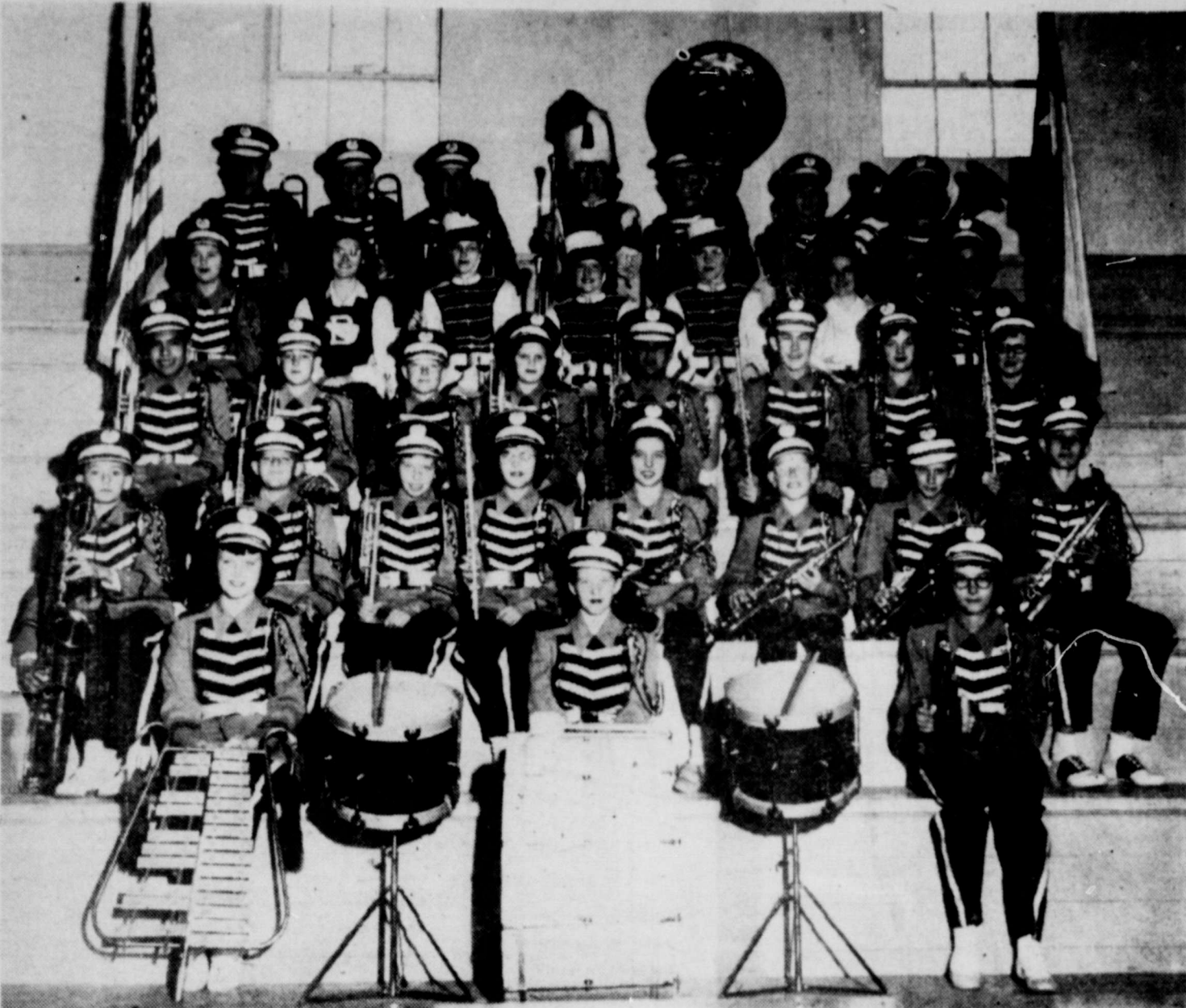

Bloodmobile To Stop At Bronte March 30

March 30, which is one week from Monday, is the date the Bloodmobile Unit will be in Bronte to take blood from local citizens to be used in defense work and in the fight against polio.

