Bronte Loses to Loraine by 13-12 Score; Home Game Friday

The Bronte Longhorns came home last Friday night after losing a hard fought game to Loraine by a score of 13-12. The outcome was uncertain until the final play of the game, which was one of the most exciting of the year and kept fans on their feet most of the time.

The Longhorns capitalized on the first break of the ball game to score. On the opening kick off, the Loraine boys allowed the ball to roll into the end zone and Eddie Braswell came down quickly to pounce on it for the score. Stephenson missed the try for conversion and the score was Bronte 6, Loraine 0 and the score remained thus for the rest of the first period and most of the second.

Loraine's first score came late in the second period after they had recovered a Bronte fumble on the 29 yard line. It took them only 6 plays to hit pay dirt. Johnson carried it over from the 11 for the score. The try for point was missed to leave the score at

the end of the first half all tied up at 6-6.

The Bulldogs came back early in the third period with another touchdown. Again they took advantage of a Longhorn fumble to set up their scoring opportunities. This time it took them only 6 plays to go 38 yards for the score. Johnson again carried the pigskin over, this time from the 29. Herm kicked the extra point to make the score 13-6.

The Longhorns scored again after they took possession of the ball on a punt on the 34 yard line. It took the Bronte boys 10 plays to drive over the score. The final play came on a sneaker by Stevenson from the one. The try for extra point was no good to make the final score 13-12 in favor of Loraine.

Both the Longhorns and the Bulldogs had 8 first downs to their credit. The Bronte team gained a net total of 118 yards, while Loraine gained a sum of 212 yards.

PLAY HERE TONIGHT

The Longhorns will be at home tonight to meet Rankin. This will be a non-conference game, but the boys will be in there fighting and local fans are urged to turn out and support the home team. Game time is 8 p. m.

Only two more games remain on the schedule and both will be played here. Hermleigh comes to Bronte Nov. 6 and Robert Lee comes over for a conference tilt on Nov. 20.

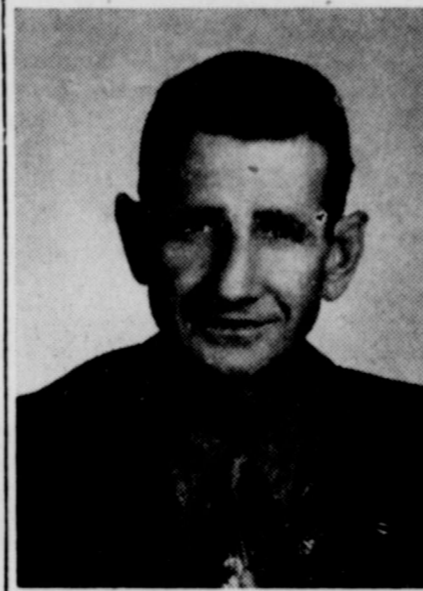

At the county convention of the Coke County Farm Bureau Tuesday night, O. T. Colvin of Blackwell was elected as new president of the organization. He succeeds C. E. Arrott.

A large crowd attended the convention which was held at the Legion Hall at Robert Lee. A barbecue supper with all the trimmings was served.

A program was presented by musicians, Chester Derrick and Bert and Homer Cornelius, of Tennyson. Russell and Ola Sue Bown, also of Tennyson, gave several vocal numbers.

Other officers elected were: James Arrott, vice president; Mrs. C. E. Arrott, secretary-treasurer. James Arrott was named delegate to the state convention, which meets at Mineral Wells Nov. 9 and 10, with Colvin as alternate.

Business for the year was closed out in a business meeting, presided over by the outgoing president, C. E. Arrott.

The new president said that he would like to urge all persons who are interested in the welfare of farming and ranching in this county to join the Farm Bureau. A membership drive is now underway.

City, School Taxes Coming in Slowly

City and school taxes have not been coming in at too rapid a pace during the month of October, according to the tax collectors for the two groups. B. D. Snead, collector for the Bronte school district, said that only \$3,400 has been received by the school district up to Wednesday, while Mrs. Merle Proctor, city secretary and tax collector, re-

ported that \$1,784.50 has been received by her office. She did say, however, that \$802.43 in delinquent taxes had been received in addition to that amount.

