidenced here this week as the Humble Oil & Refining Co., No. 2 M. Rawlings, logged its sixth pay section—in the Ellenburger. No. 2 Rawlings, indicated 1/4 mile extension to the Lower Gardner production in the North Bronte Field, recovered 2,680 feet of oil and 20 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud on a 62 minute drillstem test between 5,535-50 feet in the Ellenburger.

Only other Ellenburger producer in the area is the Humble No. 1 Odom-State, eight miles northeast.

In the No. 2 Rawlings, gas surfaced in 16 minutes. No oil surfaced while tool was open. Flowing pressure was 900 pounds; 22 minute shutin pressure was 2,300 pounds. This was drillstem test No. 12.

Operator was preparing to set 5 1/2 inch casing at approximately 5,535 feet, 15 feet off the bottom.

ELLENBURGER TOP

The Ellenburger was topped at 5,535 feet on derrick floor elevation of 1,910 feet.

No. 2 Rawlings is approximately 13 feet high to the North Bronte Field discovery well, Humble No. 1 Rawlings, one location south, on all pays.

The No. 2 Rawlings has shown for production in the Canyon sand, Palo Pinto, Goens, upper Gardner (Jennings) and lower Gardner, as well as the Ellenburger.

A report Wednesday indicated that operator's representatives believe that flowing production will be obtained from the Ellenburger. Location is 397-1A-H&TC.

FIRST PRODUCER

Humble's No. 1 Odom-State, the county's first Ellenburger producer, is located in J. Hendry Survey 2, eight miles north-north east.

It was completed in Nov., 1950, for a 24-hour pumping potential of 25.62 barrels of 45.5 gravity oil plus 85 percent water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,038-1.

Lion Oil Co. No. 1 Rawlings, 390-1A-H&TC, 3/4 mile north of Humble No. 2 Rawlings, was drilling below 4,700 feet in lime. This project has shown for production in the Canyon Sand and Palo Pinto.

TWO OFFSETS

Humble has staked a direct north offset to the No. 2 Rawlings and a direct south offset to the Lion 1 Rawlings.

The north offset to No. 2 Rawlings will be Humble 3 Butner, 660 feet from north and east lines of 397-1A-H&TC. It will drill with rotary to approximately 5,600 feet.

One location north of the No. 3 Butner and one location south of Lion 1 Rawlings, Humble No. 2 Butner will be 660 feet from north and east lines of 397-1A-H&TC. It will drill with rotary to approximately 5,600 feet.

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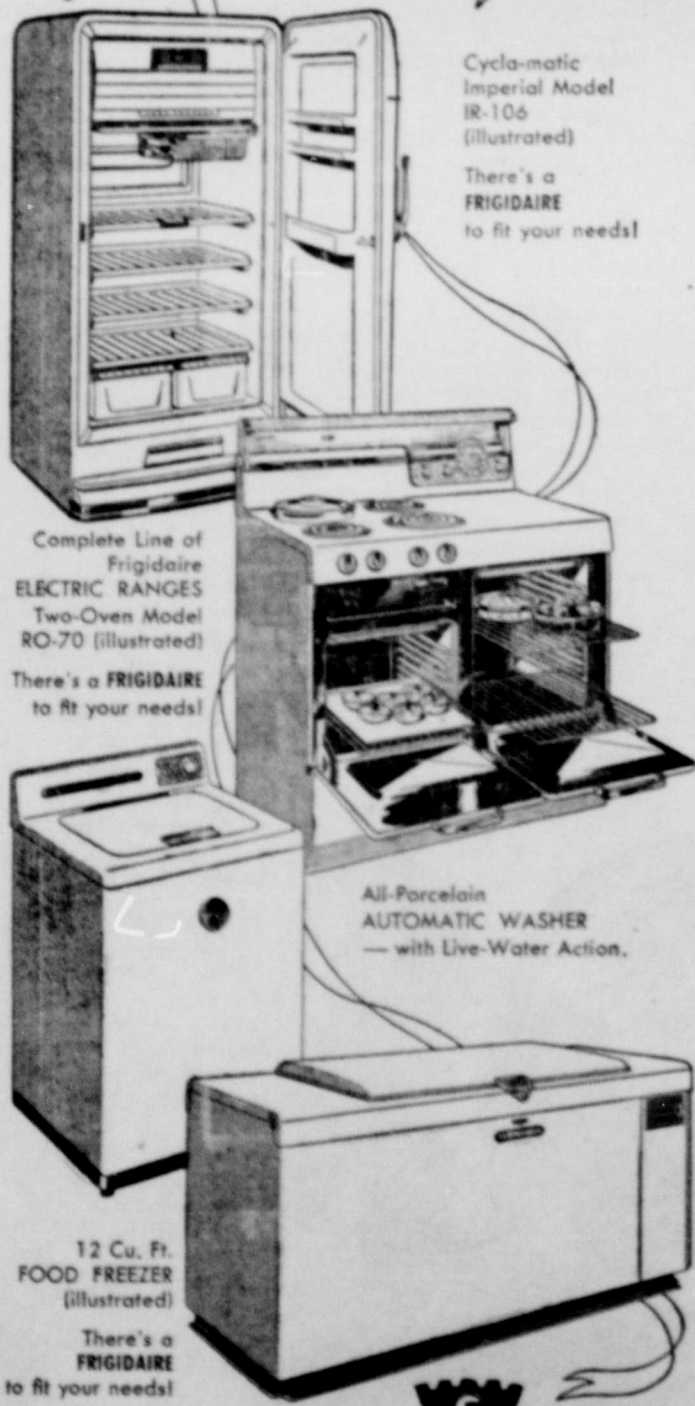
