## Cotton Committee-men Selected

A county-wide meeting of cotton producers who have signed Reduction Contracts was held at Dimmitt Tuesday afternoon. The provisions of the contract covering 1935, also the conditions of signing the new one-year contract were explained by the county agent. Community committeemen to serve in 1935 were elected as follows:

A. L. Haberer, chairman; J. H. McGaughey and J. D. Duree, members, and Milton Ott, alternate.

Following the meeting the community committee selected the county committee as follows:

Temple Rogers, P. L. Cunningham and C. P. Nash.

There are 99 reduction contracts in force at present and this number is expected to be doubled during 1935.

## Castro Co. Gins 975 Bales Cotton Prior to Jan. 16.

Government reduction and drought both taking their part of the cotton crops in Castro county for 1934, the county ginned only 975 bales as compared to 5,327 for the prior year.

Lamb county, adjoining Castro, fell short of their 1933 crop by 39,116 bales, ginning 51,204 bales prior to Jan. 16, 1933 and only 12,088 bales prior to Jan. 16, 1934. With the retention of the government reduction program for 1935, the cash crop for the south that has become so popular for the west in the past few years, will probably again fall far short of the 1933 crop. The cotton quota has been set at 10,500,000 bales of 500-pound weight for 1935. Approximately, there are certificates for 700,000 bales of 479 pounds of lint cotton issued the past year still in the hands of the producers.

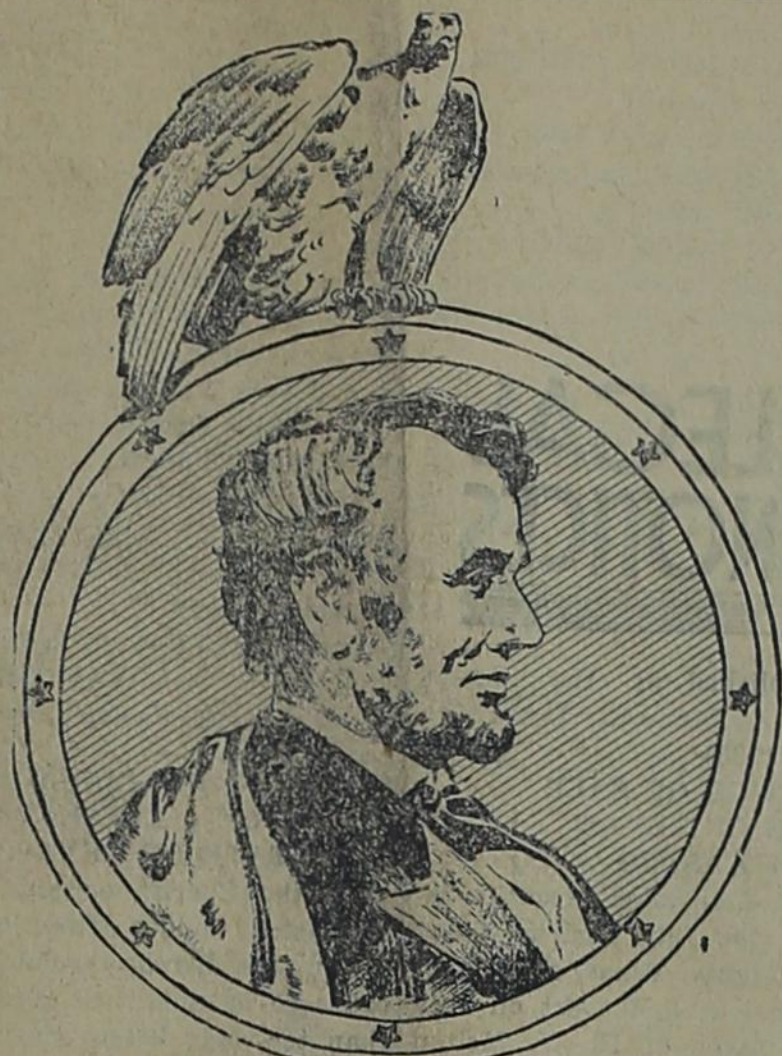
The Panhandle Lumber company of Dimmitt is furnishing all building material for this new home.

## 780 PAY POLL TAX

Exclusive of those not required to pay their poll tax this year, the voting strength of Castro County will only be 780. Many persons, believing that there would be little use made of their voting power this year, failed to pay their poll tax and the county will fall far short of the number of voters that should be cast in the elections to be held in 1935.

Only fourteen days after our present president's birthday, comes the birthday of another great president, Abraham Lincoln. President Lincoln is well remembered by both the north and the south and will probably never be forgotten as long as the great Civil War of 1861 is set down in history. Courageous and unflinching in his desire to learn, Lincoln began his early life with hardships few can imagine. Hard laborious work awaited him each day of his life. Probably only a year of schooling was all that he received, but his desire to learn caused him to read books of learning which he often had to borrow from his neighbors. Frontier life, changing homes every few years, and poverty were all overcome, and in 1834 Lincoln was elected to the Illinois Legislature, continued in government activities, though sometimes unsuccessful, for the next few years, and in 1860 was elected President of the United States, piloting the country successfully through the war between the states. On the 14th day of April, 1865, Lincoln was shot at Ford's Theatre by an assassin and passed away the following day, loved by the north, envied by the south, but respected by all.

## Castro Co. Continues War On Rabbits At Big Square Monday

With interest in rabbit drives still at high pitch, the farmers of Big Square, under the supervision of a committee of which Otis Burton is president, Alfred Scott, secretary and Murl Stiles vice-chairman, are planning one of the largest rabbit drives to be held in Castro County. Monday morning, Jan. 11, the participant will organize at the Big Square store where free transportation will be afforded to the place of the hunt one mile north of the store.

The committee named is working with the county agent in putting on successful drives that will net the farmers the most rabbits for their efforts and ammunition and the Big Square drive will be one of their first organized campaigns.

Alfred Scott, one of the committeemen, and C. H. Stewart, both of Big Square stated that the drive is expected to bring hunters from over the entire county and they have planned to furnish refreshments of sandwiches and coffee provided the cups were brought by the hunters. The ladies of the Big Square community will also be at the drive with homemade pies to sell, the proceeds to be used to put opera chairs in the local school auditorium. The committee and the farmers are cooperating to make the drive not only one of the largest but one of the most successful drives ever held in Castro county. Mr. Stewart stated that the rabbits were plentiful in that part of the section and that it should be little trouble to make a record hunt provided the hunt is as well attended as they anticipate.

For the convenience of the hunters, ammunition will be on hand at the drive and sold to the hunters at cost price. Shells for all gauges of guns will be sold containing only the proper size shot.

Precautions will be used in the hunt in order that no accidents will occur and children under the age of 15 will not be allowed to participate in the drive. No rifles will be allowed due to the long range of the bullets and the danger of killing or injuring a hunter.

The rabbit drive, being held in the period in which the Commissioners Court of Castro County has allowed a two-cent bounty per rabbit, should prove less expensive to the participants that desire to scalp the rabbits. However, the farmers all agree that the riddance of these pests that do so much damage to young crops is well worth the cost of the ammunition and the sport of hunting the rabbits is time well spent.

Sunnyside, holding a drive Monday, Jan. 4, reported a kill of several hundred rabbits.

In the last few weeks Vega has sponsored two very successful drives that has netted many thousand rabbits, and the drive at Hart, though being called off, netted 3,000 rabbits to the farmers who organized and continued the hunt in spite the bad weather.

Farmers and sportsmen are urged by the committeemen sponsoring the drive at Big Square to be sure to remember the date of the hunt and be present to help rid the Big Square community of their rabbits.
