Plans are being made to take part in the observance of National 4-H Club Week from March 7 to March 14. Forty-eight states of the union and all outlying dependencies are joining hands to boost 4-H Club work during this period.

Attention is being called to the support given 4-H clubs by the business men of Coke County. This is only one group of the many who support 4-H Club work in the county. Farm Bureau has been active in its support of 4-H work.

There are many local leaders and public officials who devote time and effort to promote 4-H Club work in the county. Mr. C. E. Arrott was awarded the county agent's award of 1952 for having done more than any other local leader for 4-H club boys, not only in the county, but in District Seven as a whole.

Several former 4-H Boys and Girls who won acclaim as such are now leaders in the work. Those who have been awarded trips to the National 4-H Congress at Chicago are: Le Drew Arrott (2 trips), Weldon Schooler, Neida Ann Sheppard, Wayne Arrott and J. B. Arrott. One outstanding former 4-H member and leader to whom Coke county has laid claim is Jack Brock. He is now teaching at Robert Lee and has won practically every award that a 4-H Club Boy could win.

Tomorrow Is Deadline for City Candidates

City officials are anxious to have some interest evidenced in the election and invited any qualified person to file as a candidate for one of the positions. Mayor Whitt said that any person may put his own name on the ticket or his friends may do so, with that persons consent.

However, candidates names have to be on file in the City Office at least 30 days prior to an election and tomorrow is the latest date that it may be done.

Bronte Bank Robbers Nabbed in Las Vegas

A long chase ended Wednesday morning in Las Vegas, Nevada as FBI agents arrested Scottie Ray Muckelrath, 25, of Cayuga, Texas and Byron Ralph Moore 25, of East Alton, Illinois. The pair is charged with the armed robbery of the First National Bank in Bronte on January 27. The arrest of the pair is also expected to clear up a number of other burglaries and robberies in Texas and Louisiana. They are also under a federal charge of stealing a 1952 Mercury in Raleigh, N. C. last Dec. 24.

Both will probably be brought here for identification and then will be taken to Fort Worth for trial. FBI officers reported that both were unarmed at the time of their arrest and offered no resistance. They had about \$300 in cash in their pockets.

OIL FIELD WORKERS

Both Moore and Muckelrath formerly worked in the oil fields near here and Muckelrath had lived in Bronte and had an account of \$1.61 in the Bronte bank at the time of the robbery.

37 DAYS AFTER ROBBERY

Their arrest came 37 days after the bandits entered the local bank shortly after closing time, bound and gagged Mrs. W. W. Millikan and B. D. Snead, placed them in the vault, took almost \$9,000 in cash, left by the back door and drove away. Forgetting a gun in the bank proved to be one of their mistakes. The FBI traced the 38 Smith & Wesson pistol to Dallas where Moore had bought the gun in his own name. Officers also learned that they had been registered in a San Angelo hotel just before the robbery and a Bronte waitress identified pictures of the pair, stating they had been in Bronte on the day before the robbery.

One of the first leads found was an abandoned 1952 Mercury found in Fort Worth, Texas, which had been seen in San Angelo the day before the robbery and which bore the license plates of a Buick stolen Dec. 5 in El Paso and abandoned Dec. 23 in Raleigh, N. C.

Another lead developed when they purchased a \$4,000 Oldsmobile convertible in Miami, Fla. It was this car which gave them away and was seen in Las Vegas shortly before the arrest was made.

Muckelrath and Moore will also be questioned in connection with a stolen 1949 Pontiac Nov. 16 at Abilene and a holdup of a filling station there on the same day, a filling station stick-up in Houston Nov. 27, a loan company robbery in Monroe, La. on January 21.

Standpipe Cleaned And Re-Painted

Bronte's standpipe was cleaned out and repainted last weekend. Mayor H. O. Whitt said that workmen arrived for the job Friday afternoon but that they were not permitted to start work until Saturday morning in order that as many local residents as possible could be notified that the water would be off.

The inside of the tank was scaled, cleaned and painted and the outside was painted. The riser pipe had to be replaced, he said, as the old one was completely worn out.

Whitt also said that the standpipe is becoming well worn and several places had to be patched when it was cleaned. The Mayor said that he wanted local citizens to know that the tank is wearing out, so they can be thinking about the time when it will have to be replaced.

LIONS HEAR SUPT. B. C. GOODWIN OF ROBT LEE SCHOOLS

Members of the Bronte Lions Club Tuesday night heard Supt. B. C. Goodwin of the Robert Lee Schools tell his ideas of what schools of this area need in order to better serve the purpose for which they exist. Topics of Supt. Goodwin's talk was "Putting First Things First."

The program was planned in connection with Public School Week, March 2-7.

Goodwin listed the following five needs of present day schools:

1. A better informed public as to what is going on in the schools;
2. More and better teachers;
3. Education that is positive in what it has for the students to learn;
4. Schools which are modern and well equipped;
5. A change in the financial set-up of the schools.

