Former Resident Dies in Wreck

Funeral services were held last Friday in Pampa for Leslie V. Boggess, 59, who was killed in an auto-truck accident Wednesday night of last week. The accident occurred near Pampa. It was believed that Mr. Boggess either fell asleep or suffered a heart attack before his vehicle collided with a transport truck.

Mr. Boggess was well known here, having been a tool pusher for the Humble Company some five years in this district. He had been an employee of the Humble Company for almost 30 years.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ethel Boggess, three daughters, Mrs. G. T. Hogue of Glade-water, Mrs. R. Wilson of Longview and Mrs. Ben Woods of Rankin; one son, Bill, who is stationed in the armed forces at El Paso; one sister, Mrs. Eva Bennett of Ballinger.

Burial services were held Saturday, Nov. 28, at Rose Hill cemetery in Fort Worth.

Longhorns Fall to Rochester, 38-19, in Bi-District Thriller

The Bronte Longhorns tried hard to pull one out of the fire last Friday evening by making a brilliant comeback in the second half, scoring three touchdowns, but fell short and went to defeat by a score of 38-19 to the Rochester Steers in District 7-B and 8-B Bi-District game.

It seemed that the Longhorns could never start rolling in the first half and let the Steers score 31 points in the first two quarters. The Longhorns also suffered the loss of Dean Stephenson, quarterback, early in the first period, but he returned in the second half to lead the Bronte boys the rest of the game.

The Steers got their first bid to score when Tibbets recovered a Longhorn fumble on the Longhorn 7. Three plays later, Rogers Nanny sneaked it over for the score. The attempt for extra point was no good.

Daniel Recommended for License to Preach

Quarterly Conference of the Bronte Methodist church, meeting in special session Nov. 22, recommended Herman McAfee Daniel, now in the US Army, for license to preach. Daniel announced his intention to prepare for the work of a minister in the Methodist church while he was visiting here recently. His enlistment in the Army is for two years and he will begin his studies at that time.

It is considered likely that he will be given some religious work to do in the army. He wrote Rev. J. E. Fuller, pastor of the Bronte Methodist church, that four months in an army camp convinced him that more Christian workers are needed today.

"Mac" was a popular English teacher in the Bronte school before going into the army and was active in church work. He was recently transferred from Camp Chaffee, Ark. to Camp Kilmer in New Jersey.

Again the Steers recovered a Longhorn fumble on the Steer 38. A few plays later Hollingsworth went 56 yards to the 5 and McWhorter went over from the 3. The extra point try was missed to make the score 12-0.

The next Rochester score was after McWhorter returned a punt to the Bronte 49. McWhorter then passed to McNelly for pay dirt. Again the conversion try was no good and the score was 18-0.

Fourth tally for the opponents came as a climax to an 80 yard drive with Hollingsworth going

13 yards for the score. The Longhorns held on try for point. Once more in the second period, the Steers march 71 yards down the field to score on a pitchback from Nanny to McWhorter after Nanny was trapped on the 6. Nanny ran the extra point to make the score at halftime 31-0.

MAKE COMEBACK BID

The Longhorns then made their fine try to get back into the ball game by scoring 3 tallies in the second half, while holding the Steers to 1.

First Longhorn TD came on a long pass from Stephenson to Arbie Phillips early after the second half had begun. E. Braswell converted to make the score 31-7.

The Bronte boys hit paydirt again midway of the 3rd period. In this drive the Longhorns went 70 yards. Final play came on a 32 yard pass from Stephenson to A. Phillips. Braswell missed the try for point.

Only a few minutes later the Longhorns appeared to be on the way to an upset when they scored again in the fourth period. This time the Longhorns rode 87 yards on the arm of Stephenson and the brilliant running of D. Braswell, K. Scott and A. Phillips. Stephenson went over from the 1 to end the Longhorn scoring for the afternoon. The score was 31-19.

Rochester scored once more before it was all over. Nanny sneaked it over from the 1 and McWhorter ran the extra point to make the final score 38-19.

Rochester also outscored the locals in first downs 21-16. Rochester gained 366 yards rushing and 102 passing. The Longhorns only gained 82 yards rushing but gained 175 yards in the air.

ENDS SEASON

The game ended the season for the local boys. The Longhorns won 5 and lost 6 during the season. They won from Robert Lee twice and Ira, Trent and Hobbs while losing to Ozona, Coahoma, Loraine, Rankin, Hermleigh and Rochester.

Fans and players alike had an anxious few minutes at the game Friday when Stephenson was knocked out and carried by ambulance to the Ballinger hospital.

An announcement to the effect that he would be alright was made a few minutes later and Stephenson came back into the ball game at the half.

ROCHESTER-COAHOMA

The Rochester Steers were to have met the powerful Coahoma Bulldogs yesterday afternoon in an encounter at Haskell. The game will decide the regional championship. Coahoma soundly defeated Grand Falls last Friday.

