Last Rites Held For Mrs. Wojtek

Funeral services for Mrs. Frank C. Wojtek, Sr., 81, were held at the Robert Lee Methodist Church at 3 p. m. Saturday. Rev. Ray Lee, pastor of the church, officiated. Mrs. Wojtek died at 10 a. m. last Friday in the Coke County Memorial Hospital after an extended illness.

Burial was in the Robert Lee Cemetery, with Clift Funeral Home in charge. Pallbearers were grandsons.

Mrs. Wojtek is survived by her husband; five sons, Vladimir V., Otto, Victor, Gene and Frank, Jr., all of Robert Lee; two daughters, Mrs. Earl Nutter of Bronte and Mrs. Tom Wiginton of Robert Lee; two sisters, Mrs. Joe Krizan of Lark, Texas and Emily Rezmick of Temple; one brother, Louis Hruska of Lark; 22 grand children and 14 great-grand children.

Mrs. Wojtek was born Anna Hruska in Jablunka, Moravia, (Czechoslovakia), March 2, 1871. She was the daughter of Steve and Anna Frances Hruska. She came to America with her family before she was a year old. The agricultural family came in search of land because their native land was overpopulated.

Leaving Jablunka in Sept. 1871 the Hruska family landed at Galveston shortly before Christmas. They made the Atlantic crossing in a sailing vessel which was blown off its course for three weeks by a storm.

The family traveled from Galveston to Fayette County in a "prairie schooner." After seven years there they moved to Williamson county where they lived for four years before moving to Bell county. She attended the schools in Williamson and Bell counties and often spoke of the difficulties she encountered when she couldn't speak English and couldn't understand the teacher. She was married to Frank C. Wojtek in 1892 and they lived in Bell county, Temple and moved to Tom Green County in 1899. They lived in the Twin Mountain community for three years and in San Angelo for one year before moving to Coke County in 1904.

Mrs. Wojtek became ill in 1939 but made a partial recovery until she became ill again two years ago. She had been in a critical condition for ten days prior to her death. She was a member of the Methodist church.

For the second time this week, robbers struck in Bronte. Lammers Laundry was burglarized early Tuesday night of this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Lammers left the laundry about 7:15 Tuesday night and when they returned about two hours later they discovered someone had entered their laundry through a window, gone back into their living quarters and had taken two \$5 bills and seven \$1 bills from a box. Mr. Lammers said there were a number of checks and quite a bit of change left in the box.

Authorities were called and a fingerprint man was called in but the burglars had not been apprehended Thursday.

REA LOAN APPROVED

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson has been notified by the Rural Electrification Administration in Washington that a loan amounting to \$80,000 has just been approved for the Coleman County Electric Co-Op. This money is to be used to build 40 miles of new line in order to extend facilities to 120 new consumers in the area. Part of the funds will be spent for system improvements which will mean increased capacity of service for 100 members. The consumers who will benefit are from the following counties: Coleman, Concho, Runtels, Taylor, Tom Green, Brown, Coke and Callahan.

Coke Receives About Half of Normal Rainfall

Parts of the Coke County Soil Conservation District received about one-half of the normal rainfall in 1952; however about forty percent of the District received between twenty-five and thirty percent of normal, said A. V. Sheppard, Work Unit Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service. The area in and around Robert Lee received 10.1 inches. The area from east and north of Saneo to Silver and across to Edith received about five to six inches; also part of the Tennyson area received about six inches.

The rainfall that area did receive in 1951 and 1952 was very ineffective as shown by the following table by months as released by the Soil Conservation Service. The small one-fourth to one-half inch showers and hard torrential rains as recorded in April when parts of the county received 1.95 inches of rain and hail in 25 minutes prove to be very little help to provide moisture to grow a crop of range grasses.

Charges Filed Against Two for Robbing Bank

Two men were identified and formally charged in the armed robbery of the First National Bank here on Tuesday of last week. Cited on federal bank robbery charges that were filed Friday in San Angelo were the two, Byron Ralph Moore, 24, of East Alton, Ill., and Scottie Ray Mucklerath, 24, of Cayuga, Texas.

