## YOUR SENATOR REPORTS

(Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, writing from Washington, reports weekly on happenings in the National Capital as they affect Texas and Texans. The Enterprise will run these articles insofar as space permits.)

The Senate took up last Wednesday the legislation restoring Texas' title to every foot of land she had as an independent Republic and which we retained when we entered the United States.

This is the so-called Holland Bill, of which Senator Price Daniel and I are co-sponsors. Senator Daniel and I worked very closely together to get this bill out of committee. Forty Senators are co-sponsors of this bill and it has the support of the Administration. The House passed similar legislation last week.

Texas' historic boundaries will be restored.

I understand that bills are to be introduced in the Senate and House to reorganize the Farm Credit Administration and make it an independent agency. I have not yet seen copies of the proposed bills, but the principle involved seems sound. The legislation would bring control and participation in all functions of the agency down to local levels within the 12 agricultural credit districts through the country. I think the agency should also be permitted to make economic emergency loans for any agricultural purpose, as well as for disaster type loans now authorized.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson called a grain sorghum industry conference here Tuesday of last week. Purpose was to review the present grain sorghum situation and to consider measures to help stabilize prices and production. Invited from Texas were B. J. Gist of Abilene, Jack N. Greenman of Fort Worth, and Bob Yeager and Mark Triplett, both of Amarillo.

The FSA reorganization bill, main effect of which so far as Texans are concerned will be to make Oveta Culp Hobby the first Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, sailed through the Senate last week. Nobody registered a negative vote.

## License Money Expected to Hit \$50,000 in 1953

Sheriff Paul Good said this week that he expects money derived from the sale of car license tags to hit \$50,000 during 1953.

Good pointed out that at the end of March last year his office had sold \$32,000 worth of tags, and an additional \$8,000 worth were sold during the remainder of the year.

At the end of March this year Coke Countians had paid out more than \$42,000 for licenses and Good said if sales during the remainder of this year are as good as 1952, the total will hit the \$50,000 mark.

The Sheriff said that Coke county gets to keep all money under \$50,000 for the county road and bridge fund; there fore the county should reach the maximum amount which can be put into this fund from the sale of license plates.

## Funeral Services Held in Arizona for Mrs. Hines

Funeral services were held on March 19 in Wilcox, Arizona for Mrs. A. Hines. Mrs. Hines died in Glendale, Calif., where she had gone for medical treatment.

She was born Carrie Norton at Ballinger, Texas, Aug. 8, 1886. Mrs. Hines was a sister of Bronte A. J. Rawlings, Sr. of Bronte and will be remembered by many friends here. She once was a teacher in the local school system.

## WHITT NAMED CHAIRMAN OF SCHOOL GROUP

In a meeting last Thursday night of interested citizens, H. O. Whitt was named as general chairman of the school advisory committee, which is studying the needs and facilities of the local school system.

Whitt said this week that a nominating committee will be appointed in the near future, and this committee, in turn, will name other committees to study and deal with the various problems which will be taken up.

A letter which is being printed below has been sent to all the larger taxpayers in the school district. It asks the co-operation of these large firms and is self explanatory.

We welcome your suggestions and any assistance you are in position to give us would certainly be welcome.

The morning message will be delivered by young Rev. Billie Butts, pastor of the Ray Baptist church, ordained just this past Sunday by the church he serves.

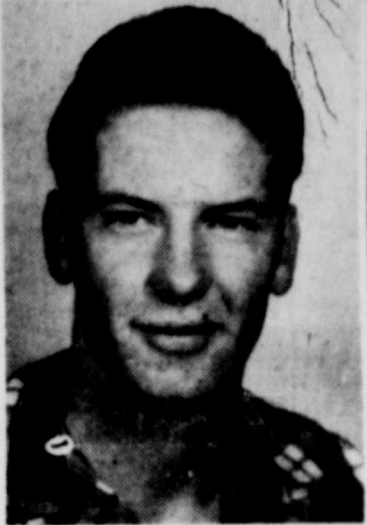

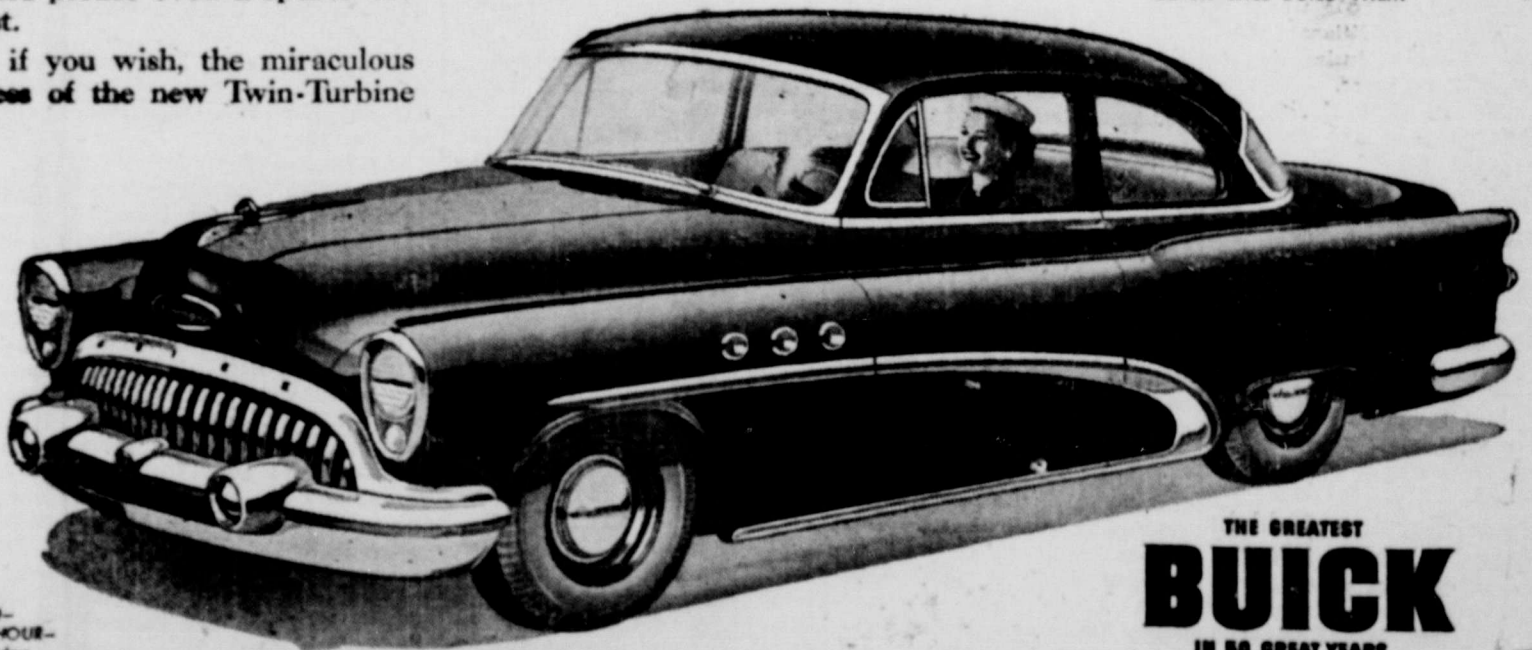

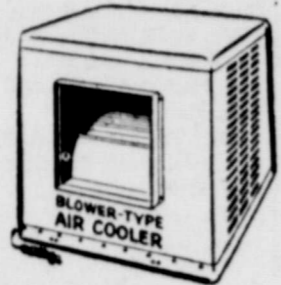