The unit will be set up from 1 to 7 p. m. at the First Baptist Church.

County Agent Travis B. Hicks, who is in charge of the Bloodmobile program in Coke County, called a meeting of interested

citizens Tuesday and chairmen for various committees were appointed. Hicks also discussed aspects of the program with those present, and pointed out that Coke countians will have to cooperate to the fullest extent if the program is to go over.

Hicks said that in order for the Bloodmobile to make a profitable stop here, 120 pints of blood would have to be donated. In order to do this, he said at least 240 persons will have to

pledge to give a pint of blood, since some will not be able to come, and others will be rejected for reasons of health, etc.

The recruiting committee, which is in charge of getting Bronte folks lined up to give blood, is being headed by Baptist pastor, Rev. Maynard R. Rogers. He is being assisted by Rev. J. E. Fuller, Methodist minister, Leon Sharp, Church of Christ minister, Rev. Clyde M. Coleman Kickapoo Baptist minister, and Rev. R. M. Cooksey, Baptist minister of Blackwell.

This committee is busy setting up the machinery of their group. Plans call for someone to be responsible for getting each five donors signed up and to the place where the blood will be given.

Supt. J. L. Carroll was appointed to head the service committee, which will be in charge of supplying typists, receptionists, etc. and Ben Olesby was named to head the publicity committee.

The county agent pointed out that Dr. John R. Harris has volunteered to assist with the work, and a local nurse will also be present, in addition to the nurses which work with the unit regularly. Hicks said that a local doctor has to be attendance all the time while blood is being taken.

All of the blood which is being given in this program is being used in Korea and for other defense needs, with the exception of 1,000,000 pints which the Red Cross has set aside for use in the production of gamma globulin. This medicine has promise of providing a cure for polio and will be used for research toward that end.

Oil News

BRONTE FIELD

The Ibcx Co. and R. F. Windfohr have filed application to drill their No. 3 R. E. Hickman to 4,900 feet. It will be located one location north-northwest of present 4800-foot production, on a 47.6 acre tract. It will be 220 feet from the south and west lines of 6-W. W. McCutchen survey, one mile west of Bronte.

FORT CHADBOURNE

Stanolind has staked its No. 23 Edna Wylie as a stepout to production in the Fort Chadbourne Field. Location is about three miles southeast of Fort Chadbourne. It is to drill to 5,700 feet.

The Fort Chadbourne Field has been extended 5/8 mile to the south and 3/8 mile west with the completion of Humble No. 78 Sallie Odum. It pumped 32.45 barrels of 45 gravity oil plus 90 per cent water in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 1,064-1. Location is in J. Cross survey 300.

NORTH BRONTE

Stanolind No. 1 E. C. Rawlings recovered 50 feet of slightly gas cut mud on a drillstem test from 5,500-60 feet and drilled on to the Cambrian which was topped at 5,700 feet.

Lion No. 5 Mary Rawlings took a drillstem test from 4,717-30 feet in Crosscut sand and recovered 20 feet of slightly gas cut mud. The test was drilling at 4,788 feet at last report.

Lion No. 2 Mary Rawlings was swabbing the Gardner between 5,371-79 feet. Operator hopes to complete this well dually from the Gardner and Goens.

Lion No. 1 Mary Rawlings has been completed from the Goens for a daily potential of 164.64 barrels of 49.7 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 222-1. Production was from perforations between 5,031-37 feet.

This well was completed in December, 1952, from the lower Gardner for a daily potential of 862.22 barrels of 50.6 gravity oil. This pay is about 300 feet deeper than the Goens, production coming from perforations between 5,330-42 feet. No. 1 Mary Rawlings also showed potential production from the Canyon sand, Palo Pinto and Ellenburger. It is the first well in this area to be dually completed.

Lions Hear Cahen And Runge Talk Of Boys Ranch

Members of the Bronte Lions Club Tuesday night heard Carl A. Cahen, executive secretary of Boys Ranch, and Carl Runge, president of the Ranch, tell about the work of the organization.