The pair were identified as the two men who walked unmasked into the bank about 3:15 on the afternoon of Jan. 27, produced a revolver and forced Mrs. W. W. Millikin and Douglas Snead into the vault where they were tied with rawhide strings. The bandits took about \$9000 and left by the back door.

Heart Campaign Opens This Week

Officials for the drive pointed out that a good example of what heart research has done is the case of Roy Wilkins, Bronte, who recently underwent cardiac surgery at Baltimore. The technique used in this type of surgery took years of research and cost millions of dollars. Heart fund money supports this type of research.

Donation boxes will be placed at the First National Bank, the Bronte Pharmacy and the Central Drug. Everyone is urged "Join the fight against heart disease."

weapon in Dallas, using his own name. The gun was traced from the manufacturing company in Massachusetts to a New York wholesaler and then to the Dallas hardware store.

The men are believed to have registered at a San Angelo hotel on January 22 and to have stayed there until the day before the robbery. This fact was established by FBI handwriting experts. Both men had worked in the Bronte, Angelo and Robert Lee oil fields. The rawhide strings, used in tying the bank employees were also purchased in San Angelo.

NATIONWIDE SEARCH

A nationwide search is underway for Moore and Mucklerath. Mucklerath, who lived in Bronte for several months, has a minor police record while Moore does not. Both are veterans of World War II. Mucklerath left an active account of \$1.61 in the bank here.

Meanwhile, a 1952 dark green Mercury has been found in Fort Worth, and officials believe it may have been used as an exchange or getaway car. It has been established that the two bandits had the car in San Angelo prior to the holdup. The car had been abandoned in Fort Worth last week and became conspicuous when several overparking tickets were placed on the windshield.

It was towed to a police garage where the license plates were checked and found belonging to another auto stolen Dec. 5 in El Paso and found abandoned in Raleigh, N. C. on Jan. 3.

Still at large, the search has been intensified and tips from over the country have kept officials busy this week. There is some evidence to lead those working on the case to believe that the bandits fled into old Mexico.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN by the County Judge of Coke County, Texas, for Depository of said Coke County and Coke County Common School District Funds for the next Two (2) years in accordance with Article 2544

(2440) Revised Civil Statutes, 1925, of Texas at the February Term, beginning on the 9th day of February, A. D. 1953. Said Court will receive proposals from any banking corporation, association or individual banker in said County that may desire to be selected as the Depository of said

County. Any Banking Corporation, Association or individual banker in said County, desiring to bid, shall deliver to the County Judge on or before the first day of the Commissioner's Court, at which the selection of the Depository is to be made, a sealed proposal, stating the rate of interest that said banking corporation, association, or individual banker offer to pay on the funds of the County for the term between the dates of such bids and the next regular term for the selection of a depository.

Said bids shall be accompanied by a certified check for not less than one-half of one per cent of the County's revenues of the preceding year as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder, and that if his bid should be accepted he will enter into bond as herein provided, and upon failure of said banking corporation, association or individual banker that may be selected as such Depository to give the bonds required by law, the amount of such certified check shall go to the County as liquidated damages and the County Judge shall re-advertise for bids, said Court reserving the right to reject any and all bids proposed.

A BILL

To be entitled An Act prohibiting the shooting or discharging of any rifle or pistol in, along, or across any lake in Coke County, State of Texas, prescribing a penalty therefor, and declaring an emergency.

