The battle was marked by many fumbles, one costing the Longhorns a touchdown when they were on the Rankin 8 yard line.

Dr. Jerry Stephens To Assist Dr. John Harris

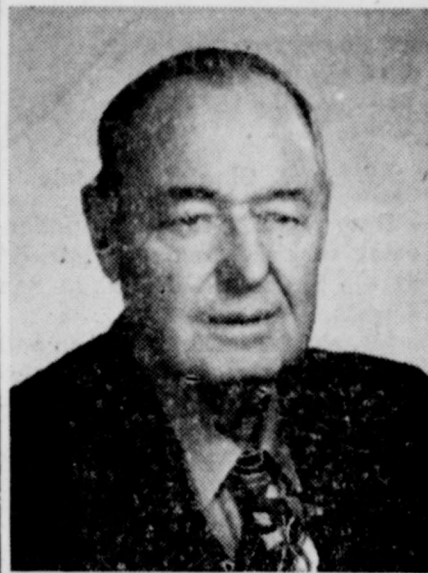

Oil News

Earl M. Craig Jr. of Midland has staked location for a 6,500-foot Cambrian wildcat in the southeastern part of Coke County, 2½ miles southwest of Tennyson. It will be the No. 1 Oscar Brown.

Rotary drilling, on the 21.57-acre tract, will begin at once.

Location is 660 feet from the north and west lines of C. A. Ragsdale survey.

MARKERS

The prospector is 12½ miles south and slightly west of the Bronte multipay field. Three Goens producers in the Bronte field flowed Cambrian oil, but were not completed from that pay. The Cambrian was topped at an average depth of 5,308 feet.

The prospector is also 3 5/8 miles east southeast of Humble Oil & Refining Co. 1 Schuch, wildcat failure abandoned Dec. 11, 1950 at 6,685 feet. The following tops were reported on elevation of 2,358 feet; Palo Pinto, 5,334 feet; and Ellenburger, 6,598 feet.

The Craig 1 Brown is being drilled on a farmout from Perkins-Prothro Co. and is being supported by Humble Oil & Refining Co., Honolulu Oil Corp. and Kirby Petroleum Co. of Houston.

Thos. D. Humphrey & Sons Ltd. of Dallas have filed application to drill a wildcat in Runnels County, ½-mile northwest of Maverick. It will be drilled as the No. 1 Evelyn Spann.

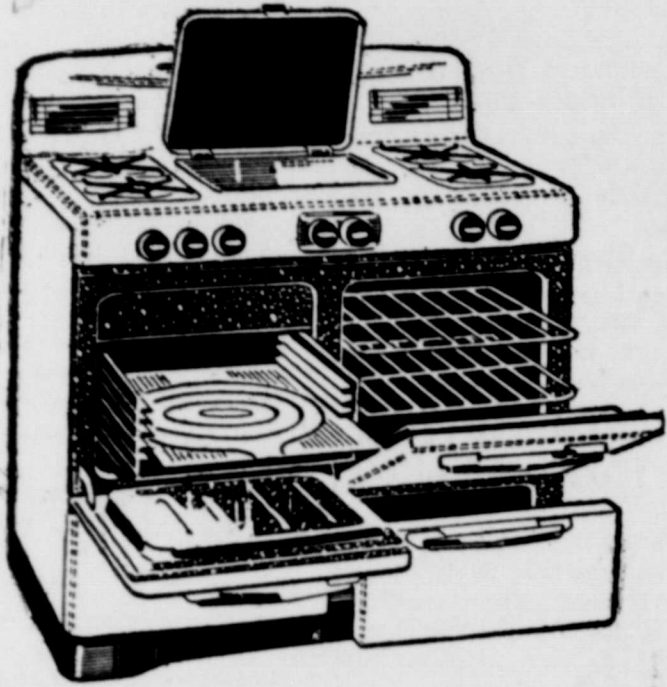
To be drilled to 5,200 feet with rotary, operations will begin at once.

Location, on a 216-acre tract, is 1,700 feet from the north and 2,800 feet from the east lines of 312-B. Sandoval survey. The prospector is one mile south and slightly west of the Maverick, North field, which produces from

Cross Cut sand from between 4,232-5,600 feet. It is 1½-mile southeast of the Humphrey 1 Smith, plugged and abandoned May 17 at total depth of 5,240 feet. Elevation was unreported. Operator reported no tops.