Total amount of taxes on the city books is \$10,293.48, while the school district has better than \$80,000 on its books.

Meanwhile, collections by Paul Good of state and county taxes were coming in at a much more rapid rate. A majority of the tax money for these two sources comes in during October because of the 3 percent discount which is given during this month. The discount is cut to 2 and 1 percent, respectively, during November and December on state and on county taxes.

Good reported that \$298,275.30 has been received during this month, leaving only \$100,483.87 outstanding.

Good also said that 150 poll taxes had been paid so far this year.

COUNTY VALUATION UP

Taxes for the county and for the Bronte School district have increased greatly during the last few years because of the oil development in this area. City taxes, however, remain about the same.

Coke County's tax valuation increased about 3 million dollars this year, bringing the total assessed valuation for the county past the 20-million-dollar mark.

Valuation in 1952 was placed at \$17,064,720, while the 1953 figure is listed at \$20,397,830.

A substantial increase was also shown in county taxes this year, but the levy was actually reduced from 95 to 85 cents. Land valuation dropped and livestock fell far below normal because of the decreases in herds due to the drought.

Bronte's School tax rate of \$1 per \$100 valuation is unusual, according to Snead, since most of the neighboring towns have a \$1.50 rate.

HALLOWEEN QUEENS TO BE CROWNED

Final plans are being made for the annual PTA Halloween festivities to be held Saturday night in the Bronte gym. The first event will be a costume parade for Bronte children at 6 p. m. After the parade the best dressed boy and girl will receive a prize.

Following that will be an intermission period so people can eat at booths in the gym. Coffee, cold drinks, sandwiches, cakes and pies will be offered.

Next event will be the coronation of the Halloween Queens. Each class in school has elected their candidates and the winning classes will crown their queens. A queen will be elected for the high school and one will be elected for grammar school.

Admission is free and the public is invited to attend. Proceeds from the queen's races and the food booths will be used by the PTA for school activities.

Flower Shop to Open Saturday

Mrs. Word will also have some gift items on display. She will handle vases, dish gardens, variety items, potted plants cut flowers and Serria-Columbia pottery of California.

Third annual Junior Market Turkey Show has been set for today and tomorrow and will be held in Robert Lee. Entries will be judged according to market classification. The turkeys will be brought in today for judging.

Each exhibitor will show three hens and three toms. All turkeys will be sold, as in the past, for a price slightly above the market. Ribbon awards will be made.

A rabbit division will also be offered this year, with individual classes for heavy and light breeds according to age groups.

AUXILIARY TO SELL POPPIES HERE NOV. 7TH

Saturday, November 7, has designated as "Poppy Day" in Bronte and members of the American Legion Auxiliary will sell the poppies, made by disabled veterans, on the streets downtown. Any amount may be given for the poppies and proceeds of the sale go to help veterans and their families, who are in need of such help. The sale of poppies will continue until Tuesday, November 10.

The project was discussed at Monday night meeting of the American Legion Auxiliary.

The group also decided to conduct a turkey sale and to put boxes in the local stores for the Christmas gift box. Gifts may be purchased and placed in the boxes. They will be collected and sent to veterans hospitals where disabled veterans may select gifts to be sent home to their families for Christmas.

