WITH THE 24TH INFANTRY DIV. IN JAPAN — Pvt. Claude R. Ash, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe H. Ash, Bronte, Texas, recently joined the 24th infantry division in Japan.

Pvt. Ash, assigned to Company D of the 34th Regiment, entered the Army in November 1952 and was last stationed at Camp Roberts, Calif.

A 1947 graduate of Bronte high school, he received his Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees from Texas Technological College.

Now receiving intensive field training, the 24th Infantry Division is part of the security forces for the Japanese Islands. The 24th fought in Korea for 19 months before being relieved in early 1952.

Athletic House To Be Built At Bronte School

Members of the Bronte school board consulted with architect Doyle Maddux of San Angelo last Monday night at their regular meeting. The group worked on plans for the new athletic house to be attached to the north west corner of the gymnasium.

The Board instructed Maddux and Supt. J. L. Carroll to secure as many bids as possible for construction of the building and the bids will be presented at a board meeting Monday night, July 20, for consideration.

Plans include showers, dressing rooms, rest rooms, and storage rooms to be housed in the 46 by 20 foot building. The addition will be constructed of brick face tile and sand face tile to match the existing band room and outside architecture of the building.

A Red Cross Bloodmobile unit will be in Runnels County next month and officials of the Runnels County Red Cross welcome any donors from this county. The unit will be in Ballinger August 10 and in Winters on August 11.

Santa Fe Agent H. O. Whitt said Thursday morning that ten cars of feed have arrived at the depot here, to aid farmers and ranchmen in their fight to survive the drouth. The feed is coming through the government program which was initiated two weeks ago.

Among the feedstuff is cottonseed cake, cottonseed meal, corn and wheat.

The feed is being distributed through the county PMA office and stockmen who are interested in securing some of it should contact the office in Robert Lee. County Agent Travis B. Hicks sends in a story which is being carried in this paper concerning the use of the concentrates being received through the government program. He warns stockmen against feeding too much of the concentrated feed in proportion to the roughage they have available. It is particularly important to watch this, he says, during hot weather.

Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Tuesday for Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Wilson Henderson of 1322 Luna, San Angelo at Cox Funeral Chapel. Rev. C. H. Richards, San Angelo, at the Cox Funeral Chapel. The Rev. C. H. Richards, pastor of the Primitive Baptist Church of Santa Anna, was in charge of the services.

Mr. and Mrs. Henderson were killed Saturday night when their car collided with an oil field truck loaded with 2 3/4 inch drill pipe. The accident occurred at a detour barrier, marking new construction on the Big Spring highway, eight miles north of San Angelo.

Mr. and Mrs. Henderson are survived by two sons; Frank Henderson, who is in the Army in Japan; and James Henderson of Gila Bend, Ariz.; and three grandchildren.

Mrs. Henderson, who was 58 years old, is also survived by her mother, Mrs. Ed Dixon of Bronte; one sister, Mrs. Maggie Hageman of Bronte; three brothers, Jack Dixon of Bronte; Sam Dixon of Coolidge, Ariz.; and John Dixon of Red Rock, Ariz.

Other survivors of Mr. Henderson, who was 66 years of age, are three brothers, Lester Henderson of Eldorado; Clyde Henderson of Sonora and Leonard Henderson of Compton, Calif.; five sisters, Mrs. Lena Fitzpatrick of San Angelo, Mrs. Gertrude Fickling of San Angelo, Mrs. Mon McDonald of Eldorado, Mrs. R. C. Morgan of Ft. Worth, and another sister, whose name was not available, who lives in California.

Mr. Henderson was a shipping clerk for the Monarch Tile Co. of San Angelo.

Claims from Hail Damage Amount To Over \$60,000

Bronte residents received more than \$60,000 from insurance companies represented by Mrs. R. W. Rees and Youngblood & Glenn as a result of the hail damage here during the first part of May.

L. T. Youngblood estimated that companies his firm represents paid at least \$45,450 and Mrs. Rees said a conservative estimate for the amount paid by companies for which she is representative was \$15,000.

Probably insurance carried by local citizens with companies not having a representative here will amount to another \$15,000 or \$20,000, running the total received to \$75,000 or \$80,000.

Youngblood said he estimated almost \$40,000 was paid for damage to buildings and contents of buildings, while approximately \$5,500 was paid for damage to automobiles.

Mrs. Rees said that in addition to claims on cars and buildings, her companies paid damage to several house trailers which amounted to sizeable sums.

The hail, which occurred about 5:30 a. m. on May 11, was one of the heaviest ever seen in this area. It happened the same day that San Angelo was struck by tornado, doing untold damage to homes and other property in the Lakeview district.

A four inch rain followed the hail during the next few days, and Oak Creek reservoir caught enough water to assure Bronte of a plentiful water supply.

Both Mrs. Rees and Mr. Youngblood said that they were well pleased with the manner in which adjusters for the insurance companies handled the claims of their customers here in Bronte. Liberal settlements were made by the firms and very few complaints were heard, they said.

Water Consumption Increases 2 1/2 Times

Bronte citizens have increased their use of water approximately two and one-half times since the supply has been coming from Oak Creek reservoir. Water bills for the month of June were the first to reflect the huge increase.

Along with the increase in water usage, has come an increase in revenue to the city from the sale of water. Water bills totaled \$1,745.75 for the month of June, as compared with \$806.25 for the previous month.

City Secretary Mrs. Jerry

Proctor said that up until June the water assessment against local residents ranged from \$800 to \$950 per month.

During the period which was covered by the June bills, 5,087,000 gallons of water were sold

to Bronte consumers. This can be compared with 2,066,500 gallons sold the month before.

