Bank Robbery Suspects Are Indicted Wed.

Scottie Ray Muckelrath, 23, and Byron Ralph Moore, 24, were indicted Wednesday by a federal grand jury for the armed robbery of the First National Bank in Bronte on January 27.

The two are charged with entering the local bank and taking \$8,927. Two men entered the bank late in the afternoon on that date and tied up B. D. Snead, cashier, and Mrs. W. W. Millikin, assistant cashier, took the money, and put the two bank employees in the vault. It is believed they left by way of the back door.

Reports were out that Muckelrath and Moore were seen in Florida, Louisiana and several other places before they were arrested in Las Vegas, Nev., March 4, by Nevada authorities and the FBI.

Following their capture a search of their room yielded 1,100 one dollar bills tied in a bank wrapper, FBI agents reported. Two loaded revolvers were also found in the room.

When arrested it is said that the men had \$1,000 in cash and between 20 and 30 new suits. They told authorities they had been gambling.

FROM LAS VEGAS PAPER
A Las Vegas newspaper, received by The Enterprise had the following account of the capture. The paper was dated March 4.

"Two men, wanted in a Texas bank robbery, were nabbed here today after sheriff's officers and F.B.I. agents sprung a trap after the stakeout of a hot car parked at First and Ogden Streets.

Arrested in the January 27 heist of the First National Bank in Bronte, Tex., were Scottie Ray Muckelrath, 23 and Byron Ralph Moore 24.

Sheriff's officers said the arrests were the result of the sharp eye of Deputy Stan Jones, swing shift dispatcher. After he got off duty early today, Jones was driving his private car in the downtown area when he spotted the wanted men's car.

Jones said he recognized the license plate numbers from an all-points bulletin sent out on the pair from the San Francisco office of the FBI.

The deputy immediately informed his office and the FBI office here.

A total of six deputies and FBI agents responded to the call and set up a stakeout on the car at 2:40 a. m.

More than five hours later, at 7:50 a. m. two men approached the hot car and the trap was sprung. Officers surrounded the pair, identified them as the wanted men, and hustled them off to the FBI office.

Arthur Cornelius, special agent in charge of the FBI's Salt Lake City office, said later the two men will be charged with violation of the federal bank robbery statute of a stolen motor vehicle, act and with interstate transportation.

The latter charge is in connection with a car stolen in Texas February 12. It could not be determined immediately if it was the same car the men were arrested near today."

New candidates for the two vacancies are A. F. Ball and Leonard Fletcher.

Officials pointed out that although the deadline for filing is passed write-in names will be accepted on the ballot.

Councilmen are elected for two year terms.

D. K. Glenn will be election judge.

Bronte Area Receives Over 2 Inches of Rain

Bronte and practically all of West Texas was drenched last weekend with slow, earth soaking rains. Bronte received a little over two inches and rural areas of the community received about the same amount.

Farmers and ranchers are hopeful that they can quit feeding within the next ten days or two weeks, as they expect the moisture to bring up weeds, as well as to help the small grain

that is still alive. Local residents would not go so far as to call the weekend rains a drought breaker, but they were hopeful that this area is coming out of the worst drought that most people can remember.

Thirsty San Angelo received the highest amount of moisture, rain gauges there showing from four to four and one-half inches. Lake Nasworthy was filled and millions of gallons of water had

had to be turned down the River from the reservoir. Some water was caught in the new North Concho Lake, also; however its water shed did not receive the rainfall that did the Lake Nasworthy area.

Oak Creek Lake in northeastern Coke County was not helped a great deal by the rains, as they fell so slowly that most all the water soaked into the dry ground.

Farmers are thinking about doing some planting now and two seed dealers were in The Enterprise office Wednesday to advertise their wares in this week's paper.

South of town C. E. Arrott reported two inches and Louis Bridges said he received 1.8 inches. To the north, Blackwell had two inches.

Other places and their reported rainfall follow: Ballinger, 2.40; Eden, 4.01; Miles, 3.50; Brownwood, 2.65; Paint Rock, 4.25; Colorado City, .86; Robert Lee, 2.25; Sterling City, 1.81; Winters, 2.50; Maryneal, 1.70; Abilene, .50; Sweetwater, 1.00; Garden City, 2.00; Big Lake, 2.50; Midland, .77; Sonora, 1.00; Menard, 1.00; Junction, 1.52 and Del Rio, 1.80.

Weather forecasts indicated the area may receive additional moisture within the next few days. However the sun came out Wednesday afternoon and was shining brightly for the first time since Saturday.

Mr. and Mrs. McQueen were taken to the Shannon Hospital by the Clift ambulance. Mrs. McQueen is suffering from bruises and bone fractures in the right arm, while Mr. McQueen suffered numerous cuts and bruises. They are reported to be doing fine and will be home in a few days.

FATAL ACCIDENT

On the west side of the county another and more tragic accident occurred about noon Sunday, fatally injuring three persons. Dead in the accident are Clyde Alton Turner, 34, his wife, 28, of Odessa and Mrs. Elton Polvadore, 35, of Ralls. Both women were killed instantly and the man lived until Tuesday when he died in the Coke County Memorial Hospital in Robert Lee. Wet pavement was blamed for the accident.

The accident occurred eight miles northwest of Robert Lee. Mr. and Mrs. Turner were riding in a 1952 Chevrolet driven by his twin brother, Alfred. The car skidded into the pickup driven by the Polvadores.

It was the first highway fatality in Coke County this year.

COKE COUNTY'S OLDEST CITIZEN, DANIEL W. SMITH, 100, DIES HERE

Coke County's oldest resident, Daniel W. Smith, died Tuesday night at the home of his nephew, Tom Smith. Mr. Smith had reached the age of 100 years, 1 month and

23 days. He was a native of Texas and is known to have been a resident of Coke County and this vicinity for at least fifty years. His health failed him about one year ago. He had made his home with his nephew for many years.

Graveside services were conducted at 3 p. m. Thursday with the Rev. Maynard R. Rogers, Pastor of the Baptist church, officiating. Interment was in the Fort Chadbourne cemetery under the direction of Clift Funeral Home.

Mr. Smith had never married and has no living brothers or sisters. He is survived by two sisters-in-law, Mrs. Joe Smith of Abilene and Mrs. Mandy Smith of Abilene; six nieces, Mrs. T. B. Douglas of Hawley, Mrs. Stella Summers of Abilene, Mrs. Bennie McClon of Rising Star, Mrs. Roy Harsmen of San Angelo, Mrs. Eliza Lee of Ballinger, Mrs. Maud Jones of Millersview; and three nephews, Tom of Bronte and Louis and Johnnie of Abilene.

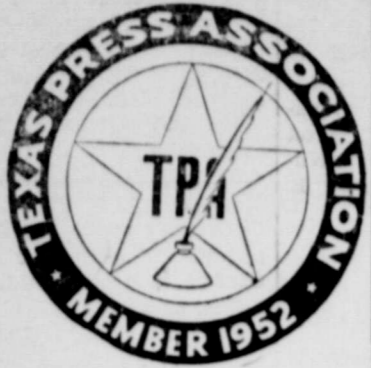
