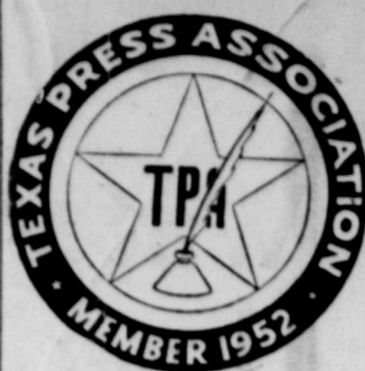

Important Notice to Persons Holding

Notary Public Commissions

Secretary of State Howard Carney has announced that he will reappoint all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1, 1953 and June 10, 1953. The law specifically requires County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon.

Any person who has not heretofore been a Notary Public should apply to his County Clerk between May 1, 1953 and May 23, 1953, if he desires to have this application given prompt attention in the State Department, as the rush of reappointing all old Notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions.

Secretary of State Carney said, "Each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the County for which he is appointed; exact names and permanent addresses should be given to the County Clerk in applying for a commission, as location of the Notary may be necessary long after he has notarized a particular instrument."

Looking Backward

(April 25, 1924)

The Bronte Weekly Enterprise of this edition was dedicated to the people of Tennyson and was a special edition telling about them. The editor, D. M. West, said it was given its name either by Mr. Sam Sayner or Mr. John Sayner. Because of its picturesqueness, it seemed so close akin to the beautiful poetic sentiment of Lord Tennyson that it was given the name it bears after him.

The Enterprise went on "approaching Tennyson from any distance except the West, one comes in view of the town from some distance before the town is reached."

"Tennyson has been a town with post office facilities since August 20, 1906. It was first located about a mile southwest of the present location and was known as Juniper. In 1909 the post office was moved to its present location. The community had school beginning in 1904. The school was first called County Line. In 1912 the name of the school was changed to Tennyson and school district 18 was created."

"The town has one church building, owned by all the religious denominations of the community."

"Industrially and commercially, the town has four stores, one garage, and one blacksmith shop and a cotton gin. J. L. Howell is the post master and is also engaged in the grocery business, auto accessories and lubricating oil and gasoline. J. A. Ellison is also a merchant, selling drugs, jewelry, dry goods and hardware."

"M. J. Dunn is another merchant. He carries a full line of fresh, clean groceries and also a full line of garden seeds. Mr. Dunn is also establishing hotel facilities at Tennyson."

"Another business man of the town is S. J. Townsend. He is selling dry goods and groceries and is buying the people's produce. In December of 1923 the Masonic Lodge of Tennyson was organized in the second story of the building owned by Mr. Townsend."

"D. E. Little is the blacksmith and garage man for Tennyson." (Other news items were in the April 25, 1924 edition were:)

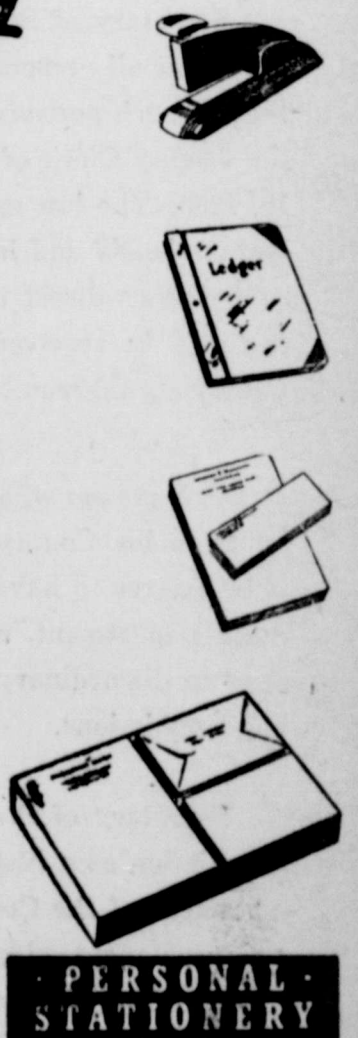
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
