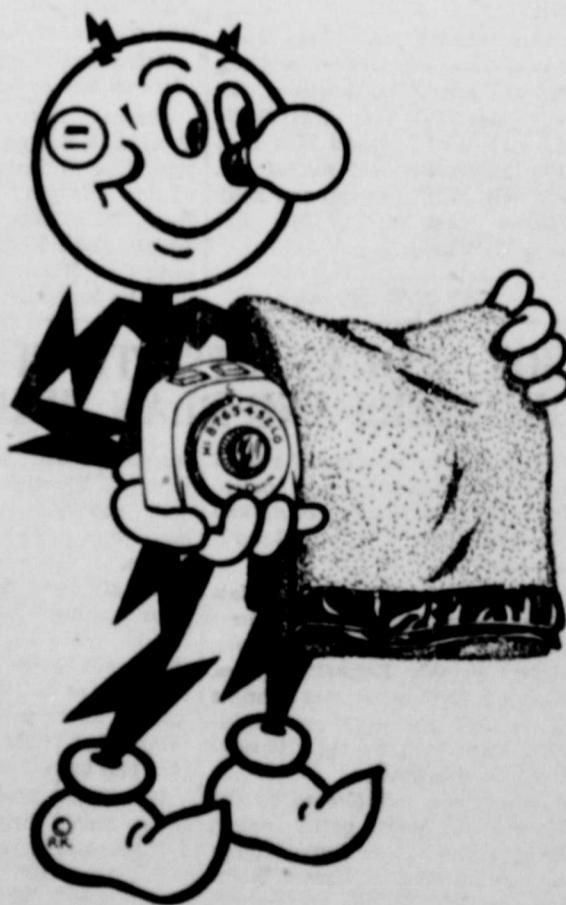

central records office in Baltimore. This is true whether the person is an employee or self-employed individual.

The Administration's records office can be certain of the individual account to which reported earnings are to be credited, only if the report of earnings shows the correct account number and name of that individual as they both appear on the Administration's master records. A person's official social security account-number card is the only safe source from which to copy that person's account number and name.

Incompletely reported, or incorrectly reported, earnings items can be credited ultimately, an area official said, but only after a check-back by the Baltimore office with the reporter of the earnings. That check-back increases the Baltimore office operating expense and is bothersome to the erring worker. Both can be avoided by reasonable and

normal care on the part of the reporter of the earnings.

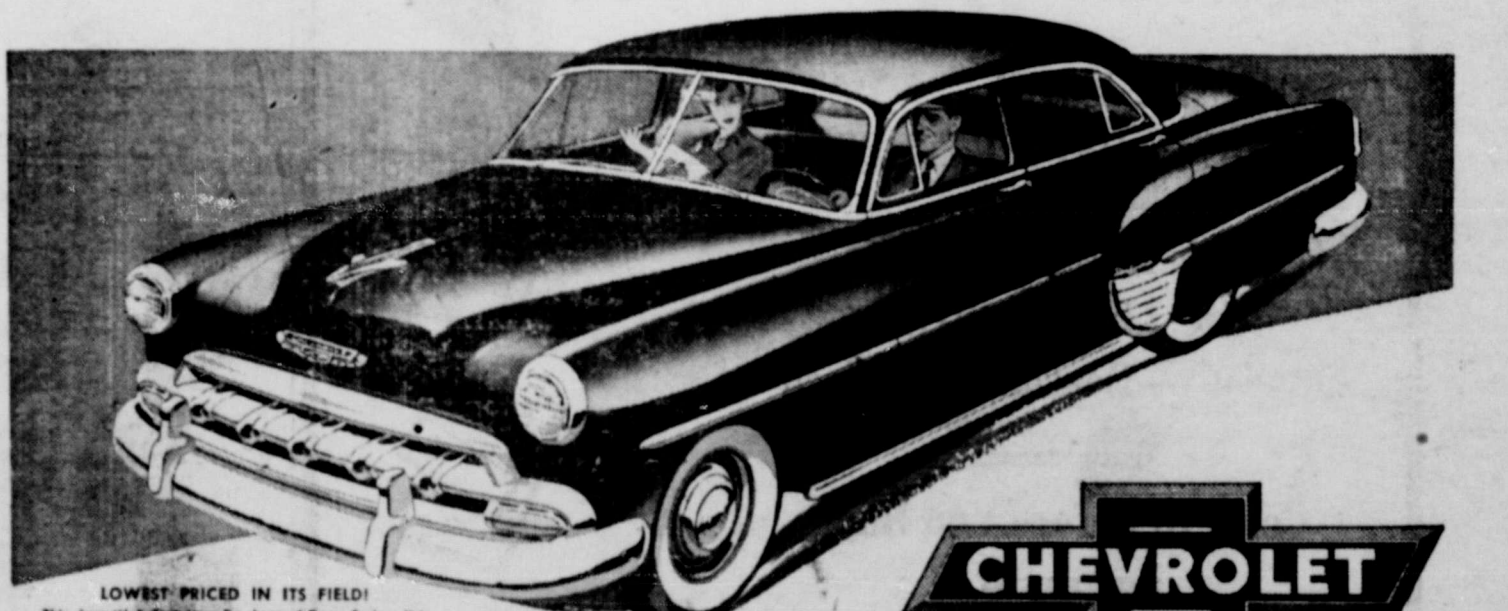

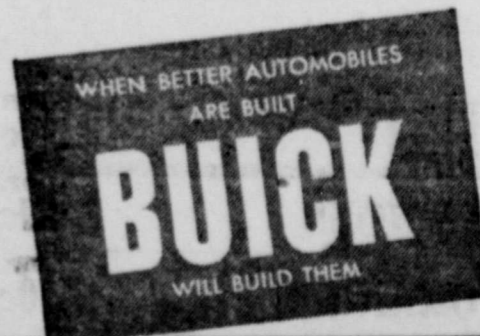