Water Superintendent Otis Smith said that he has strict orders from the mayor and City Council to cut the water any place in town if the water bill is not paid by the 20th of the month.

It was also reported that the Council decided to charge a \$5 bill to get the water turned back on. Smith and Mrs. Proctor both urged local users to pay their water bills promptly, since the city has obligations to meet every month with the money derived from the water works system.

Smith pointed out that the water level in Oak Creek reservoir has dropped about two and one-half feet since the rains in May. He said this leaves the Bronte intake pipe in approximately twelve feet of water. Considering the facts that the lake had not been in use before and the great amount of evaporation caused by dry weather, the lake is holding up remarkably well, Smith said.

Smith recently received his certificate from the State Health Department, which shows that he has passed the qualifications test for treating water used by the public. It was presented to him after completing a short course from Texas A&M College and other instruction in the treating and handling of water supplies.

Getting ready for the fall season the bleachers and concession stands have been painted and plans are underway for the construction of a fence around the field.

The field has been broken, levelled and seeded to grass and is being watered constantly. Part of the grass is up and the field is expected to be in good shape when the season opens.

Officials also said they would appreciate it if softball fans will refrain from driving their cars on the newly seeded field, and park in the road. Cars driving on the field pack down the ground and hinders the start of the young grass.

COUNTY AGENT COLUMN

Attention Farmers and Ranchers. Word comes from Paul C. Shillingburg, county supervisor, that the Farmers Home Administration now has disaster loan funds available under Public Law 38 for the purchase of feed, other essential farming expenses and for a minimum amount of living expenses to enable farmers to remain on their farms, produce crops, and retain their foundation livestock.

Loans for these purposes may be set up for repayment for as long as two years, if necessary. The interest rate is 3 per cent.

Anyone interested in a disaster loan may meet Mr. Shillingburg at the county agent's office each Thursday between 10 a. m. and 3 p. m.

Drouth Emergency Notes

If there are farmers or ranchers who wish to sell livestock, they may list their livestock for sale with the county agent. There are buyers in other sections of the United States who are in the market for stock. Also, there are opportunities for grazing in other states, if ranchers wish to ship to grass. Anyone desiring information concerning any such movement of livestock should contact your county agent.

Bronte has been in the center of a rainy section of West Texas the last few days. The only trouble is that it hasn't rained much in the center. Torrential rains fell at Edith in the west part of Coke County Wednesday night, along with tornadic winds. It was reported.

Wednesday night, San Angelo received good rains. Wednesday morning saw good rains to the north and east of Bronte. Varying amounts of moisture were received in Ballinger and Winters and other towns to the east Wednesday, also. The area south of the river received from a half to one inch of rain the first part of the week.

Plan Feeding To Benefit from the Drouth Program

Since all types of concentrates are available now through the Drouth Relief Program and at comparable prices, farmers and ranchers should plan their feeding to get the greatest benefit from these feeds, County Agent Travis B. Hicks said this week.

He continued, "First, let us warn feeders against feeding too much protein during this extreme hot weather. This could do more harm than good.

"Second, we suggest that farmers make use of corn and oats as feed for breeding livestock. Of course, each feeder must take into consideration what roughage he has available.

In most instances, it will pay to supplement the concentrates, corn, oats and meal, with a small amount of hay, the county agent said. Since hay is cheaper than cottonseed hulls in comparative feed value, he suggests hay, either alfalfa or good grass hay as a filler.

SCHOOL REPAIR UNDERWAY FOR FALL OPENING

Repairs to the building, sanding, painting and installation of new furniture has been underway at the Bronte school building for the past several weeks, in preparation for the fall term.

According to Supt. J. L. Carroll, the first and second grade rooms, study hall, library and 12th grade rooms have been refinished and sanded.

New furniture has been moved into the 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th grade rooms and new furniture has been received for the 2nd grade room. With the installation of this furniture, all the grade school rooms will have been refurnished in the past two years.

The entire building is being repaired and retouched and readied for the fall opening. Grass has been seeded on the school ground and is being watered.







SCS NEWS

"Well constructed, correctly designed and staked out terraces are well worth the money that it cost to build them," said Lowell Roane, District Cooperator with the Coke County Soil Conservation District. "The terraces that I built on my farm last spring apped all of the water that fell during the May rain, and held it until it could soak into the ground. I did not lose any water by runoff," Roane said.

Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service, assisting the Coke County Soil Conservation District, designed, staked, and checked terraces for Roane.

A. V. Sheppard, Work Unit Conservationist with the SCS at Robert Lee stated also that "The protection of crop stubble and returning it to the soil is one of the most needed practices in the district. Crop stubble correctly maintained and managed on or near the soil surface will give such benefits as control of wind and water erosion, retard the rate of runoff, reduce evaporation, control excessive soil temperatures, increase infiltration, maintain organic matter content, and reduce raindrop impact. These benefits can be secured at little or no cost to the land owner."

D. K. Glenn, district cooperat- or who farms and ranches near Bronte is doing an excellent job of protecting his small grain stubble, according to Sheppard. Glenn is plowing the land with small solid sweeps, opening up the soil to trap the water and increase the rate of infiltration when we receive rain.

Jacob Morrow, also cooperat- ing with the Coke County SC District recently completed three miles of level closed end terraces and built up four miles of old terraces to meet the need of the land. The terrace system is a part of Morrow's complete co-ordinated soil, range, and water conservation plan to treat each acre of his range according to its needs. The technicians of the SCS assisted Morrow with the development of the plan.

BEING TRANSFERRED
