BRONTE GETS 2.75 IN. RAIN

Bronte area residents have something extra special to be thankful for this Thanksgiving season. The area received about two inches of rainfall Sunday and Monday, with an added hard shower Monday night. This will give the stockmen a new hope for pulling their stock through the winter.

Tuesday morning the rain gauges over most of the Bronte trade territory showed 2.75 inches. Although the weatherman had predicted more rain for Tuesday, the morning was clear, cold with a wind out of the west.

The rains were general over most of Texas and agricultural men said that while the rain might not be a drought breaker, it is the best chance of one the area has had for 30 months.

Various farmers and ranchers showed the following figures on the rainfall: A. N. Rawlings ranch south of town reported 2 3/4 inches; F. S. Higginbotham north of town reports 2.3 inches; Clayburn Webb, farmer west of town had 1.7 inches, while Carroll Robbins who ranches northwest of town in the Hayrick commu-

ity reported 1.8 inches.

Rainfall Sunday and Monday was ideal in that it was slow and penetrating and there was practically no runoff.

A large number of acres of small grain will be greatly benefited by the rains. They were planted after the September rain and have just been keeping alive the past few weeks. The additional moisture should make them grow rapidly and provide some grazing before long.

Lion No. 1 Rawlings Extends N. Bronte; Brunson Shows in Capps

Lion Oil Co. No. 1 Mary Rawlings, north outpost from Humble No. 2 Rawlings, indicated six-pay well, has logged an oil flow from the Goens lime.

On drillstem test No. 6, taken between 5,012-16 feet, with tool open 19 minutes, gas surfaced in 14 minutes, oil in 16 minutes. Recovery was 250 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud. Recovery was reversed out. No water was found. Flowing pressure was 1,750-1,975 pounds; 20-minute shut-in pressure was 2,125 pounds.

The Goens was topped at 5,014 feet on derrick floor elevation of 1,906 feet.

Drillstem test No. 4 resulted in the recovery of oil from the Palo Pinto. The test was taken from 4,517-73 feet, with tool open one hour and 34 minutes.

Gas came to the surface and oil flowed in one hour and 32 minutes. Recovery was 120 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud. Flowing pressure was 750-1,225 pounds; 20-minute shut-in pressure was 1,700 pounds.

The Palo Pinto was topped at 4,514 feet.

On drillstem test No. 5, taken in the Crosscut sand section, between 4,710-19, nothing surfaced, but 100 feet of gas was recovered in the drillpipe.

Earlier, Lion No. 1 Rawlings

logged shows in the Bluff Creek and Canyon Sand. The Goens was topped eight feet higher in this project than in the six-pay Humble No. 2 Rawlings.

Humble No. 2 Rawlings has been waiting on completion unit and operator now plans to complete in the lower Gardner instead of the Ellenburger, as had been announced.

Humble No. 1 L. W. Beaty, one-location south offset to the field opener, Humble No. 1 Rawlings, was drilling below 2,815 feet in lime and shale.

BRONTE FIELD

Humble No. 6-C J. L. Brunson, on a drillstem test between 4,580-4,625 feet in Capps lime, recovered 1,920 feet of free oil and 330 feet of drilling mud.

A 5/8 inch choke was used on the top and bottom. Flowing pressure was 855 pounds and 20-minute shut-in pressure was 1,950 pounds.

Drillstem test No. 2 was being taken between 4,624-30, also in the Capps.

According to an announcement received this week, Humble plans to make extensive tests in this hole, as it is believed to be on the crest of the high in the field. Present plans are to core in the Goens and also in the slightly deeper gas pay, then test

Robert Lee Nips Longhorns, 8-7

The Bronte Longhorns journeyed to Robert Lee last Friday night and in a bruising, hard fought ball game, the Steers came out on top by the close score of 8-7. A blocked kick mid-way of the fourth period was the difference. Even though it was a bruising game, there was not a single 15 yard penalty, something very rare for a Robert Lee-Bronte game.

Robert Lee received the opening kickoff and started rolling only to be forced to kick. The punt rolled dead on the Longhorn 13. On the first play Phillips carried for 9 yards. After that the Longhorns would not be denied. They kept rolling until they had scored. Arbie Phillips scored the T. D., climaxing a drive of 87 yards. J. O. Bagwell kicked the extra point to make the score 7-0.

The score remained this way until mid-way of the second period. The Longhorns had the ball and seemed to be rolling only to lose the ball on a fumble on their own 40 yard stripe. Then the Steers began to roll. Duncan carried to the 20. After the Longhorns had stopped the Steer

running attack, Duncan tossed a pass into pay dirt to Norman Roberts for the touchdown. A pass play for the extra point was broken up. The score was 7-6 in favor of Bronte.

The score was still 7-6 at the half. Although both teams threatened several times in the third period, they were either stopped by a pass interception or a fumble. The game kept rolling along during the third period and at the end of it the score was still 7-6.

SAFETY FOR STEERS

Midway of the fourth quarter, Bill Havins intercepted a Longhorn pass on his own 30 and returned it to the Longhorn 10. The Longhorns followed this by recovering a Steer fumble on their own 5 yard stripe. Three plays later the Longhorns were still inside their own 10. On fourth down, Don Kiser stepped back to punt. Bill Casey, Steer guard, broke through and caught the ball squarely in the face. The ball bounced out of the end zone and Robert Lee had 2 points and now led 8-7.

This didn't seem to dismay the Longhorns too much though. Continued on back page

The Hylton Northwest field also produces from the Strawn lime and the Gardner sand.