Oil News

Kewanee Oil Co. 2-B Wendland, one location east and slightly south stepout to production in the Wendkirk (Cisco) field of Coke County, six miles southwest of Bronte, flowed oil on a drillstem test in the Cisco.

On the three hour and 53 minute test between 3,712-16 feet, gas surfaced in 19 minutes, no gauge, and oil in one hour and 45 minutes. The well flowed to pits eight minutes, then turned to tanks and flowed for two hours. The well flowed 8.04 barrels the first hour and 10.05 barrels the second hour. The project reversed out 5.46 barrels of oil to tanks and 10 barrels of oil to pits. Recovery was 360 feet of oil cut mud and 90 feet of sulphur water.

Flowing pressure was 225-915 pounds; 30 minute shut in pressure, 1,560 pounds.

Operator was preparing to complete the well.

Location is in Thos. Hennessy Survey 1.

A wildcat has been staked by Dudley T. Daughtery of Beeville as No. 1 A. S. Willick. It will be drilled 10 miles southeast of Robert Lee.

Operations on the project were scheduled to begin Nov. 30.

Location for the 6,500 foot wildcat, which is on a 640 acre tract, is 589.3 feet from the north and west lines of John Gibson Survey 10.

The test is located 1 5/8 miles northeast of Humble No. 1 Schuch, wildcat failure abandoned Dec. 11, 1950, at 6,598 feet.

It is also two miles southeast of Seaboard & Southern Minerals No. 1 Reed, which was abandoned Aug. 5, 1948, at 6,680 feet.

F. Kirk Johnson No. 3 H. G. Wendland, Erdmann Grike Survey, Wendkirk Field southwest of Bronte, has been completed for 55.97 barrels of 40.7 gravity oil and 68 per cent water per day on pump from open hole at 3,691-93 feet.

Johnson's No. 1-A Wendland, J. D. O'Daniel Survey, same field, has been abandoned at 4,013 feet.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK

Fort Worth—Receipts of cattle and calves were again heavy at all points on Monday, and the trade was inclined to weaken as result of the heavier supplies.

Grainfed offerings of steers and yearlings were in much larger proportion at all markets, including Fort Worth, than in most recent sessions.

Stocker trade was active, with the better kinds moving to good advantage, and broad demand for stocker cows was noted. Buyers had many orders in hand for young cows, and there was again considerable activity on the wheat-felder types of cattle.

The twelve markets reported about 30,000 more cattle and calves on Monday than a week ago.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings drew \$17 to \$23, some 105 steers at \$23 averaged 892 pounds and came from V. O. Hildreth of Aledo. He also had 15 heifers at 809 pounds at \$21.50. Gladys Scaling Martin of Clay County, sold a load of steers at 953 pounds at \$22.50. Harley & Franks of Oklahoma had a load of 921 pound heifers at \$18.50.

Ward Jones, Oklahoma, had a load of steers at 1,321 pounds at \$21.50. H. Custer, Oklahoma had 57 steers at 1,213 pounds at \$22.

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Central Drug

Old sheep were steady. Ewes sold from \$6 to \$7 for slaughter with some breeders from \$7 to \$10. Medium and low grade yearling muttons sold around \$10 to \$14. Old wethers drew \$7 to \$10. Old bucks sold for \$3 to \$3.50.

Good and choice fat lambs sold from \$17 to \$18.25, the latter on shorn lambs, No. 3 pelts, at 91 pounds from Carl Robinson, Big Spring.

It's The Law— Chance Governs Call For Jury Duty

Have you ever had to postpone or cancel a hunting or fishing trip or some important business matter to answer a call for jury service? Many people are finding themselves in that position nowadays.

Some may wonder just how that jury summons always seems to arrive at the most inopportune time. There's no secret involved. It is largely a matter of chance.

Under Texas laws jury panels for District Courts are selected by one of two methods — the Jury Wheel or the Jury Commission. The jury wheel is a hollow metal wheel or container, so erected that it will freely revolve on its axle.

In counties using a jury wheel, a list of all qualified jurors is prepared from the official tax lists in August of each year. Taking part in the ceremony are the County Tax Assessor, the District Clerk, the County Sheriff, and the County Clerk. Each prospective juror's name is written on a card of uniform size and placed in the metal container.

Then the wheel is locked with two separate locks, the key to one lock being kept by the District Clerk and the other key being kept by the Sheriff. As jurors are needed, the wheel is revolved to mix the names and the required number drawn for preparation of jury lists.

Three persons must be present when the wheel is unlocked and the names drawn therefrom — the Sheriff (or one of his deputies), and the District Judge. Upon completion of currently required jury lists, all names are returned to the container, which is again double locked.