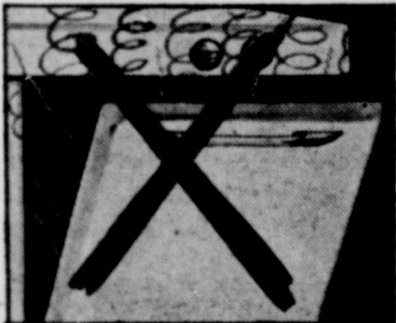

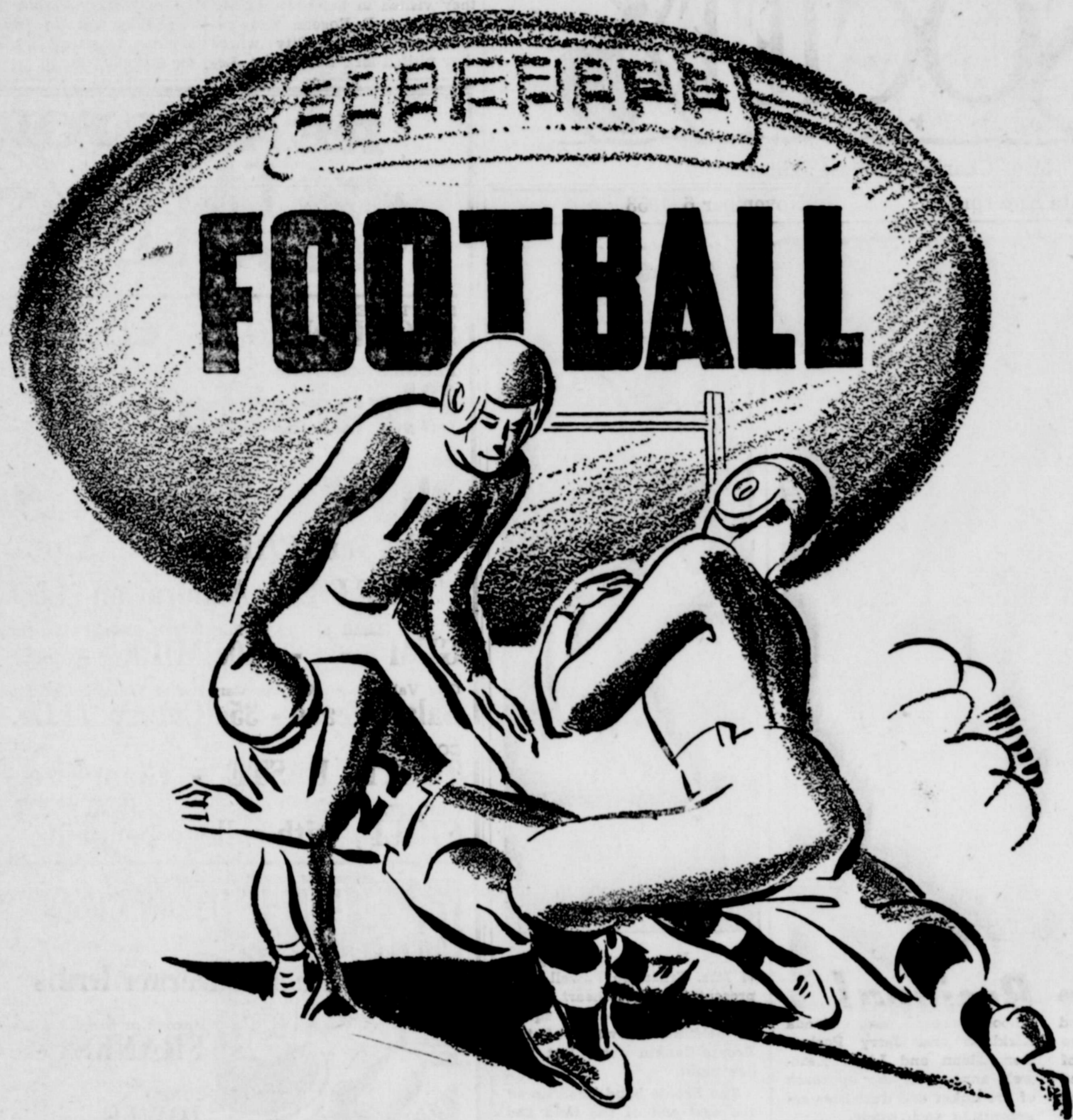

Legion Auxiliary Ladies Sell Poppies Tomorrow

Latham also showed the reserve champion pen of hens, while Peggy Corley of Tennyson had the reserve champion pen of toms. She is a sister of Benny Corley, who showed champions at the recent State Fair in Dallas.

Merle Andrews and his son, Don, monopolized the grand champions in the rabbit show.

Merle Andrews showed the champion buck of the show and Don showed the best doe.

In the light breed junior buck division Jerry Wilkins won both first and second places.

Don Andrews placed first in the light breed junior does with Merle Andrews placing second and Joe Don Wilkins third.

In the light breed senior doe division Merle Andrews was

first, Don Andrews second and Finis Harmon placed third.

Heavy breed junior bucks were shown by Merle Andrews (first) and Joe Don Wilkins (second).

Merle Andrews placed first and second in the heavy breed junior doe division and Joe Don Wilkins took third.

Best heavy breed senior buck was shown by David Key, with James Vernon Andrews placing second and Joe Don Wilkins third.

Merle Andrews showed the best heavy breed senior doe. Earl Calder placed second and Wilburn Wrinkle third.

The best meat pen was shown by James Vernon Andrews. Next best was shown by Joe Don Wilkins and third best by Joe George Wilkins.

The best doe and litter belonged to Joe George Wilkins.

Fifteen exhibitors showed 42 toms and 45 hens. Eighteen 4-H Club boys and girls have fed 1,500 birds this year. They sold 75 at the State Fair. Some will go into breeding programs, and some into commercial markets.

The market is a little stronger this year than last, said Travis B. Hicks, county agent. The club has a special market on fancy birds at 35 cents a pound for toms and 39 for hens.