A BILL

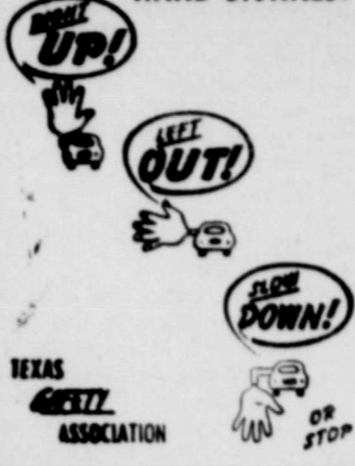
To be entitled An Act applicable only to the Sweetwater Oak Creek Lake, Coke County, State of Texas, providing for a closed season and an expiration date; regulating the manner and methods of taking fish, minnows and frogs from said lake; prohibiting the transportation of minnows beyond the border of Coke County; providing that nothing in this Act shall permit trespassing and placing the burden of proof; providing for enforcement of the Act; pro-

viding that the general laws of the State shall govern as to the length, number, or type of fish taken from said lake; providing that if any provision of this Act be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect any other provision; and declaring an emergency.

A BILL

To be entitled An Act providing that it shall be unlawful to kill deer, and wild turkey and quail in Coke County, for a period of 4 years from and after the passage; repealing all conflicting laws; providing a penalty; and declaring an emergency.

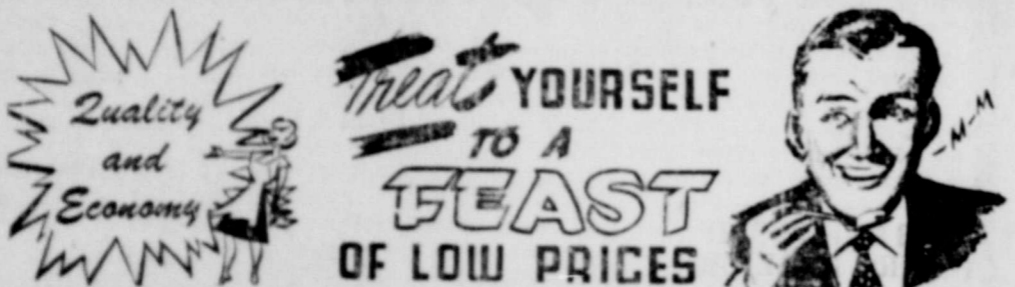

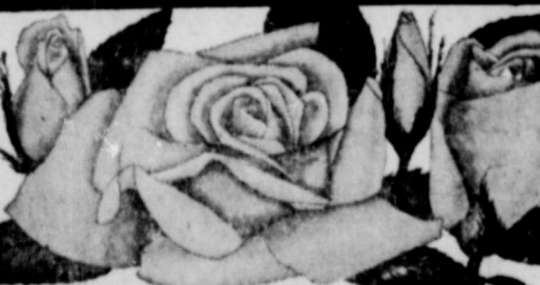

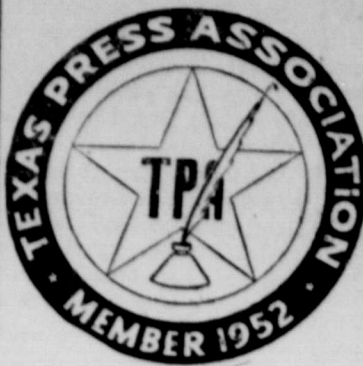

Coke Teachers Hear of Teacher Shortage in Texas

The Coke County Teachers, trustees, and P-TA members attended the Coke County Teachers Associational Meeting on January 28, at Robert Lee. The first part of the program was a luncheon which was sponsored by the Robert Lee School. The home economics department, in connection with the lunch room, prepared and served the meal.

Following the meal, a musical program directed by Mrs. Jeff Dean, choral director of the Robert Lee school, and Jack Gray, band director, was presented.

The after-dinner speaker was J. D. Gallion, Head of the Research Department of the Texas State Teachers Association, Austin, Texas. He pointed out that there were 8,000 vacancies in Texas schools last year. Only 4,000 qualified teachers came from colleges to fill those vacancies, 2,000 of which went into other work that paid more money. Approximately 6,000 vacancies had to be filled by teachers with sub-standard qualifications.

Mr. Gallion also pointed out that there are many schools in Texas so crowded that children have to attend school only a half a day at a time. Some schools are so crowded that children attend in three shifts each day. This ill could be corrected by paying higher salaries to attract more young people into the profession, with more and better buildings.