Later, when the time comes around to prepare a new set of lists, some of the same names will very likely be drawn again. Others may never be drawn.

In counties not operating under the jury wheel system, the District Judge at each term of his court appoints three to five persons from different sections of the county to act as Jury Commissioners.

Using the county tax assessment roll, these men follow the Judge's instructions as to the number of jurors to be selected for various weeks of the court term. The lists of names prepared by them are sealed in separate envelopes and delivered to the Judge. He, in turn, turns them over to the District Clerk or one of his deputies in open court, who immediately files the envelopes away in a safe place in the Clerk's office.

Although ordinary inconveniences are not usually sufficient to gain an excuse from jury duty, emergency or hardship is a different matter. If you face such extreme circumstances in your business or personal affairs that your mind cannot freely reflect and meditate upon the important issues to be tried, call this to the attention of the judge.

Courts try to be reasonable in granting excuses. The judge will consider your situation carefully and thoughtfully, and may determine that your service should be deferred.

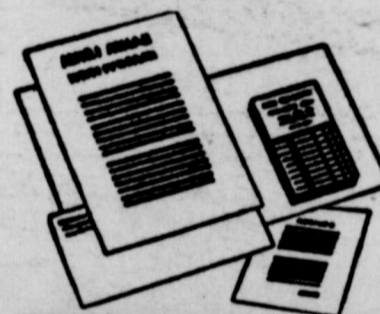

Mild Epidemic Of Measles Is Reaching Texas

Measles in Texas is reaching a mild epidemic stage at present, with outbreaks following closely

the main lines of travel across the State, according to information made public today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The number of cases reported to the State Health Department last week are much above the average.

"The peculiar pattern of this spread of measles re-emphasizes the fact that it is a contagious disease, passed on from one person to another," Dr. Cox said. "Guard against exposure by avoiding contact with measles patients."

Dr. Cox said that measles alone is not necessarily a dangerous disease, but dangerous complications, such as streptococcal infections, mastoiditis, and pneumonia which may follow, make it a disease to be carefully nursed, with close attention from a doctor.

"Unskilled treatment of a plain case of measles can result in dangerous complications," Dr. Cox warned, "and it is not to be re-

garded lightly as simply another childhood disease."

Dr. Cox urged parents to carefully watch children exposed, and at the first sign of temperature, flushed face, sniffles, or watering eyes, advised that the child be put to bed immediately and placed under a doctor's care.

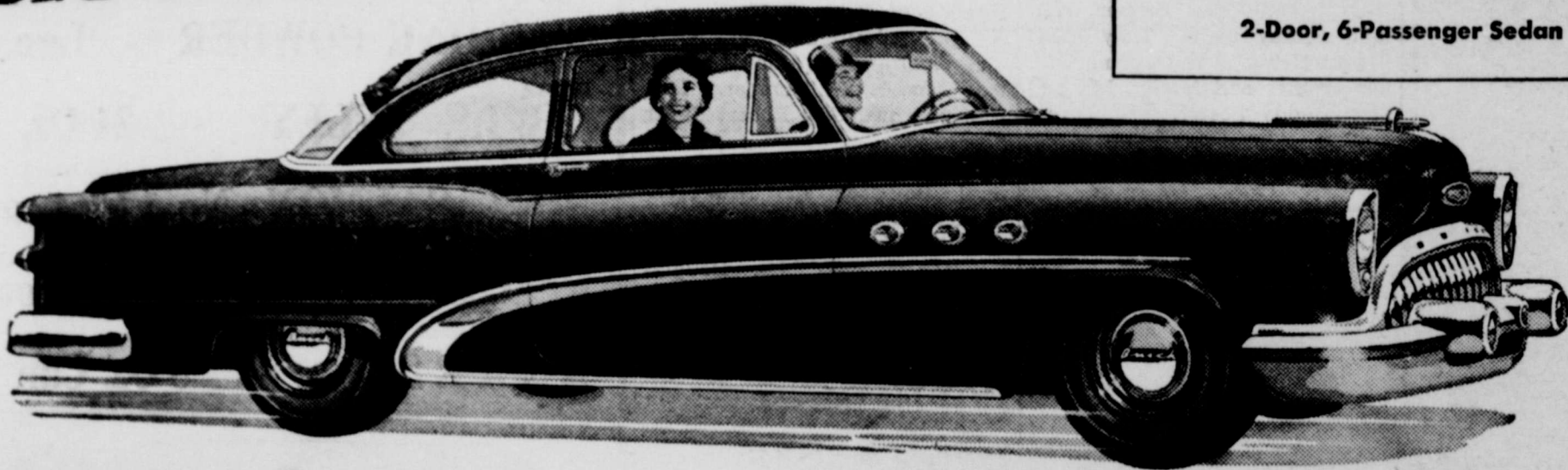