Runge, who is a San Angelo attorney, and Cahen expressed the thanks of Boys Ranch for the school bus which the Bronte Lions Club donated.

According to Runge, the Ranch is equipped to care for 15 boys and at the present time there are 28 living there.

In addition to the Boys Ranch representatives, T. B. Hicks and a representative from the Red Cross Bloodmobile program were present to discuss the coming blood-donation program with the Lions.

January Oil for Coke 542,687 Bbls.

Coke County's oil production during January was 542,687 barrels, according to figures released by the Railroad Commission. The Jameson field led the county, with more than half of the overall production, with the Millican Field second.

Production in the 17 fields of the county was as follows: Jameson, 351,851; Millican, 78,619; Arledge, 315; Bloodworth, 572; Bronte, 42,518; Bronte Gardner, 180; Bronte 4800, 29,700; North Bronte 5300, 11,519; Fort Chadbourne West, 8,736; Lygag, 3,840; Lygag (Caddo), 634; Lygag, South (Strawn), 155; McCutchen (Cisaco), 13,096; McCutchen West, 372; San Benito, 310; and Wendland, 270.

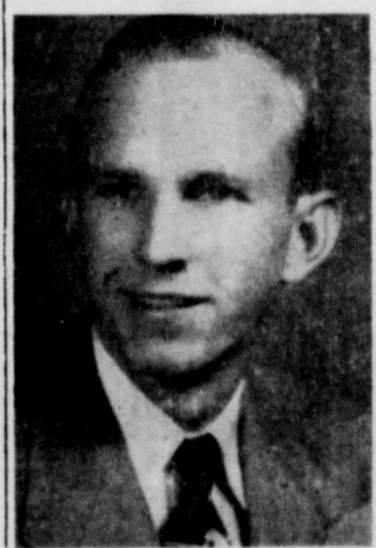
The Texas Railroad Commission has lowered the April allowable considerably, and production has been cut from 21 to 19 days for next month.

Supt. J. L. Carroll said this week that all parents who will have children to start to school next September, should come by his office so that a census blank may be filled out on them.

This is necessary so that no child will be missed. The local school will not receive state money on children that are not reported in the school census, so it is very important, Carroll added.

Two More Names On Ballot for School Trustee

The names of Bill Looney of Bronte and Clark Glenn of Tennyson were placed on the ballot for Bronte School Trustee this week, making a total of six men seeking the two jobs which will be voted on April 4.

As reported in last week's Enterprise, the names of C. L. Brown, Marvin Corley, Cullen Luttrell and M. G. Stephenson were previously placed on the ballot.

The terms of W. W. Millikin and Brown expire this year and Millikin did not choose to run for re-election.

Other names may be placed on the ballot up until 10 days before the election. This is a change in the rules which have previously allowed names to be placed on the ballot only five days before elections. Names may also be written in.

D. K. Glenn is election judge; Mrs. Frank Keeney is in charge of the Bronte box; W. T. Green in charge at Tennyson, Osmo Black in charge at Oak Creek-Marie and T. G. Gleghorn in charge at Brookshire.

All qualified voters in this district are urged to begin consideration of the coming election. In this election, a qualified voter is one who lives in this school district and who has paid their poll tax from this district. Anyone who becomes 21 years of age this year does not have to have paid poll tax but is entitled to a free vote.

The polls will be open from 8 a. m. until 7 p. m. at all voting boxes.

Tries to Save Fuel Refund to Farmers

Every tractor farmer in Coke County will lose one-fourth of his refund on non-highway gasoline tax if House Bill 388 is passed by the State Legislature, according to C. E. Arrott, president of the Coke County Farm Bureau.

Rep. James W. Yancy of Houston introduced the bill which would take away one cent of the four-cent-a-gallon refund and allocate it to the available school fund, the county farm leader said.

"What the proponents of this bill forget is that the so-called tractor gas 'refund' is not actually a refund since the money never belongs to the state. The tax is collected on all gasoline, sent to Austin, and then returned to the rightful owners," Arrott added.