Goodwin said that the Texas Legislature is now trying to solve the problem of attracting more and better trained persons to the teaching profession and he added, "A good teacher is always underpaid and a poor teacher is always overpaid."

He also pointed out that a great number of the children in Texas go to school in old worn out buildings and use antiquated equipment but he said "we don't drive a 1923 model car."

In a practice game Monday night the Lakeview girls won from the local girls by a score of 53-36. The Lakeview lasses are district champions of district 9AA. The girls B team also played the Lakeview B team and were defeated 31-39.

The Bronte basketball boys lost their first game in regional play last Friday at Brownwood. They lost to Centennial at 1 p. m. by a score of 56-81.

Winners of this district over Merton, the local lads have completed their basketball for the season and have started to train for track. Tentative plans are that the track meet will be held in Robert Lee in 3 or 4 weeks.

National Education Week

The Citizen's Educational Creed

(From the Texas Schoolboard News Letter)

I believe that:

1. Public education is indispensable to the preservation and growth of American Democracy.
2. Continuous personal and financial support of public education is the responsibility of every citizen.
3. Public education should guarantee the opportunity of free education for every boy and girl.
4. Public education should be controlled locally through lay boards selected by the people.
5. Public education must continuously change to meet the personal, social, and economic needs of individuals.
6. Public education must be founded upon basis of moral and spiritual values, while reaffirming the traditional American principle of separation of church and state.
7. Money wisely spent for public education is an essential investment in the future welfare of the nation.
8. The chief responsibility of public education is to prepare boys and girls for full and active participation in the American way of life.

Nine ways I can help my school board of trustees:

1. I will vote at all school board and other school elections after adequate study of the issues.
2. I will recognize the authority vested in the board of trustees and work through them as my legal representatives.
3. I will consider it my duty to attend occasional meetings of the school board and/or keep myself informed on school board matters.
4. I will expect the school board to employ a well trained superintendent of schools and to seek his recommendations in administering the schools.
5. I will expect the school board to act as a legislative and policy-making body and to hold the superintendent responsible for carrying out the Board's policies.
6. I will expect the school board to employ competent, well-trained teachers and other personnel on the recommendations of the Superintendent.
7. I will submit all requests or complaints in writing to the school board, or appear before the board as a whole, rather than exerting pressure on any one individual board member.
8. I will recognize that all school board business must be transacted in open board meetings.
9. I will recognize that individual board members are the same as any other citizen when not in session.

Most Of Money For Schools from Local Funds

A little more than half of the money used to operate the Bronte Public schools comes from local funds, money paid by the taxpayers of the school district.

Supt. J. L. Carroll said this week, National Education Week, that the funds are made up as follows: Federal aid, 1.8 percent; State aid, 45.4 percent; County funds, 1.9 percent and Local funds, 50.9 percent.

Amount from these four sources are as follows: Federal, \$2,100; State, \$53,424; County, \$2,206; and local, \$60,000. These figures total \$117,730, which is the estimated receipts for the district next year.

Finances of the Bronte School District have been steadily improving since the discovery of oil in the district. Oil companies have been footing a large portion of the bill for the past three years. Last year Humble Oil & Refining Co. paid more taxes than the entire tax roll amounted to before oil was found here.

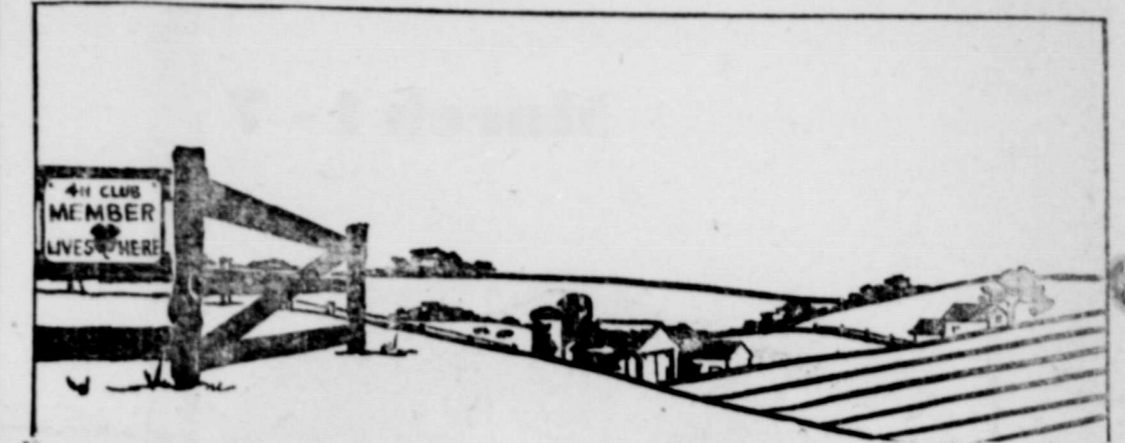