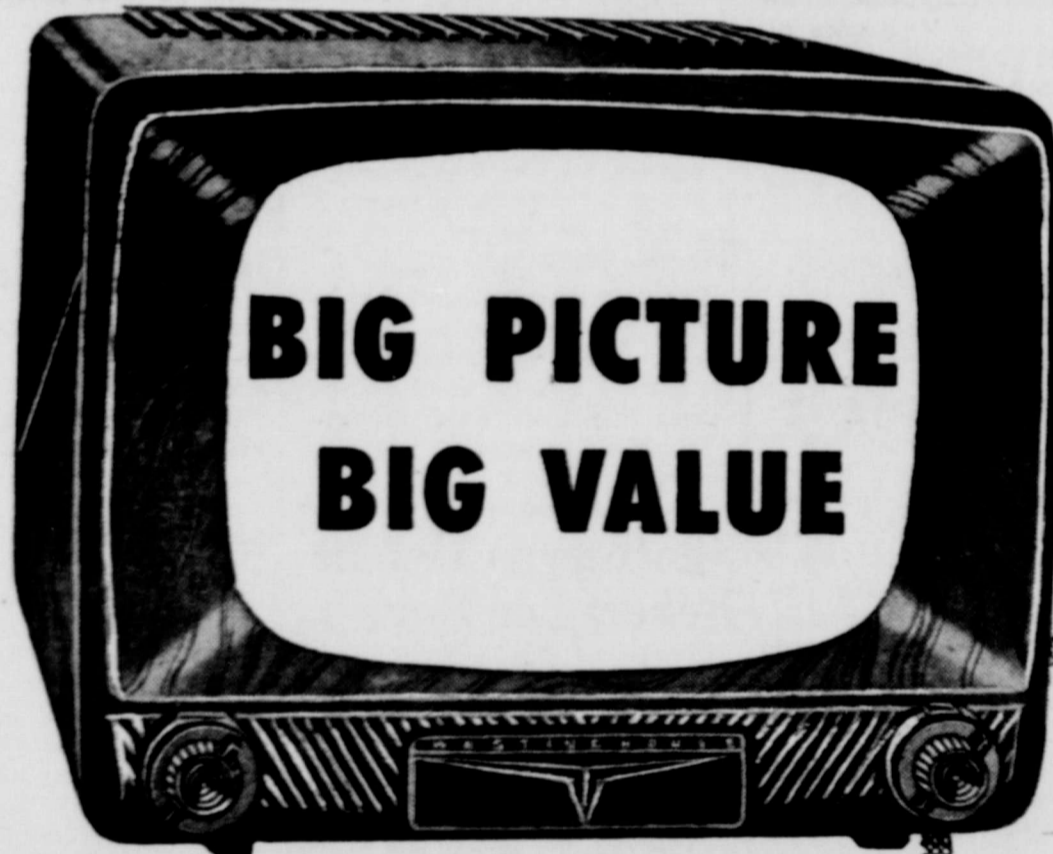
Marlon McCutchen is in the Bronte Hospital where he is being treated for burns around his eyes. He received the burns while working with an electric welding machine.

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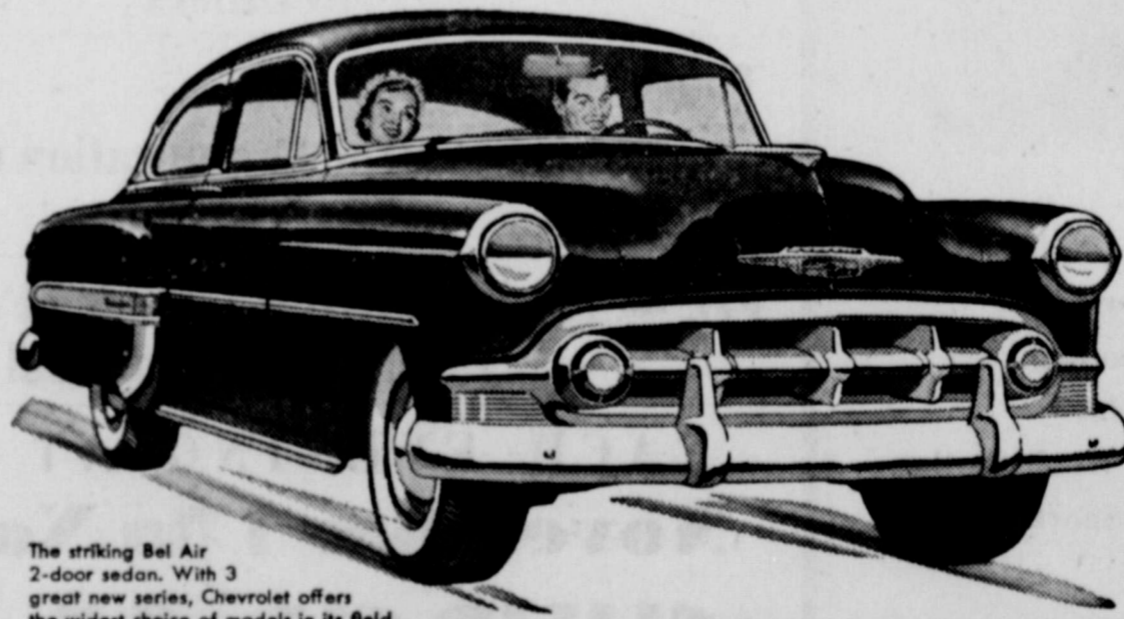

