Sonora Station Reports on Live Grass in Area

How much of our grass is still alive after three years of drought? This question is frequently asked by farmers and ranchers in the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

The Ranch Experiment Station at Sonora has made some checks to answer that question. Conditions at that station are about average for West Texas, and the results of their study conform in general to observations which have been made in the Coke District.

They found that about 12 percent of the curly mesquite, 45 percent of Wright's reedgrass, 87 percent of silver bluestem and 97 percent of the side oats grama was still alive.

Grasses died worse on heavier stocked pastures, but the checks showed that pastures which are rested four months during each sixteen month period have more live plants than pastures with a lighter stocking rate but without rest periods.

Plots were staked off on all pastures of the station, and the plants in each plot were counted. Three inches of water were applied followed a week later by 1.5 inches more. None was allowed to run off. Plants which did not green up after two weeks were considered dead.

The short grasses have suffered a higher death rate than the tall ones.

As Soil Conservation Service technicians have observed in the Coke District, stocking with straight sheep did the most damage to short grasses. Stocking with cattle alone has done more damage to tall grasses. Mixed stocking with both cattle and sheep did the least damage.

Personnel at the station believed that there were enough live plants on their pastures to re-establish a cover following good rains, provided it is not grazed too heavily during the first several weeks after growth begins.

Cattle and sheep are pulling up a lot of live plants while grazing, because roots are so weak and shallow. Considerable damage can be done this way while the livestock are receiving little benefit from the sparse grazing.

Water District Formed At Blackwell

In a recent election at Blackwell, a vote of 67 to 3 created a water district for the newly incorporated town. Supervisors elected for the district are: T. A. Carlisle, president; and Henry Raney, Melvin Odom and J. Roy Sanderson. Walter Sanders was named assessor-collector.

The supervisors are now working on the organization of the water system, which will require the city to vote a bond issue for purchase of required installations to secure water from the Oak Creek reservoir.

The system will not require a standpipe as water will be pressure filtered from the pipeline from Oak Creek Lake. Freese and Nichols, Fort Worth engineers, are now preparing the plans.

Recent showers on the Oak Creek water shed have brought the lake up several inches.

Kewanee 1A Wendland was bottomed at 3,661 feet in sand, taking a drillstem test.

Plymouth 1 Hickman was 993 feet in shale.

Superior 1-161 Price, bottomed at 583 feet, was running 13 3/8 inch casing. Mid West 1 Forehand was below 5,955 feet in lime and shale.

29 Cars of Drouth Relief Feed Have Been Received

Coke County has received 29 cars of feed and had three cars of pellets enroute up to Wednesday morning, according to J. E. Quisenberry, head of the county PMA.

The PMA office is now accepting orders for a second 30 day supply of feed. Even though some farmers and ranchmen have not received their first order yet, they may place their order for another 30 day supply now. It is hoped that all first orders will be delivered by early September.

The drouth committee met Friday, Aug. 7, and ordered the second 30 day supply for the county. The order consisted of 750 tons of sheep pellets, 250 tons of cow pellets, 250 tons of meal, 15 cars of oats, 15 cars of corn and three cars of wheat.

The 29 cars of feed already received were made up as follows: 19 cars of cake, four cars of corn, three cars of meal, two cars of oats, and one car of wheat.

Quisenberry said that wheat is available for almost immediate delivery.

Fort Worth — While it appears that accusations of chiseling on the drouth relief program, et cetera, will occupy the headlines for some time to come — the basic problem will remain.

Government authorities are watching very closely the perages of cows and heifers being ing marketed each day. Until the time as the slaughter of females reaches 50 percent of the total kill — then the cattle population is still swelling.

Many observers feel that huge cattle numbers, rather than drouth, are responsible for the current low prices and the disastrous declines of the past year or so. Many sections of the southwest not in the drouth areas, are heavy over-populated with cattle at this time.

Most observers in the Southwest hope that surplus cattle here can be moved before the heavy grass cattle runs from mid west and western ranges hit the markets later this summer and in the fall. Chaotic conditions could result in shipments are delayed in the Southwest and South.

Slaughter steers and yearlings brought firm to strong prices at

Fort Worth Monday. Several loads of well finished cattle in the \$2 to \$22.50 bracket. Common and medium kinds sold from \$10 to \$17. Fat cows were steady to \$9.50 to \$12.50, and canners and cutters 25 to 50 cents higher at \$7 to \$9.50. Bulls ruled steady at \$8.00-13.50.

Good and choice fat calves were sold at \$14.00-18.00, and killing calves generally ruled weak to 50 cents lower. Cull, common and medium butchers sold from \$10 to \$14.

Good and choice stocker steers calves drew \$14.00-20.50, with heifer calves \$18.50 down, the top prices paid for a load of Montague County calves from S. D. Howard. Stocker steers yearlings drew \$12.00-18.00. Replacement cows cleared at \$10.00-15.00.

Hogs sold \$1 higher. Hog growers balked in the face of recent low prices. Offered only 42,000 hogs around 12 major markets — 25 percent below a week earlier. Top at Fort Worth Monday \$23.00-23.25. Sows steady at \$17.00-19.00.

Slaughter lambs weak to 50 cents lower at Fort Worth Monday. Other sheep and stockers and feeders steady. Active demand for stockers and feeders.
