## COUNTY AGENTS' COLUMN

WHAT CAN WE SEE IN '53?

Some think farm prices will go up, some think they will go down, we do too. The agricultural outlook for 1953 may be summarized in a few statements gathered from the most reliable sources:

1. The farmer will still be caught between high prices he pays and lower prices he receives. To make profits this year farmers must aim for greater volume and more efficient production.
2. If it rains, fertilizer will pay big dividends. Make plans now to try it out.
3. Sheep numbers are far below average. Wool and mutton will be profitable so far as demand is concerned.
4. Poultry will be more prof-

itable in '53. Egg and turkey production will be down. Better get some pullets ready to start laying early.

5. Hogs are way down in production. Prices should gain through the summer months. When feed becomes more plentiful, there will not be enough pigs to go around.

6. Cattle prices should strengthen by late summer, but common grades should not be kept too long.

7. Milk production is still far below demand. Every farmer should at least produce enough dairy products for home use and some to spare.

8. Price supports are guaranteed for these items in 1953: wheat \$2.21, oats, .80, barley 1.24, grain sorghums 2.43. Push for big production, but hold your costs down.

## Negro Men Fined For Taking Money

Lois Dirks, Negro from Paris, was fined \$50 and costs in Justice E. C. Davis' court in Robert Lee this week for taking money under false pretenses.

Dirks took up money from business houses here in Bronte and supposedly was using it for a Negro Orphans Home at Paris. Sheriff Paul Good said the man admitted having collected more than \$7,500 by this method in 1952 and had taken up more than \$800 in one month and five days of this year.

Early this week Dirks was still in jail at Robert Lee, trying to raise money to pay his fine. Checks which Coke County people had given him were being returned but those who gave him cash were out of luck because the money had been spent.

## Water Restriction Lifted By Council

Mayor H. O. Whitt announced this week that the City Council has formally lifted the water restrictions which were imposed last summer during the serious water shortage.

The Mayor said he suspects most people were not abiding by the restriction anyway, but that it is officially lifted now and Bronte residents may use all the water they wish.

The restriction called for the use of water only as was absolutely necessary, and was passed last summer when the Bronte water supply was dangerously near being depleted.

## 2 Councilmen To Be Elected Soon

Two City Councilmen will be elected for the City of Bronte on the first Tuesday in April, which comes on April 7. The terms of Councilmen Sam Spruell and H. A. Springer expire this year and they will be re-elected or new members for the governing body will be named.

Mayor H. O. Whitt reminded residents of Bronte this week that names of candidates for the places must be in his hands 30 days before the election. He also said that he and other members of the council would like very much to have several names on the ballot this year.

## Seniors Given Kuder Tests

Superintendent J. L. Carroll has just announced that for the 1953 he has given the Bronte High school graduates Kuder Preference Tests provided by San Angelo College without cost.

This test is one of the guidance services for high school graduates of this area which San Angelo College has been giving for the past five years.

As a follow-up to this test, the College will send a team of its expert counselors, Mrs. Frances Carter and C. A. Roberson, Jr. to the local high school to explain results of the test with specific interpretation to each boy and girl and at the same time point out use the student can make of the information whether he goes on to college or enters business.

The San Angelo College Counselors will be here Tuesday, February 17.

This Kuder Test is not an intelligence or an aptitude test. It simply indicates the student's preferences in nine different types of vocations. The information is of importance to each boy and girl in planning future studies or activities.

Mrs. Carter, assistant professor of journalism at SAC, has been a teacher and librarian for sixteen years in Texas schools.

She earned her B. A. degree at Rice Institute and obtained her M. A. degree in adolescent sociology, journalism and English at the University of Texas.

C. A. Roberson, Jr., is assistant professor of Business Administration and Business Manager of San Angelo College. He received the Associate of Arts degree at San Angelo College, the Bachelor of Business Administration and Master of Business Administration degrees at Texas Tech in Lubbock.

## Coke Raises \$3,500 in March of Dimes Drive

Coke County's March of Dimes in all-time high when Silver total was boosted this week to turned in \$1,215 to the fund. The contribution from the people of Silver raised the total for the west side of the county to more than \$2,000 and officials expect the county total to reach over \$3,500.

This figure exceeds by a good margin any amount that has been raised by the March of Dimes in the past, previous high having

been around \$2,500. The \$3,500 figure gives Coke County almost 90 cents per capita and officials say that 50 cents per capita is considered exceptionally good.

Bronte and the east side of Coke County had turned in \$1344.48 at last report. Sources of this money included: \$62.00 from the employees of Rowan Drilling Co., \$92.15 from individual cards sent out, \$422.50 from the Lion's Club's canvass of the Bronte business district, \$10 from the

Humble Camp, \$64.79 from iron lungs, \$89.78 from churches, \$230.03 from two dances, \$45.51 from collections at the Texas Theatre, \$149.05 from the Bronte Schools, \$142.36 from the Mother's March and \$51.31 from Tennyson.

All the money is not in, but the drive is practically complete, and The Enterprise will carry more complete figures next week.

## Daughter Of Man Burned To Death In Wreck Two Years Ago Is Located

The mystery of the identity of a man killed here on March 26, 1951, almost two years ago was cleared up this week, by the letter of Mrs. Maleta Case of Clarksburg, Md.

The man, who was tentatively identified at the time as J. G. (Jack) Stephenson of Washington D. C., was burned to death when the pickup truck in which he was riding hit a bridge and burst into flame between Bronte and Tennyson. Also burned to death was a Maryneal rancher, Jimmy Rogers, driver and owner of the pickup.

Both bodies were badly burned and it was some time before either of them could be identified.

All efforts to find survivors of the man failed but it was established that he had worked at Maryneal and it was believed that he had relatives in Washington or in North Carolina.

When no survivors were located, he was buried in the Bronte cemetery.

In the North Bronte Field, Humble No. 2 Butner, this week made a good showing in the Ellenburger. It is one location south of the same operators No. 3 Butner, Cambrian strike. On a drillstem test from 5,497-5,520 feet, with the tool open 105 minutes, recovery was 1,140 feet of 44.8 gravity oil and 465 feet of oil cut mud. Gas surfaced in 29 minutes.

The Ellenburger was topped at 5,497 feet. A core was cut from 5,520-35 feet and had good oil shows. The next several feet are to be cored and operator expects to find the Cambrian in that section.