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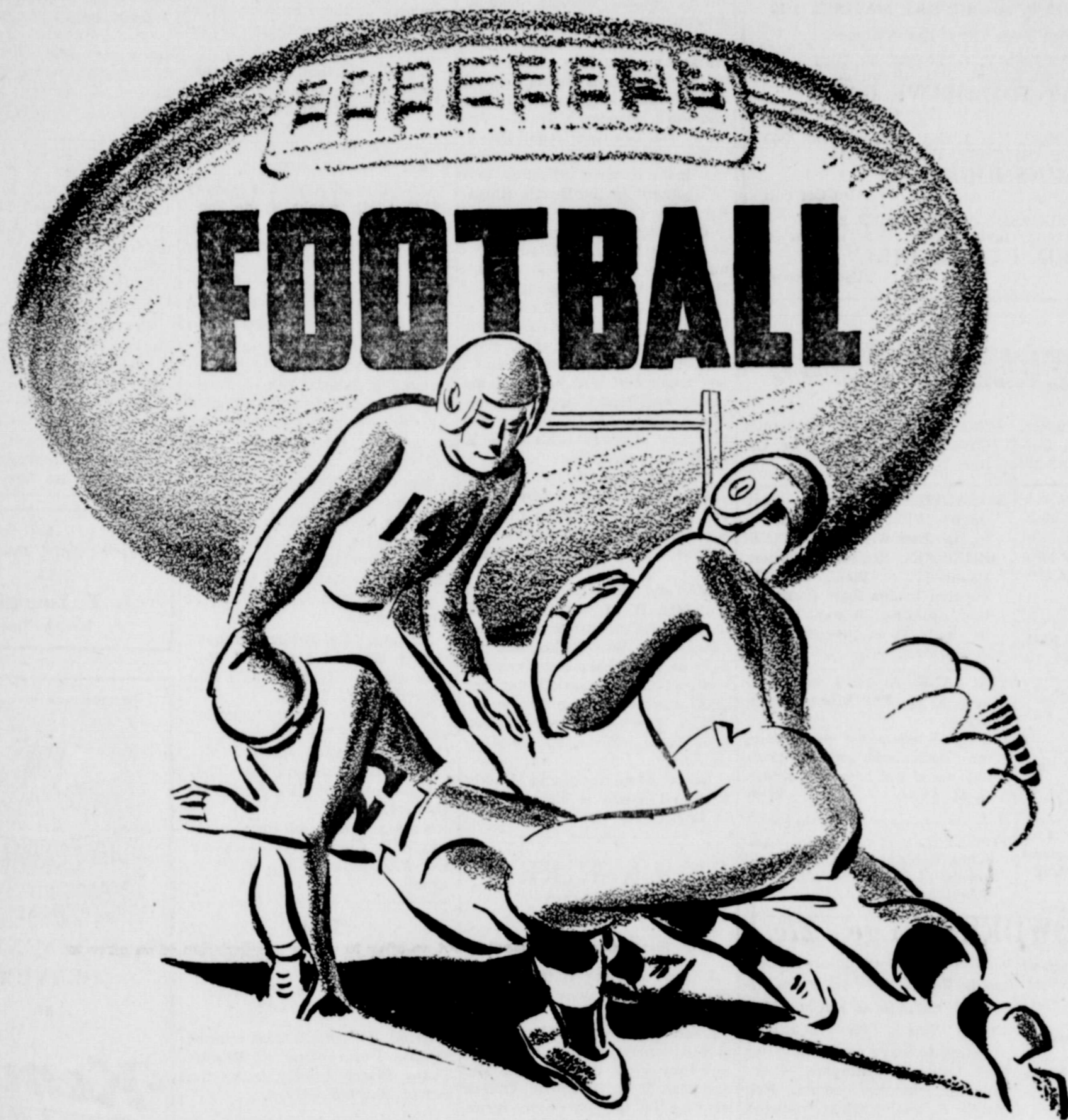