The Farm Bureau leader said that the backers of the Yancy bill were apparently using the strategy of calling attention to the needs of schools and then pointing to the refund money as a likely source of income. He said this would make the bill more difficult to defeat because the demand for a teachers' pay raise has touched off the hottest issue of this 53rd legislative session.

"The farmers pay their fair share of school taxes right along with everyone else in the school districts, and it isn't right for an additional burden to be placed upon them," Arrott said.

The head of the county farm organization said that if one-fourth of the refund were lost now, it might mean that the entire refund eventually might be abolished. He urged all farmers in the county to get in contact with their representatives in the state capitol and inform them of their desires and wishes on the refund issue.

During the last legislative session — two years ago — the Texas Farm Bureau was instrumental in saving the tractor gas refund, the county road bond assumption monies and the rural road program.

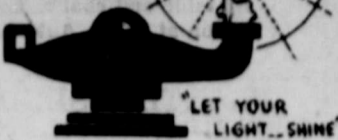

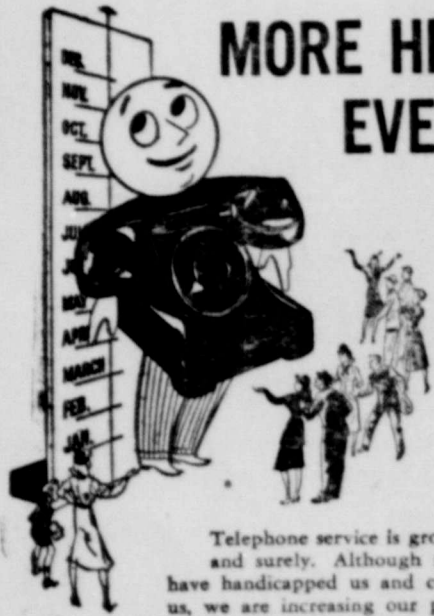

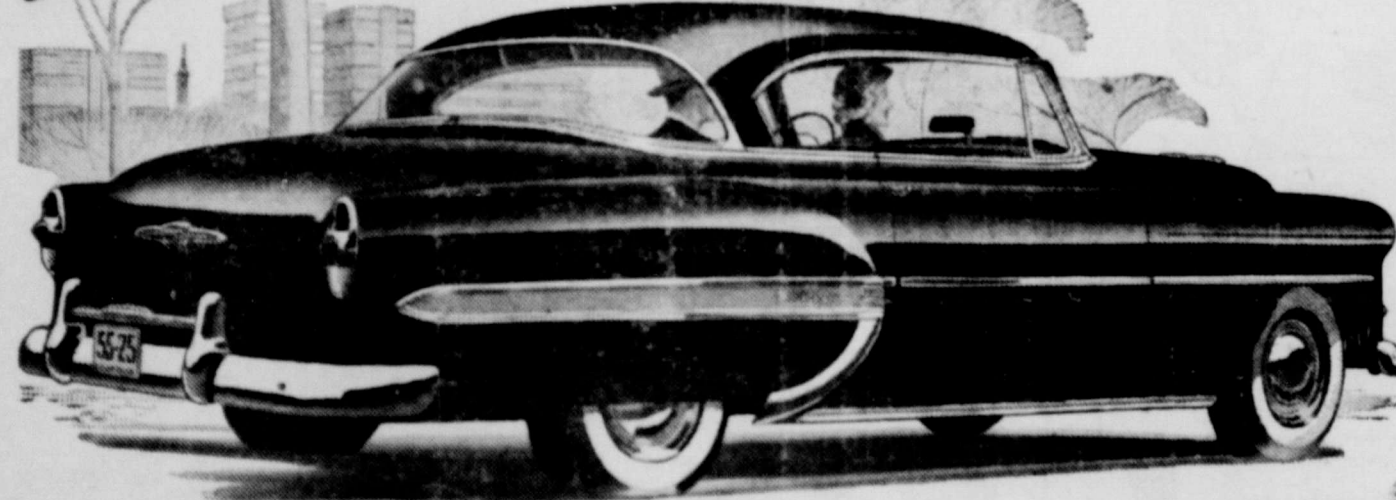
